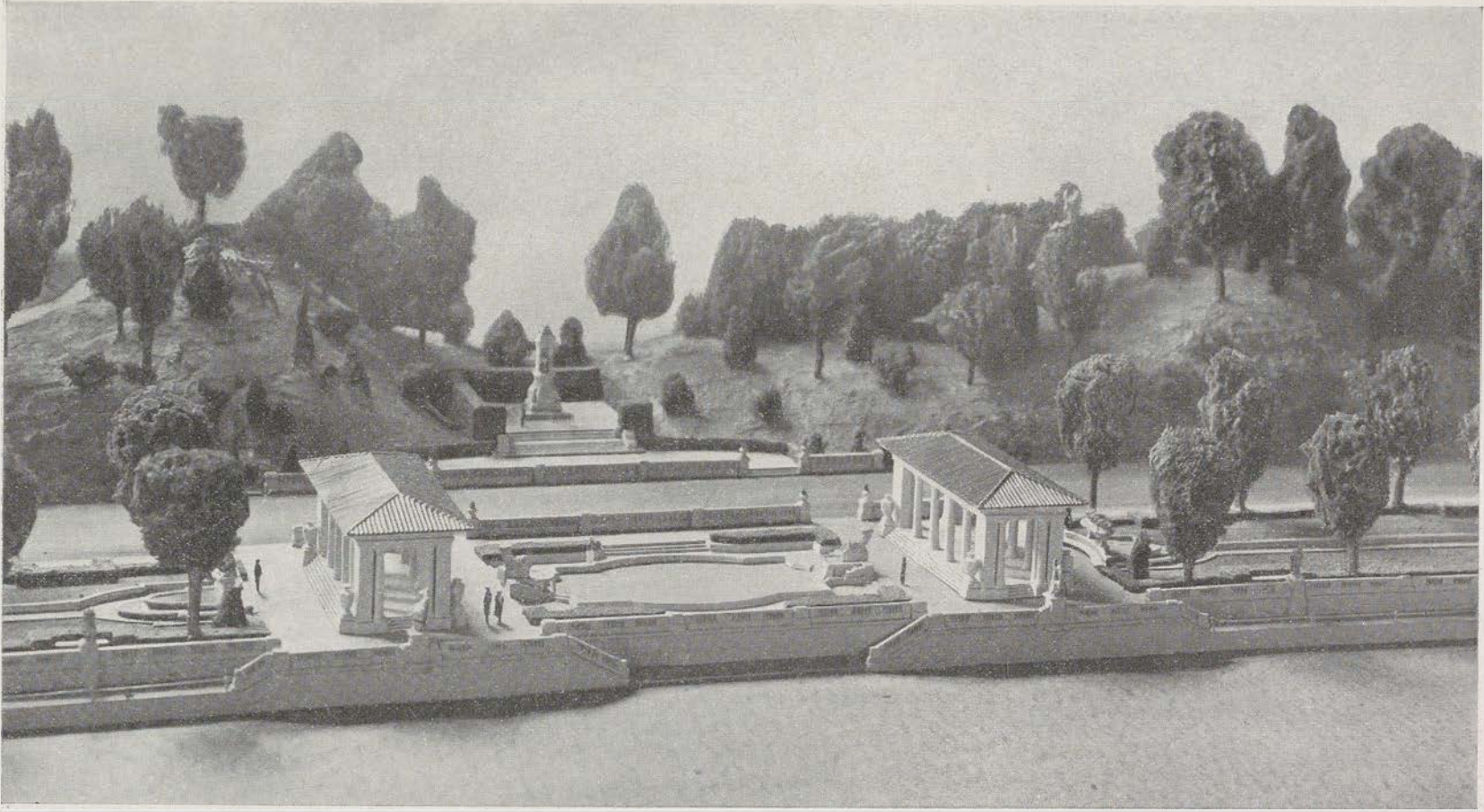
ORGANIZED in 1871 and enlarged in 1888 and again in 1906 to extend the field of its operations to the entire city, as well as to Fairmount Park, the *Fairmount Park Art Association* is believed to represent the oldest existing organization having for its aim the adornment and development along artistic lines of the parks and public places of American cities.

During the forty-five years of its existence the Association has either presented outright or assisted in promoting the presentation to the city of most of the works in Fairmount Park, and such works in the city itself as the fine "Lion and Serpent," by Barye, in Rittenhouse Square, and Elwell's group of "Dickens and Little Nell" in Clarence H. Clark Park, West Philadelphia.

Among the works which have been erected in Fairmount Park are the equestrian statues of General Grant, by French, and of General Meade, by Calder, Dallin's "Medicine Man," Fremiet's "Jeanne d'Arc," Boyle's spirited group of the "Stone Age in America," the Garfield monument by St. Gaudens, Wolff's "Wounded Lioness," which is placed at the entrance to the Zoological Gardens, Cain's "Lioness Bringing a Wild Boar to her Cubs," Kemeys' "Hudson Bay Wolves," Remington's "Cow-boy," the Grand Fountain near the Dauphin Street entrance, the statues of "Night," "Il Penseroso" and "Diana Borghese" in Horticultural Hall, besides many fountains and minor works, including such reproductions as the "Silenus and Infant Bacchus" and the "Wrestlers." In addition to presenting particular works of art to the park and city, the energies of the Association are actively exercised in the study and promotion of all such civic improvements as have reference to City Planning, including the development of the Park System, and the preservation of places of natural beauty or historic interest. As instances of the kind of service along these lines that has already been rendered to the city, the Association can point to the part it has played in the construction of the Fairmount Parkway and the creation of the Art Jury. The Parkway, with the Art Museum as its crowning feature, will, when completed, represent the realization of a project formulated by this Association under whose auspices, and at whose expense, the designs for this magnificent improvement, which were finally accepted by the city, were prepared, and the Art Jury, whose authoritative supervision has been of such enormous help in improving the character of the structures erected in public places in recent years owes in no small degree its existence to the earnest advocacy of the idea which it represents by the Fairmount Part Art Association.

Cast by Bureau Brothers, Philadelphia. Mounted on a
pedestal of Richmond granite, with streams of water pour-
ing from four bronze masks. Placed near Columbia Avenue
entrance to the East Park, south of the great Receiving Reser-
voir, in September, 1884.

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18. **"SILENUS AND THE INFANT BACCHUS"**Bronze

Supposed to be the work of Praxiteles. Reproduced in bronze by Barbedienne, Paris, France, from the original in the Louvre. Purchased by the Association. Erected on a pedestal of granite, on the east side of the Main Drive, half-way between Fairmount Avenue entrance and Brown Street entrance to the old Park, in November, 1885.

19. **"THE WRESTLERS"**Bronze

Reproduced in bronze by Barbedienne, Paris, France, from the original Antique in the Royal Gallery of Florence, Italy. **PRESENTED TO THE ASSOCIATION BY MR. A. J. DRÉXEL.** Mounted on a pedestal of granite, on the west side of the Main Drive, at the foot of Lemon Hill, near Brown Street entrance to the Old Park, in November, 1885.

20. **FACE AND HANDS OF ABRAHAM LINCOLN**Bronze

These casts were taken from the first replicas of the original casts taken from life by Leonard W. Volk, Chicago, April, 1860. Deposited with the Pennsylvania Museum, Memorial Hall, Fairmount Park.

- 21-22. **"FLORENTINE LIONS"**Bronze

Cast by Harrison, Winans & Eastwick, at the Imperial Head Mechanical Works, at Alexandroffsky, Russia, in 1849, from the pair at the entrance to the Imperial Works, which, no doubt, were reproduced from those at the entrance to the Loggia di Lanzi, Florence. Of the two lions, one is ancient, from the Villa Medici, at Rome, the other an imitation by Flaminio Vacca. **PRESENTED TO THE ASSOCIATION BY MRS. A. M. EASTWICK,** widow of a late member of the above firm. Accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, April, 1887, and placed near the Welsh Memorial, West Park.

23. **HEROIC EQUESTRIAN STATUE OF MAJOR-GENERAL
GEORGE GORDON MEADE.**Bronze

A Commission from the Association

The United States Government donated a number of captured cannon, and the Legislature of the State of Pennsylvania appropriated the sum of \$5,000 toward the expense of the granite pedestal; special subscriptions largely aided by the Women's Auxiliary Committee, completed the fund necessary for its erection.

Cast by the Henry-Bonnard Company. Mounted on a pedestal of Pennsylvania granite. Placed north of Memorial Hall. Accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, October 18, 1887, and unveiled with ceremonies participated in by representatives of the military and naval forces of the United States, the Grand Army of the Republic, the National Guard, and by distinguished citizens.

24. "STONE AGE IN AMERICA".....Indian Group, Bronze

Mr. Boyle's spirited group represents an Indian mother defending her children from an attack of wild beasts. A bear's cub, which she has killed with her stone hatchet, lies at her feet, and with her baby clasped to her breast she awaits the attack of the savage mother. The group is among the most masterly works which have been added to the works in the Park, and Mr. Boyle is undoubtedly the first sculptor who has adequately presented the Indians' case in American art. It was cast by Barbedienne, of Paris, and placed in West Park, near the Children's Play Ground, in 1888.

25. "LIONESS CARRYING TO HER YOUNG A WILD BOAR" .Bronze

Placed near the Iron Spring and Lincoln Monument, foot of Lemon Hill, 1888.

26. "EQUESTRIAN STATUE OF JEANNE D'ARC"Bronze

Place des Pyramides, Paris. Purchased by the Association*

Mounted on granite pedestal. Placed near the eastern approach to Girard Avenue Bridge. Accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, November 15, 1890. A replica of this statue has now replaced the one originally erected in Paris and a second replica was erected in Lille, France, in 1912.

27. COLOSSAL EQUESTRIAN GROUP, "LION FIGHTER" ..Bronze

Erected by special subscription, unveiled with imposing military and naval ceremonies, and accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, on the evening of Memorial Day, May 30, 1896; followed by a sylvan fête, under the auspices of the Women's Committee on Entertainment. Placed on the East Park Drive below Girard Avenue Bridge and near the Rond Point Fountains.

30. **HEROIC EQUESTRIAN STATUE OF GEN. U. S. GRANT...Bronze**

BY DANIEL CHESTER FRENCH AND EDWARD C. POTTER

A commission from the Association, erected by means of special subscriptions, together with an appropriation by the City Councils of Philadelphia. Unveiled on "Grant Day," Thursday, April 27, 1899, and accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park. Cast by Bureau Brothers, Philadelphia, and mounted on a pedestal of Jonesboro granite, designed by Frank Miles Day & Bro., Philadelphia.

The unveiling ceremonies were participated in by his Excellency William McKinley, President of the United States, members of his cabinet, Mrs. U. S. Grant, the widow of General Grant, and members of her family, Major-General Miles and many distinguished guests both in military and civil life.

The monument is located at the intersection of the East Park River Drive and Fountain Green Drive in Fairmount Park.

31. **BRONZE SPANISH CANNON, "MILTIADES".....Date, 1743**

32. **BRONZE SPANISH CANNON, "SEMIRAMIS".....Date, 1737**

33. **BRONZE SPANISH MORTAR.....Date, 1731**

The above three pieces, from fortifications in Cuba, are ornamented with carved decorations, including the royal arms of Spain as employed by Philip V and his queen, Elizabeth Farnese.

Presented to Fairmount Park by the Fairmount Park Art Association in 1899, and placed in front of the Columbus Monument on Belmont Avenue. Remounted on appropriate carriages designed by Charles E. Dana and placed on the terrace in front of Memorial Hall, April, 1912.

34. **EQUESTRIAN STATUE, "THE MEDICINE MAN".....Bronze**

BY CYRUS E. DALLIN

Purchased by the Association, and erected in the East Park at the head of Strawberry Hill near the Dauphin Street entrance, on a pedestal of red Westerly granite.

Unveiled December 10, 1903, and formally presented to the City of Philadelphia and the Commissioners of Fairmount Park at the Thirty-second Annual Meeting of this Association on the evening of the same day.

35. **MONUMENTAL MEMORIAL TO PENNSYLVANIA'S
MILITARY AND NAVAL OFFICERS AND MEN DIS-
TINGUISHED FOR GALLANTRY IN THE LATE CIVIL
WAR OF THE UNITED STATES, 1861-1865.**

Erected under bequest of Richard Smith of Philadelphia by his executor and trustees, John B. Gest and the Fidelity Trust Co., the art work under the auspices of the Fairmount Park Art Association.

James H. Windrim and John T. Windrim, architects; expenditure \$500,000.00, 1897-1912.

36. **SUN-DIAL and MARBLE PEDESTAL.** Presented to the City of Philadelphia through this Association, by a member who desires the gift to remain anonymous, and erected in the center of the Sunken Garden in front of Horticultural Hall, in the West Park, in May, 1905.

The dial is of bronze, accurately calculated for the exact spot in which it is placed, and shows the variations for each month of the year and the time at 12 o'clock in twelve principal cities of the world.

The pedestal is the work of Alexander Stirling Calder, and the design includes the twelve signs of the zodiac, and four supporting female figures, emblematic of the four seasons.

37. **JAPANESE TEMPLE-GATE.** Presented to the City of Philadelphia, through this Association, by Messrs. John H. Converse and Samuel M. Vauclain, and erected in the ravine between Memorial and Horticultural Halls in the West Park, near the Lotus-Pond, in December, 1905.

This extremely interesting specimen of the best Japanese work of three hundred years ago, formed part of the official Japanese exhibit at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition in St. Louis in 1904, and was purchased, with its contents, by Messrs. Converse and Vauclain as a gift to the city. The contents of the building, as exhibited at St. Louis, include a superb pair of the usual Temple guardians, Brahma and Indra, and many specimens of Japanese art in wood, metal and fabrics. As the Park Commission is unable at the present time to provide a custodian for the Temple-Gate, these objects have been deposited with the Pennsylvania Museum and School of Industrial Art to be exhibited among its collections at Memorial Hall.

38. EQUESTRIAN STATUE—"COW-BOY."

BY FREDERIC REMINGTON

A Commission from the Association

Located on the East River Drive in Fairmount Park, north of the tunnel near Girard Avenue Bridge. Unveiled and formally presented to the city on June 20, 1908, with appropriate ceremonies. A band of Cow-boys and Indians participated in the exercises.

39. FOUNTAIN FIGURE—"THE DUCK GIRL"

BY PAUL MANSHIP

This work was awarded the George D. Widener Gold Medal for most meritorious work in Sculpture at the Annual Exhibition of the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts in 1914. Purchased by the Association and intended to form part of a comprehensive improvement of the Fairmount Basin.

40. MEMORIAL TABLET TO HERMANN JOSEPH SCHWARZ-MANN.

Erected in Memorial Hall in 1915 to commemorate his services as Principal Assistant and Consulting Engineer of the Commissioners of Fairmount Park from 1868 to 1877 and the designer of many of the most important structures in the Park, including Memorial Hall.

3. **STATUE OF MATTHIAS W. BALDWIN.....Bronze**

This memorial to the founder of the Baldwin Locomotive Works is located at the corner of Broad and Spring Garden Streets, opposite the great industry that bears his name. It is the work of Herbert Adams, the contract being given, and formal presentation of the statue to the city, on June 2, 1906, being made, through this Association, by the firm of Burnham, Williams & Co., proprietors of the Baldwin Locomotive Works.

4. **MARBLE PLAYER.....Plaster**

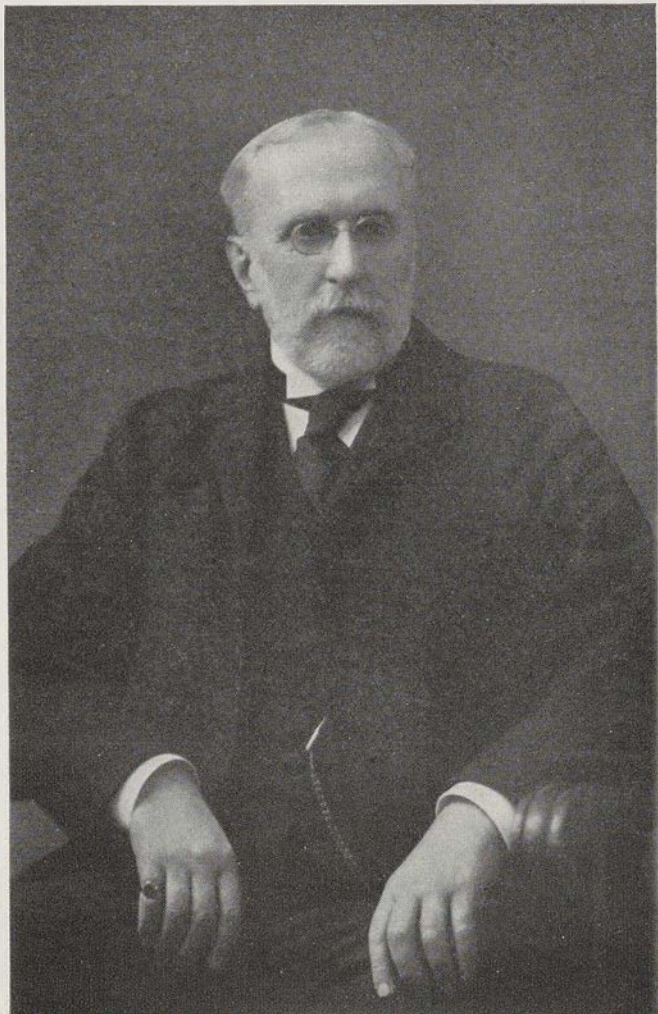

5. **LARGE MOUNTED PHOTOGRAPHS of Grand Fountain, The Medicine Man, Stone Age in America, Lioness Carrying to Her Young a Wild Boar, Jeanne d'Arc, Garfield, Lion and Serpent, The Dying Lioness, Grant, Hudson Bay Wolves and Meade, have been presented by the Association through the Department of Superintendence, and placed in several Public Schools of Philadelphia.**

6. **MEMORIAL TABLET.**

Erected at the entrance to the lot on Orianna Street, which was purchased by the Fairmount Park Art Association with funds subscribed for this purpose by several patriotic societies and public-spirited citizens and improved as a means of protecting Carpenters' Hall in 1911.

FORTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
FAIRMOUNT PARK ART ASSOCIATION

JANUARY 29, 1916.

To the Members of the Fairmount Park Art Association:

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN: Your Board of Trustees presents this, the Forty-fourth Annual Report, as follows:

ELLEN PHILLIPS SAMUEL MEMORIAL.

The Committee on Preliminary Design of this memorial, whose appointment was announced in the last report, has been actively engaged in promoting this important undertaking. Immediately after its appointment in January, 1915, the committee invited Messrs. Edgar V. Seeler, architect, and Charles Grafly, sculptor, to prepare designs for the memorial, and in accepting a report of this committee presented at the February meeting, your Board authorized the execution of a contract with Messrs. Seeler and Grafly for the preparation of such designs, provided that the approval of the Commissioners of Fairmount Park of the general scheme of the memorial, as stated in the will of Mrs. Samuel, be first obtained. An appropriation of \$3,800 from the General Fund, Park Branch, was made to pay for these designs, which were to include (a) a plot plan at the scale of 25 feet to the inch, (b) a relief model at the scale of 10 feet to the inch of that portion of the park immediately relating to the memorial.

The committee at once brought the project to the attention of the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, who at a meeting held March 10, 1915, adopted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of Fairmount Park approve of the general scheme of the memorial to illustrate the history of America, as

indicated in the bequest to the Fairmount Park Art Association contained in the will of Ellen Phillips Samuel, deceased, and of the Association's proposal to secure a comprehensive design for carrying the scheme into effect, upon condition, however, that no work shall be done in execution of the design, until the plans for the general scheme and those showing the details of any portion of the work in immediate contemplation, shall have been submitted to and approved by the Commissioners.

In accordance with this understanding a contract with the two artists mentioned was duly executed and the work of preparing the designs was begun at once, with the result that the plan and the relief model are shown at the meeting at which this report is submitted.

ROBERT MORRIS MEMORIAL.

The misunderstanding in connection with the Robert Morris Memorial, to which reference was made in the last report, has been corrected to the extent of a reconsideration and revision, by the officers of the State Commission, of the result of the competition held in June, 1914, as announced by them, in which the representatives of this Association failed to concur. A meeting of the Jury of Award, called by the chairman of the State Commission, was held at the office of Mr. Roland L. Taylor, Chairman of the Committee on Robert Morris Memorial, Fairmount Park Art Association, on March 13, 1915, at which the following awards were made in accordance with the terms of the original announcement of the competition. Four of the competing sculptors, viz: Richard E. Brooks, Charles Niehaus, Henry H. Kitson and Henry K. Bush-Brown, were invited to enter a second competition in which models made to a uniform scale were to be submitted, each competitor to receive \$500 to reimburse him for the expense of preparing the model. The second competition was held at the office of the secretary of this Association May 1, 1915, and the commission for the memorial awarded by unanimous vote of the jury to Richard E. Brooks of Washington.

The Committee on the Memorial is therefore glad to report real progress, and hopes that in due time Mr. Brooks will produce a very creditable and inspiring work. The committee also notes

the placing of the Parkway under the Park Commission and has confidence that a good position thereon will be allotted to the Memorial.

SCHWARZMANN MEMORIAL TABLET.

As a tribute to the memory of the young Bavarian architect, Hermann Schwarzmänn, to whose talented services Fairmount Park is indebted for a good deal of its artistic development, the Association erected in October, 1915, a tablet in Memorial Hall, of which building Schwarzmänn was the architect. The tablet, which is of brass, is affixed to one of the piers of the rotunda near the entrance to the building, and bears this inscription:

The continued absence of Prof. Cret, who is serving with the French army, has prevented any further development of this project, the commission to prepare a design for which was awarded to Prof. Cret in June, 1914.

THE PARKWAY AND ART MUSEUM.

It is a source of much satisfaction to your Board that it is able to report most encouraging progress of the Parkway and of

the plans for an Art Museum, which, when erected, will not only constitute the crowning feature of this magnificent improvement, but will fittingly signalize the spirit in which it was undertaken and the enlightened purpose which it represents. The actual physical construction of the Parkway from Sixteenth to Seventeenth Streets, and from Nineteenth to Twenty-second Streets, is approaching completion, with the acquisition of the remaining properties included in the plan well advanced and to be materially hastened by recent legislation limiting the time within which properties placed upon the city plan for such purposes must be actually taken.

An Art Museum that shall worthily represent the ideals that its erection and maintenance by this great municipality will imply; that shall be capacious enough to provide adequate accommodations for the collections already possessed by the city, or likely to be attracted to such an institution in the not very distant future; and that shall by its own dignity and beauty set a high standard for the architectural development of this whole improvement, is now virtually assured. Such a building, to occupy the commanding site at Fairmount, was a conspicuous—almost an essential—feature of the plan of the Parkway prepared by this Association in 1907, which was finally accepted by the city government in 1909 as the true solution of a complicated problem which had been discussed for many years, and your Board regards, as a subject of sincere congratulation, the popular, as well as official, approval which the plan as a whole has at last received, supplemented and emphasized, as it is at present, by the energetic progress that has been made with the plans for the Museum.

OTHER PARKS AND PARKWAYS.

In other sections, too, most gratifying progress in civic improvement and embellishment has been made. More than 744 acres have been added to the space devoted to public parks and playgrounds throughout the city during the year and nearly 20 acres more placed on the city plan. Good progress has been made, too, by the movement which sooner or later is bound to be recog-

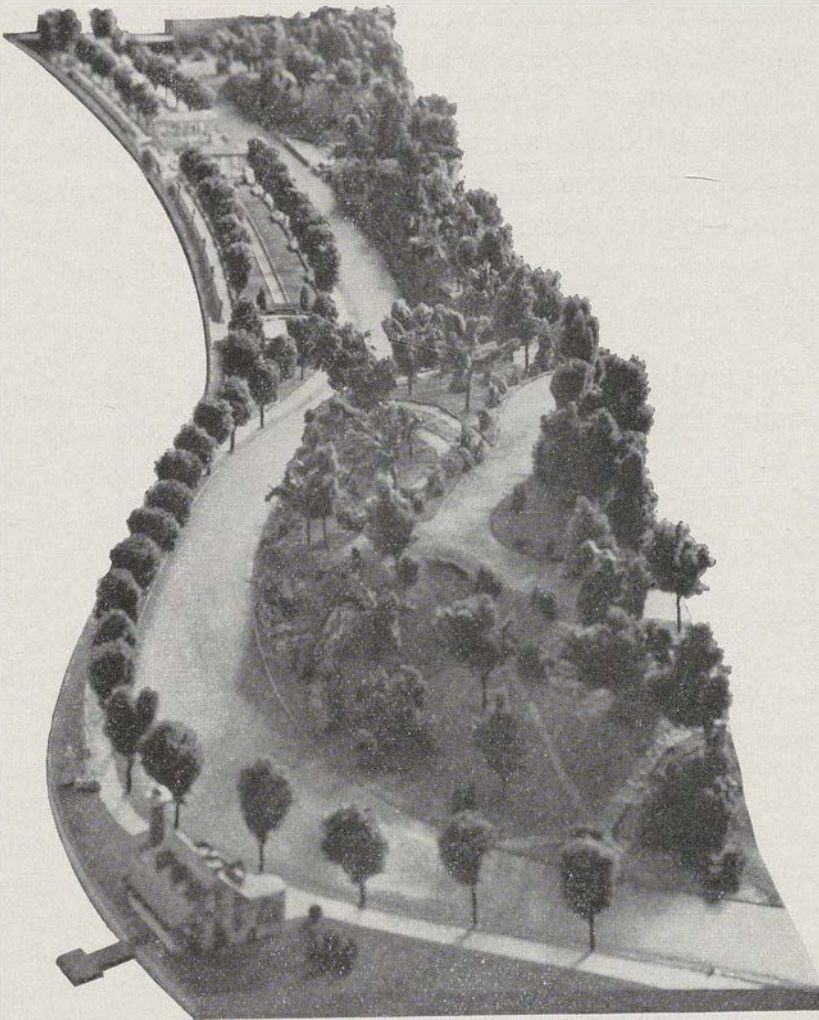
nized as inevitable, to extend the park system far beyond the limits of the city. An appropriation by the last legislature provides for a survey of Fort Hill and Militia Hill in Montgomery County, with a view to the connection of this new and very attractive region with Fairmount Park by extending the Wissahickon Drive.

The Southern Boulevard and League Island Park, which, when completed, will transform what was once a most unpromising region into one of great beauty, are being rapidly pushed to completion, while the redemption and beautification of the banks of the Schuylkill for which this Association has plead so earnestly and so long, seems at last to have attracted something like the attention it deserves, and figures prominently in most current discussion, in official as well as unofficial circles, of the city's needs. Some day the present unsightly and unsanitary neglect of this region will be corrected and forgotten and the banks of this beautiful stream, so rich alike in possibilities of helpful service in the present and in historical association with the past, will furnish parkways from League Island to Valley Forge, to the realization of which much-to-be-desired improvement this Association will have the satisfaction of knowing that it has in no small measure contributed.

MEMBERSHIP.

Your Board begs to remind the members that the Association is rendering important service to the community, the need of which is constantly increasing, and the extent of which is limited only by its resources. It hopes, therefore, that the members will lose no opportunity to make the work of the Association better known and to do what lies in their power to increase its membership and to extend its influence.

The extension of the park system, the creation of new playgrounds and open plazas, and the encouraging progress of the general movement for civic betterment, to which attention has already been called, mean continually increasing opportunities for the kind of service to which the energies of this Association are devoted.

In the expert study of the problems involved in these improvements, as well as in the direct contribution of such works of art as are essential to their complete realization, the Association, and especially the City Branch, will find unlimited possibilities of usefulness. Your Board is particularly desirous, therefore, of strengthening this branch. Under the By-Laws, the income of the Permanent Fund will not become available for the general purposes of the Association as they apply to the City of Philadelphia exclusive of Fairmount Park, until the principal of this fund reaches \$100,000 and your Board earnestly commends this subject to the membership in the hope that this part of the endowment fund may be speedily completed.

OBITUARY.

One member of the Board, Vice-President John T. Morris, died during the year, the sense of loss at his death and of appreciation of his service while living, being expressed in the following resolution which was adopted at a meeting of the Board held November 12, 1915:

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees of the Fairmount Park Art Association desires to record its profound regret at the death, on August 15, 1915, of JOHN T. MORRIS.

One of the foremost citizens of Philadelphia, and always active in promoting the interests of his native city, Mr. Morris became a member of this Association at the time of its incorporation, in 1872. He was elected to the Board of Trustees in 1884 and Vice-President in 1909. As chairman of important committees, especially of that on Works of Art, under whose immediate supervision all the works of art presented to the city, by or through, this Association, have been erected, he was always as efficient in his methods as he was untiring in energy and devotion. To the financial interests of the Association he gave unlimited time and attention, and it is to his good judgment and conscientious service that the present excellent condition of its finances is largely due.

His benefactions were many, but unostentatious; a marked trait in his disposition being his desire to recognize good actions and to encourage good work, in men still living—a very proper stimulus toward the improvement of humanity, and it may truly be said that he was a noble example of Philadelphia citizenship of the highest type.
