The meeting being called to order by the Secretary, upon motion of Mr. J. B. COX, HON. WM. S. STOKLEY, Mayor of Philadelphia, was called to preside. The minutes of the Fifth Annual Meeting were read, and upon motion approved. The Secretary read the Sixth Annual Report of the Board of Trustees and the Report of the Treasurer, Mr. JAMES L. CLAGHORN, and, there being no objection, they were approved. Upon motion, the meeting proceeded to the election of five Trustees to serve for three years. The following gentlemen were nominated:—

SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

TO THE

Fairmount Park Art Association.

READ AT THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE MEMBERS, MONDAY,
NOVEMBER THE TWENTY-SIXTH, A. D. 1877, IN THE
ACADEMY OF FINE ARTS, PHILADELPHIA.

To the Members of the Fairmount Park Art Association:—

IN compliance with the requirements of the Constitution, the Board of Trustees respectfully tender the following Annual Report:—

It is a pleasure to note that, notwithstanding the continued depression in financial circles, your society has been able to maintain its standing and importance.

The object of our corporation being a purely æsthetic one, and appealing more effectively to the attention of the community in times of commercial prosperity, it would not be surprising to have found the efficiency of our work crippled by a falling off in our list of contributors, especially as nearly all similar organizations have suffered in this way.

It was deemed best, therefore, by your Board, at the beginning of this year, to employ an officer at a moderate salary, who could devote his time wholly to advancing the interests of the Association, by presenting personally to the public the features and objects of the society, and encouraging and enlisting support. The work of collecting the annual dues of the society was also given to this new appointee, so that the expense heretofore paid in commissions for this labor has been saved to the society. The report of the officer employed by the Association to fill this position has convinced your Board of the wisdom of their action, and not only have many new members been secured and the numerical strength of the society sustained, but a much better appreciation and understanding of the scope and aims of the corporation is met with among the members, and, indeed, among the community at large, since the employment of this officer.

With the exception of a small expense for clerical services, no compensation has heretofore been paid to any officers of the Association, although the increasing wants and growth of the society have multiplied the labors and augmented the requisitions upon their time.

Early in the present year, your Board appointed a committee to purchase in Paris, France, not more than six fountains, according to plans furnished through the courtesy of the Director of the Department of Public Works and Promenades of that city, and which were approved by the Committee on Works of Art and the Board of Trustees.

The committee completed negotiations for the purchase of five of these fountains, and early in the summer they were received in this city,—Messrs. Drexel & Co. very kindly undertaking this commission gratuitously for the Association. Upon the arrival of the works, the committee proceeded to locate and construct the necessary basins and put up the fountains; the sites being chosen in company with the Park authorities, for whose co-operation and assistance the Association is grateful; the plans and draughts for location and

estimation of the works and all information regarding hydraulic facilities being freely furnished to the committee. To profit by any experience, one fountain only was first put up, and after inspection of various materials and plans for the construction of the basin,—the most important structure,—it was decided to follow the general idea of the large basin for the fountain placed some years ago by the Water Department, near Green Street entrance to Park, not only on account of economy, being of clay and gravel and cheaper than stone or iron, but from having been used a number of years and requiring no reparation. Estimates for the work were given out and the contract awarded to Mr. Samuel Simons, contractor. This fountain, which was placed at the north-east corner of plat of ground, near Lincoln Monument, East Park, was publicly displayed August 24th, 1877, and your Board, members of the Park Commission, of the Association, and the Press were present, and the work was critically examined, and very generally approved and admired. The erection of the other fountains was immediately ordered and contracted for, and they were finally completed early in this month, and presented to Park Commission, and accepted by them. Of the location of the fountains,—two in the plat near Lincoln Monument, to left of drive leading from Green Street entrance, and three in a trefoil cluster to right of same drive,—it is necessary to speak in order to remove any reflections which may arise on account of the proximity of the fountains to each other. When first ordered it was the intention to locate four of them at the four corners, respectively, of the intersection of Belmont avenue and Lansdowne Drive, West Park. It was seen, however, after receiving from the Engineer of Park the plans for the work contemplated there, that an expense of at least \$1,300 would have to be incurred for grading, changing line of piping, &c., and this outlay your Board did not think it judicious to charge the Association with at present, and it was further desired to meet, as far as practicable, the views of the Park authorities, who wished the fountains placed elsewhere, as their plans for

the improvement of this part of Park, are yet incomplete, so the site was abandoned.

Other and very eligible situations were visited and examined,—one near Horticultural Hall, and another on the terraces approaching Lemon Hill, but the former was not adapted, owing to the extreme distance of the water supply, and the latter necessitating expensive improvements in the neighborhood of the site. The committee, governed by these restrictions, were finally drawn to the selection of present places for the fountains, as, on the whole, the best at present and the least expensive. No doubt objection may be urged to the grouping of the work in the present locality, but when it is considered that, as water facilities are extended in the Park, the Association can place similar fountains at other appropriate sites, and as it was desirable to co-operate harmoniously with the Park authorities, who suggested and earnestly recommended the points selected, your Board feel that their action will meet your approval. The exceedingly tasteful horticultural adornments of this portion of Fairmount Park, which, a short time ago, was little else than a quagmire, have rendered the borders of this main drive and entrance one of the most attractive spots in the whole enclosure, and there can be no doubt that this beauty is much enhanced by the late contribution of this Association.

It is a portion of the Park, also very largely frequented by the people in the summer; and as the fountains, owing to the approach of cold weather, were in operation but a short time this year, it is trusted that next season they will minister very greatly to the enjoyment of the public.

At the close of last year, your Association was presented by Messrs. H. Doulton & Co., of London,—prominent exhibitors at the International Exhibition,—with a colossal statue of Diana Borghesi, and a trophy of buff terra-cotta and faience with ornaments, similar to the one in the main avenue of the Main Exhibition Building. These generous donations were acknowledged and accepted at the time, and the statue is, at present, in Horticultural Hall, probably the

most appropriate location for it, and the trophy is at present being erected in Memorial Hall, by the Pennsylvania Museum of Industry, who share the expense with this society.

In the spring of this year the Association was the recipient of the "Tam O'Shanter" group from the Trustees of the Franklin Institute. This is a work of more than ordinary merit, and consists of a group of four figures in red sand-stones, illustrating a scene from Burn's famous poem, and is by the Sculptor Thom. The work has been presented to and accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park. The Association has been presented with a drinking fountain, in marble, the gift of Mrs. R. D. Wood, through Messrs. Struthers & Sons, and it has also been presented to the Park Commission and accepted by them. For these generous gifts the thanks of the Association are due. The works contributed to the Park by this society, and heretofore located in the temporary Art Gallery, have been removed to Memorial Hall, the former gallery being altered to fit it for the reception of another work.

During the present year your Board has been in correspondence with several representatives of the U. S. Government, at the various Art centres in Europe, with a view of ascertaining what works could be procured suitable for the Association to consider for purchase,—either original models, from which castings could be made here, or reproductions of modern or antique types, and at the last meeting of the Board, a resolution was passed instructing the Committee on Works of Art to confer with native artists and ascertain at what cost the society could secure reproductions of appropriate works by them. Your Board has had photographs of some very fine works from abroad submitted to them, but the cost of these works themselves, complete, has generally been so great that any attempt to secure them at present is impolitic. The thanks of this Association are due to Mr. G. H. Horstmann, Consul of the United States at Munich, and Mr. B. O. Duncan, Consul at Naples, for courtesies rendered in this behalf. Among the works of which detailed information was furnished by Mr. Horstmann, were “The Lion Fighter,” by A. Wolff, and “The Amazon,” by Kiss. Each of which could be reproduced and brought here at a cost of about \$35,000. These two famous works of art, which are of universal reputation, would be a most appropriate decoration for one of the main entrances to our magnificent Park. The sum required for their purchase, however, is far beyond the resources of the Association, and unless aided by private means, any intention to secure such works as these must be postponed.

Adverting to the list of works your society has had cognizance of since its organization, it will be observed that their number and merit show that your society cannot be reproached for lack of energy in carrying out the provisions of its charter. It is only a few years since a small coterie of spirited citizens, stimulated by a desire to render Fairmount Park as attractive to the masses as possible, and with a view to encourage the growing taste for art, met to form this Association. The first and second years were mainly devoted to organization, and it was only a short time before the financial distress

fell upon the country that your society fairly entered upon a career. Notwithstanding this drawback it has prospered and we have been permitted, as our funds accumulated and gifts were made to us for the Park, to place one or two works there every year, and at this ratio even, our work must by the mere presence of the contributions, in the course of time, attract a more wide spread and deserving attention. The examination, criticism and negotiations for purchase of any very important work in their detail, consume much time, and if the Association work slowly, it has progressed steadily, and this leisurely progress has been a security against ruining the natural beauty of the Park, by the introduction there of tawdry and inartistic works, usually so profusely scattered through the popular pleasure resorts of this country, and which some people seem ever anxious to crowd into these places, regardless of their durability or fitness, and at the sacrifice of all good taste. Fairmount Park is pre-eminently so beautiful a place without any artificial adornment that no work should be permitted a location there, unless of approved merit.

The Meade Memorial Fund, the trusteeship of which rests with this Association, amounts at present to \$2,196 $\frac{24}{100}$. It is certainly a subject of regret that so little public interest has been taken in this proposed memorial. This society has offered to contribute \$5,000, if the remainder of a sum sufficient to make \$25,000—for which a suitable equestrian statue could be had—be raised. The cannon given by the U. S. Government for this memorial, now in possession of the Association, are valued at \$7,500; this, with our contingent gift and above amount to credit of fund, would leave only about \$10,000 to be collected from private subscription. At the beginning of next year it is the intention of your Board to send out reliable agents to the various wards, who will have lists prepared containing the names of all who have already subscribed, and contributions will be solicited from those who have not aided it, limiting the sum from each to a dollar. It is hoped sufficient public interest will be evinced in this subject to enable the Association to collect the sum required to erect the proposed memorial. There is no

object among the many demanding subscriptions more worthy of attention than this,—the debt of gratitude Philadelphia owes to her greatest soldier will never be fully paid until her beautiful Park has within its limits a memorial to forever commemorate his soldierly virtues, and consecrated to the principles of which he was such a manly exponent.

It is becoming popular, and perhaps it is proper, to forget the acrimonious issues and to cover up the wounds of civil strife, but there is no patriot who can wish to extend this oblivion to the memories of the heroism displayed in *that* fearful contest. It is the duty of every citizen and to the interest of the republic, to treasure up such memories and seek to perpetuate them in repositories which, defying the approaches of Time, will memorialize youth and growing manhood, that it is a good thing to serve one's country well in the hour of its supreme trial and danger.

The offices of five Trustees elected to serve in your Board for three years expire to-day; it is your duty to elect five to serve in their stead.

The Association is called upon to mourn the death of one of its prominent members, and a member of the Committee on Works of Art, Mr. Matthew Baird. He was one of the original corporators of the society, and has served upon its committee ever since. The Association loses a warm friend and co-adjutor, and the community a very estimable citizen.

Your Board, in concluding this Report, desire to express their thanks for the very generous services tendered to the Association at various times during the year by the following persons and corporations:—The American Steamship Company; The Pennsylvania Rail Road Co.; the several Commissioners of the Park Commission; General Russell Thayer, Superintendent, J. D. Estabrook, the Engineer, and C. H. Miller, Landscape Gardener of the Park, for valuable and judicious advice; to the Chief Engineer of the Water Department,—Dr. W. H. McFadden,—as well as the Water Department of Philadelphia; Messrs. Alex. Murphy & Co., Custom House

Brokers ; and also, to many persons,—members of the society,—the Association is largely indebted for great interest and valuable suggestions, in adding new names to the list of membership, and otherwise advancing its welfare. The whole work of the society is one which must rely mainly upon such disinterested and gratuitous assistance ; and it should be to all, as it is to many, a pleasure to aid in any way every proper undertaking made to render this city attractive and beautiful,—to enhance the ornaments and decorations of its pleasure ground,—Fairmount Park ; to cultivate and spread widely correct and tasteful ideas in Art, and to foster and encourage its use and display by our workmen and people generally. This city is well known abroad as the city of homes and home comforts ; and whilst these essentials have been secured, and are now enjoyed by many, it is every way evidenced that our people are looking beyond this, and are fast acquiring a universal reputation for their liberal patronage and support of institutions and societies which appeal to our sense of the beautiful and the higher developments of our education. This magnificent building,—the Academy of Fine Arts,—in which we are gathered this evening ;—the Academy of Natural Sciences,—our valuable Library buildings,—Zoological Society, and that late creation, the Pennsylvania Museum and School of Industrial Art,—have all sprung out of this feeling, disseminated in and moving the community.

This Association enlists sympathy, and is supported by and encouraged from the same catholicism of taste, and it deserves to be cherished and impress recognition. No one who visits the Park daily, especially in the stifling summer days, can fail to notice to what an enlarged entertainment any ornament placed there must of necessity cater. It is the resting ground,—the royal play-ground of the people, who, weary and tired of the crowded city, seek relaxation ; and the noble province of this society is to make it also the silent school of true instruction and pure enjoyment.

PREAMBLE TO THE CONSTITUTION.

SINCE it is desirable to increase the appreciation and love of art in our midst; to add to the number of its votaries, promote the refinements of life consequent thereon, and encourage artists in the practice of their profession; and—

Since it is commendable to erect statues, busts, and other works of art, to the honor and memory of eminent persons and their deeds, in order that their good example and influence may be more permanently exerted in fostering a spirit of emulation and ambition in our people:—

AND WHEREAS:—These results may be better secured, and the good effects thereof more generally obtained, by the accumulation of objects of art in one inclosure, visited by the greatest number of people:—

AND WHEREAS:—It is desirable to enhance the beauties and attractions of the Park by a means in which all may gladly participate:—

Therefore:—We, whose names are affixed to the following Constitution, have formed ourselves into a Society to be styled the

FAIRMOUNT PARK ART ASSOCIATION,

which Society shall have for its object the accumulation of a fund, by means of annual contributions of small fixed sums of money by the members thereof, and by legacies, donations, etc.; which fund shall be devoted to, and employed in, adorning Fairmount Park with works of art, either of a memorial nature or otherwise.

In consideration of the objects above set forth, we, whose names are subscribed to the following Constitution, agree to fulfill, with honor and good faith, the duties imposed in the said Constitution, and the By-Laws which have been adopted for the rule and government of the said FAIRMOUNT PARK ART ASSOCIATION.
