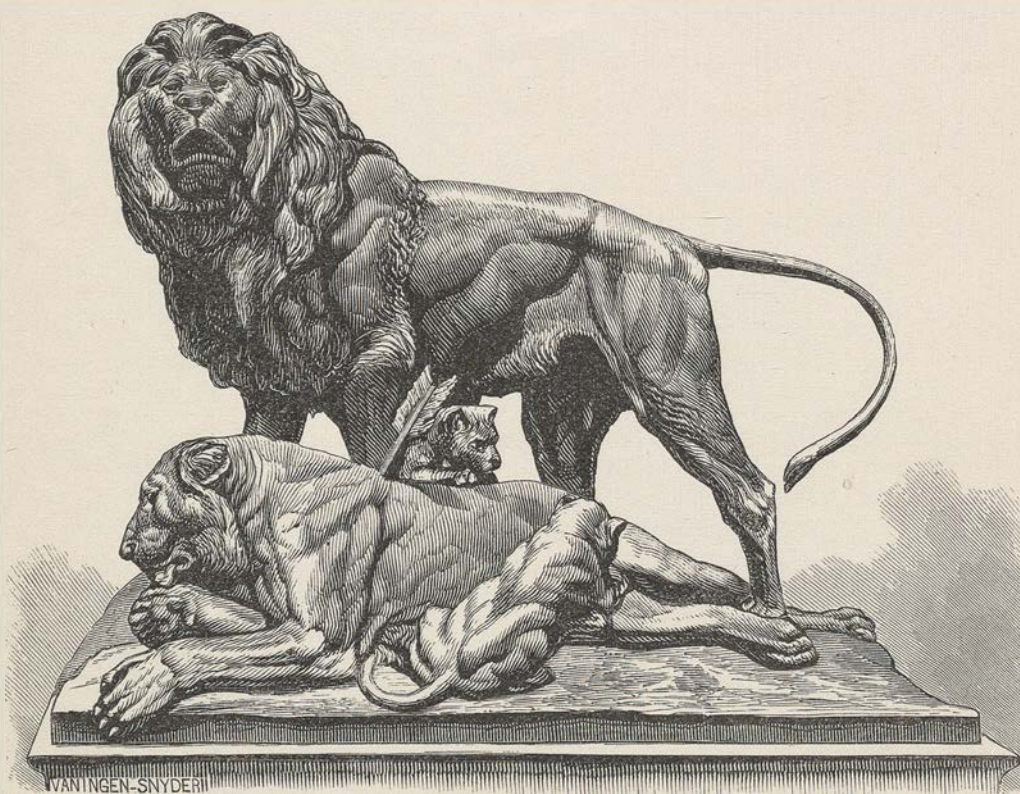

FIFTH ANNUAL MEETING.

ON Tuesday evening, the twenty-eighth of November, A. D. 1876, at eight, P. M., the fifth annual meeting of this Association was held in the Board of Trade Room, Mercantile Library Building, on Tenth street above Chestnut street, Philadelphia.

The meeting being called to order by the Secretary, upon motion of Mr. J. B. COX, Mr. CHARLES ROGERS was called to preside. The minutes of the Fourth Annual Meeting were read, and upon motion approved. The Secretary read the Fifth Annual Report of the Board of Trustees and the Report of the Treasurer, Mr. JAMES L. CLAGHORN, and, there being no objection, they were approved. Upon motion, the meeting proceeded to the election of five Trustees to serve for three years. The following gentlemen were nominated:—

FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

TO THE

Fairmount Park Art Association.

READ AT THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE MEMBERS, TUESDAY, THE TWENTY-EIGHTH OF NOVEMBER, A. D. 1876, IN THE BOARD OF TRADE ROOM, MERCANTILE LIBRARY, PHILADELPHIA.

To the Members of the Fairmount Park Art Association:—

AGREEABLY to the requirements of the Constitution, the Board of Trustees respectfully submit the following Annual Report:—

Your Board take pleasure in presenting this the Fifth Annual Report, notice of the increased importance of your Society, and its gradual, but positive, growth in membership. The year just closing, so replete with exciting incidents to the citizens of Philadelphia, does not show any withdrawal of the public attention and support, so favorably accorded in the past, to those societies which, like our organization, have for their object the advancing and beautifying of the City.

The financial condition of the Association is laid before you in the Report of the Treasurer, Mr. JAS. L. CLAGHORN, appended to this.

At the date of the last Annual Meeting the number of members on the books of the Association was as follows:—

In the present year we have lost, by death and resignation, twenty-three members, and have received thirty-three new members, three of whom are Life Members, which makes the total membership at this date 1,261, as follows:—

which shows a much larger membership than in any other year since our organization. The increased membership, which in our last Report it was urged upon each member to strive to bring about by personal solicitation, has been mainly accomplished in this way, and by a distribution, in the Spring of this year, of a second edition of our last Report, accompanied with a circular appeal, setting forth the objects and scope of our organization; this latter plan of solicitation, though incurring an additional expense for printing in this year, has, no doubt, been a wise one, and ought to liberally repay the

outlay, having brought into our ranks a number of new members, upon whom we can look in the future for permanent sympathy and support. The members who are credited with having secured new contributors are the following :—

The Board of Trustees hope that every member, who is not yet credited with a new subscriber, will emulate the action of these members, as there is no doubt that friendly and personal solicitation is the surest way of advancing the strength and position of the Society.

After the last Annual Meeting, your Board approved of a resolution to purchase in Europe two fine granite pedestals for the purpose of mounting the "Dying Lioness" and "Wolves" groups; these pedestals were furnished through Mr. MÜLLER, of Munich, Germany, and were from quarries in the north part of that country. They reached this port in time to permit the groups to be mounted at the opening of the International Exhibition. The expenditure incurred, which may seem large, was absolutely necessary as regards the "Dying Lioness" group, in order to set it off with proper effect; and in view of the resolution to change the location of the "Wolves" group, it was deemed advisable to secure a good pedestal for it at the same time. The pedestals are of finely polished syenite, and have been gen-

erally admired by all who have examined them.. In the negotiations attending their purchase, this Association was again indebted to the kind assistance of Mr. GEO. HENRY HORSTMANN, United States Consul at Munich.

On account of the duty being remitted, and owing to the generous action of the Red Star Steamship Line, to whom your Board return thanks, there was no expense in bringing the granite from Antwerp, and we were thus enabled to secure them at a smaller price than anywhere in the United States. Your Board desire, also, to thank the Pennsylvania and Junction Railroad Companies for transporting the pedestals, from the dock to the Exhibition grounds, free of cost.

The "Dying Lioness" group, the reception of which was noticed in our last Report to you, was mounted on the pedestal at the commencement of the Exposition, and was placed by the Art Commissioners on a plat of ground, near the southeastern angle of Memorial Hall, where it still remains; it has been the subject of very favorable criticism from the crowds of persons who visited the Exhibition, and was, perhaps, the most finished work of Art of its kind there. Your Board have been considering the permanent disposition of this work. The Zoological Society, of this City, some time ago made an overture to this Association, expressing a desire that we should place this group permanently in a spot (to be prepared and ornamented by them) in the middle of the concourse at the Girard avenue end of the Society's Garden. After full discussion by your Board, this location has been approved and the group presented to the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, with a request that they place it in the position desired by the Zoological Society. Before completing this arrangement, the Association made provision

that due credit should be given to this organization for the purchase of this work, by means of an inscribed plate upon the pedestal, and that its location shall be without any enclosed grounds of the Zoological Society, so as to be, at all times hereafter, accessible to the public frequenting the Park.

The removal of the group of "Hudson Bay Wolves," formerly situated near Ferndale Pool, West Park, which has been, for some time, contemplated, has been successfully accomplished; it is now located on one of the pedestals, above alluded to, on a small rise of ground, immediately north of Lansdowne entrance to the West Park.

It is now in easy and conspicuous view of all visitors to the Park, and there is little doubt that the first site selected for this group was too far removed from the main drives and walks to allow it to be at all appreciated. Your Board, in noting the removal and replacing of this group, desire to tender thanks for the valuable services of Messrs. STRUTHERS & SON, in handling and polishing a portion of the pedestal; and also to Messrs. CHAS. A. PORTER and ERSKINE D. SMITH, contractors with the City to enlarge the bridge over Junction Railroad, for their free services rendered in setting up the "Wolves" group, having permitted the use of their siding. The Committee on Works of Art, having carefully looked over the large collection of works exhibited at the International Exhibition, were somewhat disappointed to find that very few of the many beautiful works there, were of such a character as to be suitable for acquisition by this Association.

It is to be borne in mind that the works to be selected by us, destined for location in the Park, must combine, with their artistic merits, elements of strength and durability, so that when permanently placed in the Park, they may withstand, as far as can be, the severe climatic influences to which they must be subjected.

The liberality of the citizens of Philadelphia has now assured to the public, through the exertions of a sister society, the establishment of a new and commodious building, the Academy of Fine Arts, where the more beautiful and delicate Art creations, on canvas and in marble, can be collected, and always remain secure from exposure,—models of beauty and taste. It is the opinion, therefore, of your Board, that our organization can best subserve the interests intended by our charter, if, in our future recommendation of purchases, we confine ourselves to such works as will be most suitable to withstand out-door exposure in the Park.

In view of this, the Committee having this matter in charge, upon full consideration toward the close of the Exhibition, did not suggest for purchase any of the works there exhibited, but have concluded to authorize negotiations for the purchase of several fountains, of which some admirable plans, at moderate estimates, have been submitted to the Committee.

Your Board, therefore, hope to be able to have ready in the Spring, several of these fountains, to be located at such sites as may be sanctioned by the Park Commission. Although our Charter empowers us to place this species of decoration in the Park, your Board have not specially directed their attention to this before, on account of the inadequate hydraulic arrangements in the Park necessary to secure the proper effect and display of this kind of ornament, and the great

expense required for piping, to conduct water to the appropriate sites. An examination of this matter, however, leads us to state that the fountains which your Committee have recommended for purchase, can be located at such points as to obviate any of this difficulty, and reduce the expense of piping to the least cost.

Your Board of Trustees are yet unable to note any very active interest in the means taken to increase the MEADE Memorial Fund, the Trusteeship of which rests with this Association. The hope is entertained that the public, now relieved from the distracting influences of the International Exhibition, will see the merited character of this intended Memorial, and assist, in the proper way, to secure it. The amount at present to the credit of the fund is \$2,056 46. The bronze cannon secured by the Association from the United States for this Memorial, are valued at \$7,000, and this Association has consented to give \$5,000 to the object, provided the remaining sum be raised; as, by the estimates, \$25,000 is thought sufficient to purchase an appropriate kind of statue, there is only \$10,000 needed from subscription.

Your Board do not desire to make any odious comparisons, but will state, in this particular, that the citizens of New York have, within a little less than a year, unveiled in their Park the statues of two eminent public men, the funds for the purchase of which having been secured there by subscriptions in a very short time; the memories of the men to whom these dedications were made—like that of General MEADE—are equally the heritage of Philadelphians, as they are of our whole country.

It will be observed, by reference to the Treasurer's Report, that the resolution of your Board of December 16, 1874, directing the establishment of a permanent fund, has been a

measure that, in time, will be of great use to the Association as a source of revenue; the amount at present to the credit of this fund, \$5,012 70, shows it to have almost doubled, and it will soon bring in a very fair return by interest on the investment.

The term of office of five Trustees, elected to serve in this Board for three years, expires to-night. It is your duty to elect five others for the same period.

In conclusion, your Board of Trustees have marked, and each member of the Association must have noticed with pleasure, during the past year—so fruitful in grand enterprises by the people of Philadelphia—the very great impetus which Art, and the culture and impulses it quickens, have received. There has grown up among our people a healthful appreciation of the pure and tasteful in Art; the wondrous collection which the spirit of our people permitted so many to study and enjoy for a season, has had a most beneficial influence, and the crude ideas and meretricious elements which have been so conspicuous in American Art heretofore, have had types set before them which cannot fail to effect an improvement.

This Association has seen, with some satisfaction, the progress which kindred societies have made in their efforts to beautify the Park. It shows an element which, if properly organized and controlled, can do a great deal for the adornment of Fairmount Park. Most, if not all of these works, however, have been of a specific character, born of an enthusiasm to perpetuate some great deed,—the memory of a noble name,—or yet some great principle, like the fountain of the Catholic Total Abstinence Society. This organization has always viewed with pleasure the success of each of these

separate and limited attempts to ornament the Park. In all praiseworthy objects there should be no jealousy, but friendly co-operation and partnership, and though we cannot always indorse the artistic value of the works the indiscriminate zeal of these associations has produced, we can always most heartily approve the motives which have prompted the acquisition of them. We desire to remind the public of Philadelphia that this is the only permanent organization having an avowed purpose, and working continuously, with the limited means at its disposal, to add to the natural beauties of Fairmount Park those embellishments that Art can supply. It is our intention to place nothing there but what will be an ornament and what can be universally approved, and we offer ourselves as a medium and agency to effect this ambitious end, with confidence that the co-operation we must have to compass the laudable end of our existence will be gradually extended to us. We cannot do better, in closing this Report, than to recall to you the words of the distinguished citizen who addressed you at your Third Annual Meeting, that—

“We are beginning in these latter days to find out that the
“love of beauty—not in the privileged few, but in the masses,
“as well—is a very real thing, and that the æsthetic, and the
“practical, lie very close to each other in every man’s life, and
“that that civilization is the noblest which, while it seeks to
“diffuse most widely the comforts and conveniences of life,
“strives also to develop every sentiment which may help to
“dignify, purify, and adorn it.”

PREAMBLE TO THE CONSTITUTION.

SINCE it is desirable to increase the appreciation and love of art in our midst; to add to the number of its votaries, promote the refinements of life consequent thereon, and encourage artists in the practice of their profession; and—

Since it is commendable to erect statues, busts, and other works of art, to the honor and memory of eminent persons and their deeds, in order that their good example and influence may be more permanently exerted in fostering a spirit of emulation and ambition in our people:—

AND WHEREAS!—These results may be better secured, and the good effects thereof more generally obtained, by the accumulation of objects of art in one inclosure, visited by the greatest number of people:—

AND WHEREAS:—It is desirable to enhance the beauties and attractions of the Park by a means in which all may gladly participate:—

Therefore:—We, whose names are affixed to the following Constitution, have formed ourselves into a Society to be styled the

FAIRMOUNT PARK ART ASSOCIATION,

which Society shall have for its object the accumulation of a fund, by means of annual contributions of small fixed sums of money by the members thereof, and by legacies, donations, etc.; which fund shall be devoted to, and employed in, adorning Fairmount Park with works of art, either of a memorial nature or otherwise.

In consideration of the objects above set forth, we, whose names are subscribed to the following Constitution, agree to fulfill, with honor and good faith, the duties imposed in the said Constitution, and the By-Laws which have been adopted for the rule and government of the said FAIRMOUNT PARK ART ASSOCIATION.
