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### THIRD ANNUAL MEETING.

# THIRD ANNUAL REPORT

## OF THE

## TO THE

# FAIRMOUNT PARK ART ASSOCIATION.

*Read at the Annual Meeting of the Members, Thursday, the 10th of December, A.D. 1874, in the Board of Trade Room, Mercantile Library, Philadelphia.*

TO THE MEMBERS OF FAIRMOUNT PARK ART ASSOCIATION :

The Board of Trustees respectfully submit the following report :

The Association is congratulated upon its prosperous condition. The continued depression in business and financial affairs of the past year has had very little, if any, perceptible effect upon our collections, which have exceeded in amount those of any former year.

The Treasurer's report hereto appended exhibits the financial condition of the Association.

A very little exertion on the part of each member of the Association would add largely to this list. It is upon such exertions, rather than upon the solicitations of paid agents, that the Association depends for its increase.

The Board of Trustees ventures to remind you of this truth, and to urge upon you the propriety and duty of exerting yourselves in this behalf. The project of the Association is always well received when properly presented to our fellow-citizens. Its intentions have their hearty sympathy.

The Centennial Exhibition, it is hoped, will develop and bring together the best efforts of American and foreign sculptors. This will give us our first opportunity to select, from a number of subjects, those that will merit orders from you. Therefore it is exceedingly desirable that the active roll be increased, and the income of the Association thereby enlarged.

To this end, and in order to be prepared for the extraordinary purchases you may desire to make within a few years, the Board of Trustees again urges the necessity of individual effort, and respectfully suggests that every member should use his personal influence to add at least one new member to our list during the ensuing year. And you are particularly reminded that ladies are ever welcomed to membership in this Association, and that, as yet, comparatively few of them grace us with their fellowship.

Since the date of the last Report the Association has contributed three works of art to Fairmount Park. Two of these, however, were referred to in the published proceedings of your last annual meeting. They are:

1. Marble statue, *IL PENNEROSO*, by Mozier. Purchased by the Association. Accepted by the Commissioners of the Park January 10, 1874. Placed in the Temporary Art Gallery in the Park.

2. Oil painting, *THE AMBUSCADE*; figures by Baronet Wappers, landscape by Koekkoek. Presented to the Association by Napoleon A. Jennings, Esq. Accepted by the Commissioners of the Park January 24, 1874. Placed in the Temporary Art Gallery in the Park.

3. Oil painting, *CHALK AND HIS FRIENDS*, by Newbold H. Trotter. Presented to the Association by the artist. Accepted by the Commissioners of the Park March 21, 1874. Placed in the Temporary Art Gallery in the Park.

The very satisfactory condition of your treasury has enabled your Board of Trustees to venture upon a larger undertaking than they have heretofore attempted. They have purchased a fine bronze group, "The Dying Lioness," by Wolff, of Berlin. It consists of four figures of double life-size, viz. : a lion, a lioness, and two whelps. It will arrive in Philadelphia in the month of February next.

Mr. J. Henry Horstmann, United States Consul at Munich, has been very active in assisting the Association to effect this purchase.

It is believed that a more suitable site can be obtained for the bronze group of Wolves, which is now located at Ferndale Pool, in the West Park. To this end the Commissioners of Fairmount Park have authorized its removal to a spot about to be designated by a Committee of the Commissioners and a Committee of this Association acting together.

By Act of Congress, approved the 22d of June, A.D. 1874, the United States gave to this Association twenty condemned twelve-pounder bronze cannon, to be used in the erection of a bronze equestrian statue to the memory of the late Major-General George Gordon Meade, within the limits of this city. These cannon are now on their way to Philadelphia from Washington. The Baltimore and Potomac Railroad Company, and the Philadelphia, Wilmington and Baltimore Railroad Company have very kindly offered to transport these cannon to Philadelphia free of charge. A similar kindness and courtesy had before been shown the Association by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company when they carried the marble statue "*Il Penseroso*" from New York to this city free of charge.

Owing to the financial crisis of September, A.D. 1873, etc., the operations of the Committee on the Meade Memorial were suspended. It is now hoped that these will be soon resumed, and under auspices that will insure success. The memory of so great and good a man as General Meade should not be soon forgotten nor slightly treated. The moral and heroic features of his character should be held up for the admiration of the nation, and as an example to the rising generation.

## Opening Address of the Hon. Henry C. Carey,

*Chairman of the Third Annual Meeting of Fairmount Park Art Association, December 10, A.D. 1874.*

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ACCEPT my thanks for the honor you have done me, and with them the expression of regret at having so little in the past contributed towards promotion of the objects of our Association. Throughout, however, I have with great pleasure watched your progress, and have been glad to see how other of our citizens have co-operated with you in the effort at increasing the attractions of our beautiful Park. Never at any period have such efforts been so much required.

With each succeeding month we are brought nearer to the great cities of Europe, and with each there is increase in the tendency toward that absenteeism by means of which millions, and even hundreds of millions, are carried out to aid in increasing their attractions, while diminishing our power to oppose to them that resistance which would result from such expenditures at home. What is true in this respect in reference to ourselves, is equally so elsewhere, and hence it is that we see the people of all the nations of the earth flocking towards London, Paris, and other great European cities, thereby aiding them in their forward march, and so increasing their attractions as almost altogether to destroy those local ones which had before existed. That we may cease to be participants in such movements it is needed that we strive by every effort in our power to make our city not only comfortable for ourselves, but attractive to those abroad. Could our men of wealth, largely interested in its progress, be persuaded to understand their true interests, their duties to themselves and to their fellow-citizens, the number of your members would count, not by hundreds, but by thousands; and that such may at an early day prove to be the case is my earnest wish, believing that with proper effort this city of brotherly love may in time be placed among the foremost cities of the earth.

## Address of Provost Charles J. Stillé.

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LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,—I take great pleasure in expressing my cordial sympathy with the work in which this Association is engaged. It seems to me that it is an important agency in accomplishing one great object for which Fairmount Park was designed, namely: the education of the popular taste in the love of beauty in nature and in art. I cannot look upon Fairmount Park as a place intended only, or chiefly, for giving rest to wearied bodies, or for filling lungs, poisoned by foul air, with fresh supplies of oxygen, still less as a place of mere fashionable display, where, as in Hyde Park at certain hours, thousands of brilliant equipages creep at snail's pace round a ring, the whole object in life of their occupants, apparently, being to see and to be seen. Without wishing in any way to detract from the value of the Park as a place of rest and refreshment, I am glad to think that it is large enough and varied enough in its attractions to foster among us a genuine love of natural beauty. I do not see how any one can wander through that grand domain with his eyes and his heart open, and gaze upon its ever-changing landscape, the noble old trees, the shining river, the far vistas which reveal to him scenes of loveliness such as come to us in our brightest dreams,—I say, I do not think that any one can look upon all this and not be conscious that there is awakening in him a new sense which brings to him happiness and enjoyment of a very high kind. Now this new sense is a sense of the beautiful, not a vague, dreamy, fanciful thing, as many suppose, but one of the truest and profoundest instincts of every man's heart, just as real as the love of money, or the love of work, and only less conspicuous in the history of human life because the wants of the spirit have been less cared for than those of the body. We are beginning, in these latter days, to find out that the love of beauty

—not in the privileged few only, but in the masses as well—is a very real thing, that the æsthetic and the practical lie very close to each other in every man's life, and that that civilization is the noblest which, while it seeks to diffuse most widely the comforts and conveniences of life, strives also to develop every sentiment which may help to dignify, purify, and adorn it. Look at your own homes and the city in which you dwell, and consider how, during the present generation, from the commonest articles of furniture to the grand architectural monuments we have erected, there is perceivable a sense of this love of the beautiful unknown before; often, it is true, blind and mistaken in its expression, yet constantly asserting itself and making itself felt. What is this noble Park itself but a grand tribute of this community to the sincerity of its belief that there are other objects and ends of life worthy of pursuit besides those which begin and end in the ceaseless toil of mere money-getting?

There are abundant illustrations to show the practical value of this sentiment of the love of the beautiful which commend themselves to the consideration of those who are skeptical about the possibility of educating the popular taste, or about the value of such an education, even if it were possible. Let me give you one. Thirty years ago I made my first visit to England. Nothing struck me more forcibly than the absence of anything like artistic taste and skill in objects connected with the common uses of daily life. As to their public buildings, all sense of beauty seemed to have disappeared with the Norman monks, who designed their noble cathedrals and picturesque abbeys, while in their shops everything in the way of furniture or ornament, while massive and substantial, was wanting in the elements of beauty and taste. I was not surprised to be told that French artists, whom the manufacturers of costly fabrics had been forced to import as designers of their patterns, soon lost their capacity and skill in England because there were no objects of art there, as at home, which constantly met their eye and kept alive their love of the beautiful. All this is now changed. During the last thirty years more money has been contributed for the restoration

of the old cathedrals, in order that they may be seen in their pristine beauty, than has been spent upon them for all purposes since they were built, while any one who now looks into those shops in London where objects of taste and ornament are sold, cannot doubt that in some way a new sense and love of the beautiful has been developed among the English people. This wonderful revolution, for it is scarcely less, is due very much to the persistent efforts and refined taste of one man, not a native-born Englishman, the late Prince Albert. It came about in this way: the International Exhibition, held in London in 1851, made painfully conspicuous those defects in the products of English manufacture of which I have spoken. Whatever might be the English superiority in other respects, it was clear that she was much behindhand in the production of those articles of which beauty of form and color make up the great part of the commercial value. Fortunately, it was found that a considerable sum of money remained after paying the expenses of the exhibition. This money, principally through the influence of Prince Albert, and under his direction, was applied to organize a scheme by which the defects which had been made so apparent could be remedied. The South Kensington Museum was established and endowed with the surplus exhibition fund and an annual Parliamentary grant, and no one can now visit this wonderful place, and see its immense galleries filled with models of all which the civilization of the world has contributed for centuries to make art subservient to the use and ornament of daily life, and look upon the crowd of earnest artisans who day and night throng these galleries, making careful designs from these models, striving to catch some of their grace and beauty,—I say, no thoughtful man can look upon all this without gratification and wonder. And when he reflects that this museum is the parent of art schools now permanently established by the government in every centre of manufacturing industry in the Kingdom, he understands the causes of the wonderful changes of the last thirty years, and he cannot doubt that it is possible by wise measures to raise the popular taste to a high standard in a single generation.

The question is a very important one whether this Association, penetrated, as I doubt not it is, with a sincere desire to cultivate true ideas of art among our people, may not, by the special work in which it is engaged, do much to aid in accomplishing so desirable a result. Millions of money and centuries of time would be required to decorate our Park with such works of art as are to be found in the royal pleasure-grounds in Europe. What we most need, I venture to say, as a beginning of this work of true culture, is more fitting representations than we now possess of thoughts and feelings which lie deep in the popular heart, an embodiment in noble and imperishable forms of those ideas which are associated in the mind of every American with sentiments of pride and affection, those especially concerning his country and its history. Works of art, it seems to me, with the purpose I have named in view, should above all things have a *human interest*. We have a history for example, a history of the last hundred years, which we are proud to recall, and which in the marvels it exhibits should be as full of inspiration to the poet and the artist as the history of any century since the world began. Cannot we do something in this Park, and in this city where the heroic age of the Republic was passed, to commemorate this history, and keep alive its spirit? Is it too much to hope that we may some day have in our Park fitting representations of the great men and great events of that history, of all, in short, which is associated in the true heart of the people with that dignity which is conferred by wisdom, bravery, or virtue?

If it is said that my scheme is too ambitious a one, and that the funds of this or any other private association would not suffice for the erection of such monuments, then my answer is that education in anything worth having is generally a slow, but almost always a sure process, provided we lay the foundation aright and build patiently. We shall reach the end, doubt it not, if we keep the true end before us as our constant guide.

If we are in earnest about cultivating the popular taste, we must make no mistake as to where and how we are to begin. The great masterpieces of art in painting and sculpture are not

those which appeal to the average culture of the multitude. They are fully recognized only by those in whom an instinctive sense of beauty has been cultivated and made discriminating by long study, observation, and comparison. You might as well expect a man, wholly ignorant of music, to go into raptures the first time he hears the symphonies of Mozart and Beethoven, or one who had never read a line of poetry to soar at once to that "pure empyrean" where Shakspeare and Milton dwell, as to hope that one in whom there had been no culture of the æsthetic sense should be stirred from the depths of his soul the first time he gazed upon the Venus of Milo, or the mutilated Psyche of Naples, or the Apollo Belvidere.

I know a man who, among the many reasons he gives for being grateful because he was born in Philadelphia and has lived here all his life, is this: That he can gaze every day, if he chooses, upon the main building of the Girard College. To him that grand monument is a source of perennial pleasure. It is his ideal type of architectural beauty. To him, its color, its form, its proportions, its simple majesty, have the noble harmony of the finest music. It never occurs to him to think that as a building it may not be the best suited for the purposes for which it is used. He thinks of it only as a work of art, and he fills his soul with its beauty, as he would with that of some flower of exquisite loveliness.

Such may be the result of the constant presence of one good model in refining and cultivating the taste of a person of a temperament wholly exceptional; but the education of the masses in the principles of art, it seems to me, must be reached by a more indirect means. Everything presented to the popular eye as a work of art should suggest noble thoughts, and associations of a lofty kind; it should be recognized at once as a reality, appealing, perhaps, only to the imagination for this recognition, but not less real on that account. It should not be regarded as a mere object of ornament, put where it is only for ornament's sake, but as a thing full of suggestiveness and meaning to those who look upon it, the embodiment of thoughts and feelings worth preserving,

and therefore fitting to be clothed with that grace and beauty with which the human heart seeks to invest everything which it truly reveres and loves.

It was thus that at Athens patriotism and the love of beauty were linked in indissoluble harmony. When the orator on the Bema wished to rouse the national feelings he looked towards the Acropolis, and pointed to the Propylæum, the fitting shrine of the trophies of his country's glory ; to the Parthenon, the temple of that Virgin Goddess of Wisdom, by honoring whom this small community had become the foremost city of the world, conquering its own conquerors ; to the temple of that Theseus who had shared with Hercules the honor of being the earliest benefactor of Attica. Do you think that his mind was occupied at such a time by thoughts of Phidias and Praxiteles? No ; he knew he was talking to men who lived in a city which had a history,—a history which had all their lives been made to them a luminous reality by the grand monuments with which they were surrounded,—and he knew well that at Athens pride in that history was only another name for love of country.
