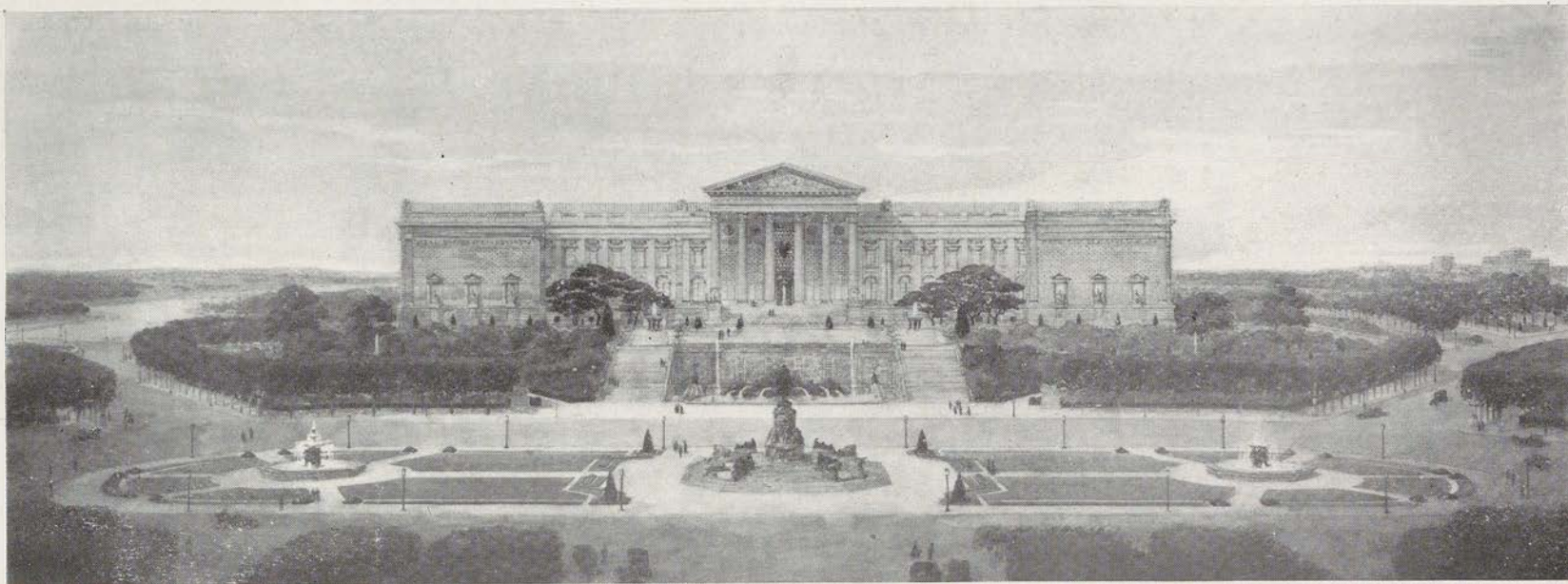

ORGANIZED in 1871 and enlarged in 1888 and again in 1906 to extend the field of its operations to the entire city, as well as to Fairmount Park, the *Fairmount Park Art Association* is believed to represent the oldest existing organization having for its aim the adornment and development along artistic lines of the parks and public places of American cities.

During the forty-eight years of its existence the Association has either presented outright or assisted in promoting the presentation to the city of most of the works in Fairmount Park, and such works in the city itself as the fine "Lion and Serpent," by Barye, in Rittenhouse Square, and Elwell's group of "Dickens and Little Nell" in Clarence H. Clark Park, West Philadelphia.

Among the works which have been erected in Fairmount Park are the equestrian statues of General Grant, by French, and of General Meade, by Calder, Dallin's "Medicine Man," Fremiet's "Jeanne d'Arc," Boyle's spirited group of the "Stone Age in America," the Garfield monument, by St. Gaudens, Wolff's "Wounded Lioness," which is placed at the entrance to the Zoological Gardens, Cain's "Lioness Bringing a Wild Boar to her Cubs," Kemeys' "Hudson Bay Wolves," Remington's "Cow-boy," the Grand Fountain near the Dauphin Street entrance, the statues of "Night," "Il Penseroso" and "Diana Borghese" in Horticultural Hall, besides many fountains and minor works, including such reproductions as the "Silenus and Infant Bacchus" and the "Wrestlers." In addition to presenting particular works of art to the park and city, the energies of the Association are actively exercised in the study and promotion of all such civic improvements as have reference to City Planning, including the development of the Park System, and the preservation of places of natural beauty or historic interest. As instances of the kind of service along these lines that has already been rendered to the city, the Association can point to the part it has played in the construction of the Fairmount Parkway and the creation of the Art Jury. The Parkway, with the Art Museum as its crowning feature, will, when completed, represent the realization of a project formulated by this Association under whose auspices, and at whose expense, the designs for this magnificent improvement, which were finally accepted by the city, were prepared, and the Art Jury, whose authoritative supervision has been of such enormous help in improving the character of the structures erected in public places in recent years, owes in no small degree its existence to the earnest advocacy of the idea which it represents by the Fairmount Park Art Association.

18. **"SILENUS AND THE INFANT BACCHUS".....Bronze**

Supposed to be the work of Praxiteles. Reproduced in bronze by Barbedienne, Paris, France, from the original in the Louvre. Purchased by the Association. Erected on a pedestal of granite, on the east side of the Main Drive, half-way between Fairmount Avenue entrance and Brown Street entrance to the old Park, in November, 1885.

19. **"THE WRESTLERS".....Bronze**

Reproduced in bronze by Barbedienne, Paris, France, from the original Antique in the Royal Gallery of Florence, Italy. **PRESENTED TO THE ASSOCIATION BY MR. A. J. DREXEL.** Mounted on a pedestal of granite, on the west side of the Main Drive, at the foot of Lemon Hill, near Brown Street entrance to the Old Park, in November, 1885.

20. **FACE AND HANDS OF ABRAHAM LINCOLN.....Bronze**

These casts were taken from the first replicas of the original casts taken from life by Leonard W. Volk, Chicago, April, 1860. Deposited with the Pennsylvania Museum, Memorial Hall, Fairmount Park.

21-22. **"FLORENTINE LIONS".....Bronze**

Cast by Harrison, Winans & Eastwick, at the Imperial Head Mechanical Works, at Alexandroffsky, Russia, in 1849, from the pair at the entrance to the Imperial Works, which, no doubt, were reproduced from those at the entrance to the Loggia di Lanzi, Florence. Of the two lions, one is ancient, from the Villa Medici, at Rome, the other an imitation by Flaminio Vacca. **PRESENTED TO THE ASSOCIATION BY MRS. A. M. EASTWICK,** widow of a late member of the above firm. Accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, April, 1887, and placed near the Welsh Memorial, West Park.

23. **HEROIC EQUESTRIAN STATUE OF MAJOR-GENERAL
GEORGE GORDON MEADE.....Bronze**

BY ALEXANDER MILNE CALDER

A Commission from the Association

The United States Government donated a number of captured cannon, and the Legislature of the State of Pennsylvania appropriated the sum of \$5,000 toward the expense of the granite pedestal; special subscriptions largely aided by the Women's Auxiliary Committee, completed the fund necessary for its erection.

Cast by the Henry-Bonnard Company. Mounted on a pedestal of Pennsylvania granite. Placed north of Memorial Hall. Accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, October 18, 1887, and unveiled with ceremonies participated in by representatives of the military and naval forces of the United States, the Grand Army of the Republic, the National Guard, and by distinguished citizens.

24. "STONE AGE IN AMERICA".....Indian Group, Bronze

A Commission from the Association

Mr. Boyle's spirited group represents an Indian mother defending her children from an attack of wild beasts. A bear's cub, which she has killed with her stone hatchet, lies at her feet, and with her baby clasped to her breast she awaits the attack of the savage mother. The group is among the most masterly works which have been added to the works in the Park, and Mr. Boyle is undoubtedly the first sculptor who has adequately presented the Indians' case in American art. It was cast by Barbedienne, of Paris, and placed in West Park, near the Children's Play Ground, in 1888.

25. "LIONESS CARRYING TO HER YOUNG A WILD BOAR".Bronze

Placed near the Iron Spring and Lincoln Monument, foot of Lemon Hill, 1888.

26. "EQUESTRIAN STATUE OF JEANNE D'ARC".....Bronze

Place des Pyramides, Paris. Purchased by the Association*

Mounted on granite pedestal. Placed near the eastern approach to Girard Avenue Bridge. Accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, November 15, 1890. A replica of this statue has now replaced the one originally erected in Paris and a second replica was erected in Lille, France, in 1912.

Erected by special subscription, unveiled with imposing military and naval ceremonies, and accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, on the evening of Memorial Day, May 30, 1896; followed by a sylvan fête, under the auspices of the Women's Committee on Entertainment. Placed on the East Park Drive below Girard Avenue Bridge and near the Rond Point Fountains.

30. **HEROIC EQUESTRIAN STATUE OF GEN. U. S. GRANT.** **Bronze**

BY DANIEL CHESTER FRENCH AND EDWARD C. POTTER

A commission from the Association, erected by means of special subscriptions, together with an appropriation by the City Councils of Philadelphia. Unveiled on "Grant Day," Thursday, April 27, 1899, and accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park. Cast by Bureau Brothers, Philadelphia, and mounted on a pedestal of Jonesboro granite, designed by Frank Miles Day & Bro., Philadelphia.

The unveiling ceremonies were participated in by his Excellency William McKinley, President of the United States, members of his cabinet, Mrs. U. S. Grant, the widow of General Grant, and members of her family, Major-General Miles and many distinguished guests both in military and civil life.

The monument is located at the intersection of the East Park River Drive and Fountain Green Drive in Fairmount Park.

31. **BRONZE SPANISH CANNON, "MILTIADES"** **Date, 1743**

32. **BRONZE SPANISH CANNON, "SEMIRAMIS"** **Date, 1737**

33. **BRONZE SPANISH MORTAR** **Date, 1731**

The above three pieces, from fortifications in Cuba, are ornamented with carved decorations, including the royal arms of Spain as employed by Philip V and his queen, Elizabeth Farnese.

Presented to Fairmount Park by the Fairmount Park Art Association in 1899, and placed in front of the Columbus Monument on Belmont Avenue. Remounted on appropriate carriages designed by Charles E. Dana and placed on the terrace in front of Memorial Hall, April, 1912.

34. **EQUESTRIAN STATUE, "THE MEDICINE MAN"** **Bronze**

BY CYRUS E. DALLIN

Purchased by the Association, and erected in the East Park at the head of Strawberry Hill near the Dauphin Street entrance, on a pedestal of red Westerly granite.

Unveiled December 10, 1903, and formally presented to the City of Philadelphia and the Commissioners of Fairmount Park at the Thirty-second Annual Meeting of this Association on the evening of the same day.

35. **MONUMENTAL MEMORIAL TO PENNSYLVANIA'S MILITARY AND NAVAL OFFICERS AND MEN DISTINGUISHED FOR GALLANTRY IN THE LATE CIVIL WAR OF THE UNITED STATES, 1861-1865.**

Erected under bequest of Richard Smith of Philadelphia by his executor and trustees, John B. Gest and the Fidelity Trust Co., the art work under the auspices of the Fairmount Park Art Association.

36. SUN-DIAL AND MARBLE PEDESTAL.

Presented to the City of Philadelphia through this Association, by a member who desires the gift to remain anonymous, and erected in the center of the Sunken Garden in front of Horticultural Hall, in the West Park, in May, 1905.

The dial is of bronze, accurately calculated for the exact spot in which it is placed, and shows the variations for each month of the year and the time at 12 o'clock in twelve principal cities of the world.

The pedestal is the work of Alexander Stirling Calder, and the design includes the twelve signs of the zodiac, and four supporting female figures, emblematic of the four seasons.

37. JAPANESE TEMPLE-GATE.

Presented to the City of Philadelphia, through this Association, by Messrs. John H. Converse and Samuel M. Vauclain, and erected in the ravine between Memorial and Horticultural Halls in the West Park, near the Lotus-Pond, in December, 1905.

This extremely interesting specimen of the best Japanese work of three hundred years ago, formed part of the official Japanese exhibit at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition in St. Louis in 1904, and was purchased, with its contents, by Messrs. Converse and Vauclain as a gift to the city. The contents of the building, as exhibited at St. Louis, include a superb pair of the usual Temple guardians, Brahma and Indra, and many specimens of Japanese art in wood, metal and fabrics. As the Park Commission is unable at the present time to provide a custodian for the Temple-Gate, these objects have been deposited with the Pennsylvania Museum and School of Industrial Art to be exhibited among its collections at Memorial Hall.

38. EQUESTRIAN STATUE—"COW-BOY."

BY FREDERIC REMINGTON

A Commission from the Association

Located on the East River Drive in Fairmount Park, north of the tunnel near Girard Avenue Bridge. Unveiled and formally presented to the city on June 20, 1908, with appropriate ceremonies. A band of Cow-boys and Indians participated in the exercises.

39. FOUNTAIN FIGURE—"THE DUCK GIRL."

BY PAUL MANSHIP

This work was awarded the George D. Widener Gold Medal for most meritorious work in Sculpture at the Annual Exhibition of the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts in 1914. Purchased by the Association and transferred to the Commissioners of Fairmount Park 1916, for erection in "Cloverly," Germantown.

0. MEMORIAL TABLET TO HERMANN JOSEPH SCHWARZ-MANN.

Erected in Memorial Hall in 1915 to commemorate his services as Principal Assistant and Consulting Engineer of the Commissioners of Fairmount Park from 1868 to 1877 and the designer of many of the most important structures in the Park, including Memorial Hall.

3. STATUE OF MATTHIAS W. BALDWIN.....Bronze

This memorial to the founder of the Baldwin Locomotive Works is located at the corner of Broad and Spring Garden Streets, opposite the great industry that bears his name. It is the work of Herbert Adams, the contract being given, and formal presentation of the statue to the city, on June 2, 1906, being made, through this Association, by the firm of Burnham, Williams & Co., proprietors of the Baldwin Locomotive Works.

6. **MEMORIAL TABLET.**

Erected at the entrance to the lot on Orianna Street, which was purchased by the Fairmount Park Art Association with funds subscribed for this purpose by several patriotic societies and public-spirited citizens and improved as a means of protecting Carpenters' Hall in 1911.

FORTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

FAIRMOUNT PARK ART ASSOCIATION

To the Members of the Fairmount Park Art Association:

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN: Your Board of Trustees presents this, its Forty-sixth Annual Report, as follows:

ELLEN PHILLIPS SAMUEL MEMORIAL

Following the erection in Fairmount Park of the model in staff of a section of the proposed Ellen Phillips Samuel Memorial, which was noted in the last annual report, Mr. Samuel renewed the very generous offer, which he had made when the legacy providing for the memorial was first announced, to anticipate the fulfilment of the terms of the bequest by erecting, himself, the first of the series of statues emblematic of the history of America, which was to constitute the principal feature of the memorial. Mr. Samuel has been for many years a careful student of early American history and has become convinced of the validity of the claims of the Norseman, Thorfinn Karlsefni, to be accorded the first place in the series of statues. Mr. Samuel has also been very favorably impressed by the work of an Icelandic sculptor, Mr. Einar Jonsson, who has submitted a sketch model for the statue of Karlsefni and is now engaged under a commission from Mr. Samuel in the preparation of a full size model, which he hopes to complete by the spring, although the actual casting of the statue may be delayed during the continuance of the war.

ROBERT MORRIS MEMORIAL

Your Board is glad to report that the unexpected delay in the execution of a contract with the sculptor of the Robert Morris

Memorial, Mr. Richard E. Brooks, has been terminated and the contract was signed by the Chairman of the State Commission on behalf of the General Committee in March 1917. An agreement was also at the same time executed by the State Commission, the Pennsylvania Bankers' Association and the Fairmount Park Art Association, by which the Commission is to pay two-thirds of all costs of the Memorial, the other two associations to pay the remaining one-third.

In accordance with the contract the design for the memorial and a half-size working model of the statue of Robert Morris were submitted in October last at a joint meeting of the Committee of this Association having the memorial in charge and the Art Jury of Philadelphia, whose approval of the design and location is indispensable to the successful realization of the project. The model of the statue was approved as a work of art by the representatives of both bodies, who were present at the joint meeting, but, as the recent progress in the development of the Fairmount Parkway has made available a site for the statue much more spacious and commanding than the one which was tentatively considered in connection with the design as originally submitted, the Art Jury, with the concurrence of the representatives of this Association, requested the submission of a revised design for the memorial as a whole more appropriate to the character of the site on the Parkway, which it is now possible definitely to designate for this purpose. The view of the matter, which this request represents, commended itself to the sculptor, who was also present at the meeting and who at once agreed to revise the design in accordance with the recommendations made at the meeting. Your Board feels confident that a memorial in every way worthy of its distinguished subject and of the important position which it will occupy near the entrance to the most monumental improvement ever undertaken by the city, is now assured.

SHAKESPEARE MEMORIAL

The Shakespeare Memorial, the acquisition of a fund for which was noted in the last report, has been made the subject of much careful study during the year. The all-important question

of a suitable site, the determination of which constitutes so indispensable a preliminary to any profitable study of the design, has naturally received first consideration and with the sympathetic co-operation of the Commissioners of Fairmount Park it has been definitely decided that the Memorial should be treated as a feature of the embellishment of the Parkway in front of the main entrance to the Public Library facing Logan Square. As the character which the development of this entire section will assume is yet undetermined, it is impossible to indicate at this time either the exact location or the form which the Memorial will assume, but the matter is in competent hands and is being considered in the best possible way, as an essential feature of a comprehensive scheme of improvement for this part of the city.

GRIFFITH BEQUEST

By the will of Paul Griffith who died June 21, 1917, two life size marble figures of Italian workmanship, "Rebecca at the Well" and "Feeding the Doves," were bequeathed to this Association. Mr. Griffith was a Life Member of the Association who took the deepest interest in its work. He always made it a point to attend its meetings and this bequest is only one of many expressions on his part, of his sympathy with, and desire to promote, the purposes which the Fairmount Park Art Association exists to serve.

The marbles, which were Mr. Griffith's most valued possessions, have been duly accepted by your Board and their suitable installation, preferably in connection with the kind of indoor gardening effects to which they will readily lend themselves, will be made the subject of early and careful study on the part of the Board.

FUND FOR A MEMORIAL TO FLYING MEN

The nucleus of a fund to provide for a memorial to the flying men of Pennsylvania who fall in the war, has been created by a gift for this purpose, which was made to the Association in September by the Aero Club of Pennsylvania. The letter from the Club announcing this action is as follows:

That the Trustees of this fund shall be the Fairmount Park Art Association and that said Association shall have full power to determine the kind and style of memorial; and the time of its dedication and its location, either in the city of Philadelphia or Fairmount Park.

The Aero Club of Pennsylvania, having a large part of its membership in the service of the Flying Arm of the Navy and Army, and Marine Corps, as well as Foreign Esquadrilles, encloses herewith a check to the order of the Fairmount Park Art Association for \$100 to start this fund.

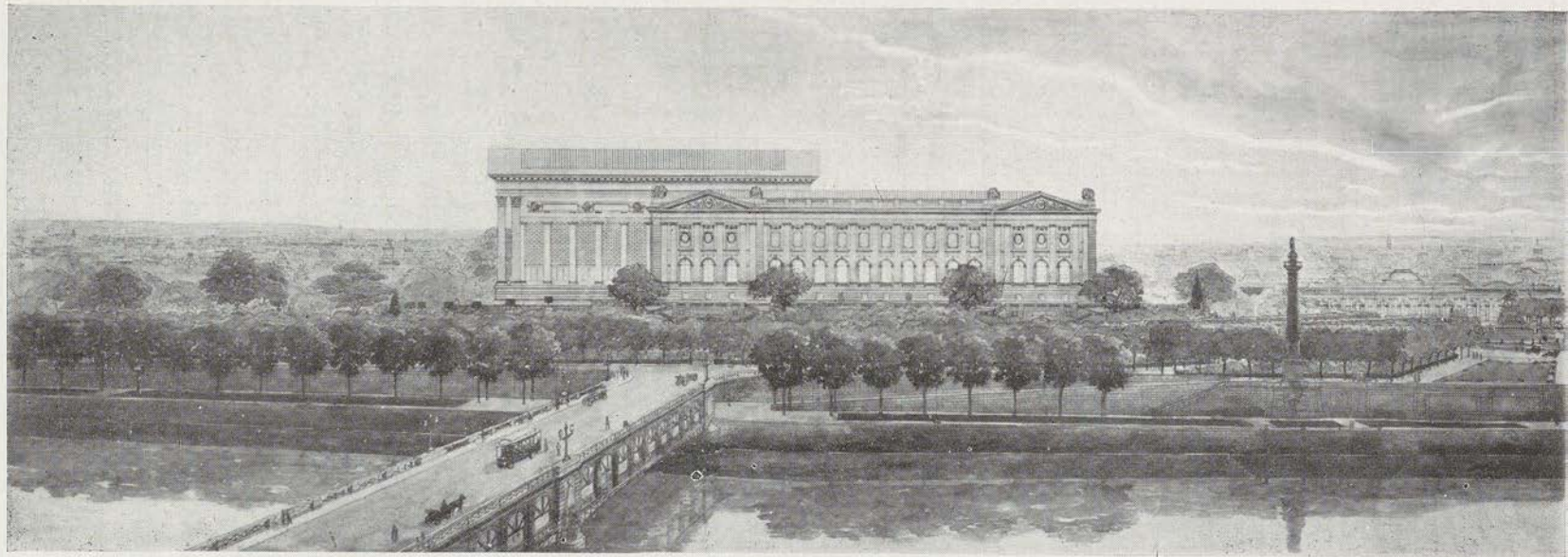
At the regular monthly meeting of your Board, held November 9th, this offer was accepted by the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees of the Fairmount Park Art Association desires to convey to the Aero Club of Pennsylvania its appreciation of the patriotic sentiment shown in the establishment of a fund for the erection of a Monumental Memorial to the flying men of Pennsylvania who fall in the great war for human liberty, and be it further

Resolved, On behalf of this Association, that the Board of Trustees accepts the Trusteeship of this fund, in accordance with the request of the Aero Club of Pennsylvania, with appreciation of the honor which that request implies, and pledges its cordial co-operation in this enterprise.

THE PARKWAY

Satisfactory progress has been made with the Fairmount Parkway, which will be open for travel throughout its entire length in a very few months. For good and sufficient reasons, connected with certain opportunities for public service incident

to the war, the demolition of a few of the buildings on the line of this improvement has been temporarily postponed. They are not of sufficient importance, however, seriously to interfere with the practical completion of the roadway along the lines already shown in the design prepared by this Association in 1907 and formally adopted by the city in 1909. The crowning feature of this design, which your Board has always regarded as of paramount importance and to the promotion of which it has devoted a great deal of attention, is the art centre to be created at the head of the Parkway by the erection in this locality of a group of buildings, of which the Municipal Art Museum on Fairmount will constitute the central member, to be flanked on the opposite sides of the plaza at the foot of the hill, by the buildings of the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts and the Pennsylvania Museum and School of Industrial Art. The plans for the Municipal Art Museum, which were already well advanced when the last report of this Association was issued, have since been made the subject of much careful consideration by the Art Jury. Recognizing the important part which this building is destined to play in the development of this great improvement and the influence it is bound to exert in determining the architectural character of this entire section, which it will easily dominate owing to its remarkable location at an elevation high enough to command the Schuylkill Valley to the north and west through the existing Fairmount Park and the not less important Schuylkill embankments of the future, extending southward to League Island, as well as the entire length of the Parkway from Fairmount to the City Hall, the Jury wisely determined to secure the best service available and during the year has had the assistance of such eminent advisers as Mr. Fenner, of McKim, Meade & White, Mr. Arnold W. Brunner and Mr. John Russell Pope of New York and M. Jacques Greber of Paris, as the result of whose expert study the design embodied in the model, a view of which was printed in the last report, has been to a certain extent modified and improved and the project of the construction of the Museum correspondingly advanced, while the whole plan of the Parkway, including the proposed buildings which it will contain, has been restudied as an integral

part of a much greater city planning project, resulting in the preparation of definite detailed plans for a comprehensive development of the city, which can be gradually carried into execution as time and money will permit.

CITY PLANNING

This list of the particular subjects which have engaged the attention of your Board, is a forcible reminder of the broadening of the aims and extension of the activities of the Association, which the identification of its efforts with the great movement for city planning implies. This movement undoubtedly constitutes the most encouraging sign of municipal progress which is in evidence at the present time and the Fairmount Park Art Association may fairly claim, and is indeed very generally accorded, a foremost place among the agencies which initiated and have from the first consistently promoted it. Your Board has devoted a great deal of attention to this work. It is always represented by delegates at the conventions and general meetings that are called for the discussion of this and other allied subjects and in many ways, one of which consists in aiding in the distribution of the literature of the movement, is continually rendering what it believes to be a very valuable service to the art interests of the community.

MEMBERSHIP

Your Board feels that this enlargement of the purposes of the Association, with the corresponding increase in the opportunities for service which have resulted from it, ought to make a strong appeal for new members and for augmenting the financial resources of the Association, especially those of the City Branch, either by direct contributions to the endowment fund or by the creation of perpetual memberships in memoriam, which has, to a considerable extent, commended itself in the past as a method of permanently associating the memory of a beneficent personal influence with the aims and ideals for which the Association stands and which it will continue to serve to the limit of its resources through all the years that are to come.

FORTY-SIXTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE FAIRMOUNT PARK ART ASSOCIATION

The Forty-sixth Annual Meeting of the Fairmount Park Art Association was held in the Clover Room of the Bellevue-Stratford Hotel, on Wednesday, January 30, 1918, at 12 o'clock noon.

About one hundred and fifty members and guests were present. President Cohen occupied the chair.

The minutes of the previous meeting, copies of which had been sent to all members, were, on motion, duly seconded, approved, and the reading was dispensed with.

The Forty-sixth Annual Report of the Board of Trustees was presented and read by the Secretary. On motion of Col. Thomas S. Harrison, the report was accepted and referred to the incoming Board of Trustees, and the Secretary was instructed to have the usual number of copies printed and distributed.

The Treasurer's Report was read in summary, and accepted.

The election of six trustees for the ensuing term of three years, and until their successors shall be chosen, being next in order, the following nominations were made by Mr. Theodore Justice. On motion, duly seconded, the nominations were closed, and the Secretary was instructed to cast one ballot for the ticket as nominated. This was done, and the following gentlemen were declared elected:

The following resolution, which was offered by Mr. Charles L. Borie, and duly seconded, was unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, The Fairmount Park Art Association presented at its 36th Annual Meeting, held December 12, 1907, "A Report of the Commission

employed by them to study the Entrance of the Philadelphia Parkway into Fairmount Park," devoted that meeting to a full discussion of the subject, and adequately published the result in illustrated pamphlet form;

Resolved, That this Association request the Trustees to publish, in suitable form, the result of the studies made for the Fairmount Park Commission by Mr. Jacques Greber, embodying the development of this project inaugurated by this Association.

A recess was then taken, during which Mr. Joseph A. Steinmetz, President of the Aero Club of Pennsylvania, delivered an illustrated address on "The Aeroplane in War."

At the close of the address by Mr. Steinmetz, the meeting was reconvened and was addressed by Mr. Joseph E. Widener on the nature and extent of the work that had recently been done in developing the studies for the Parkway, the river embankments, and city squares with their connecting tree-lined roadways which were made and published under the auspices of this Association in 1907. This more recent work which embraced an exhaustive study in detail of the landscape architecture of the whole comprehensive scheme as well as suggestions for the architectural development of the Parkway had been done for the Commissioners of Fairmount Park by the distinguished landscape architect, Mr. Jacques Greber, whose designs were publicly exhibited for the first time at this meeting.

The meeting was then adjourned.
