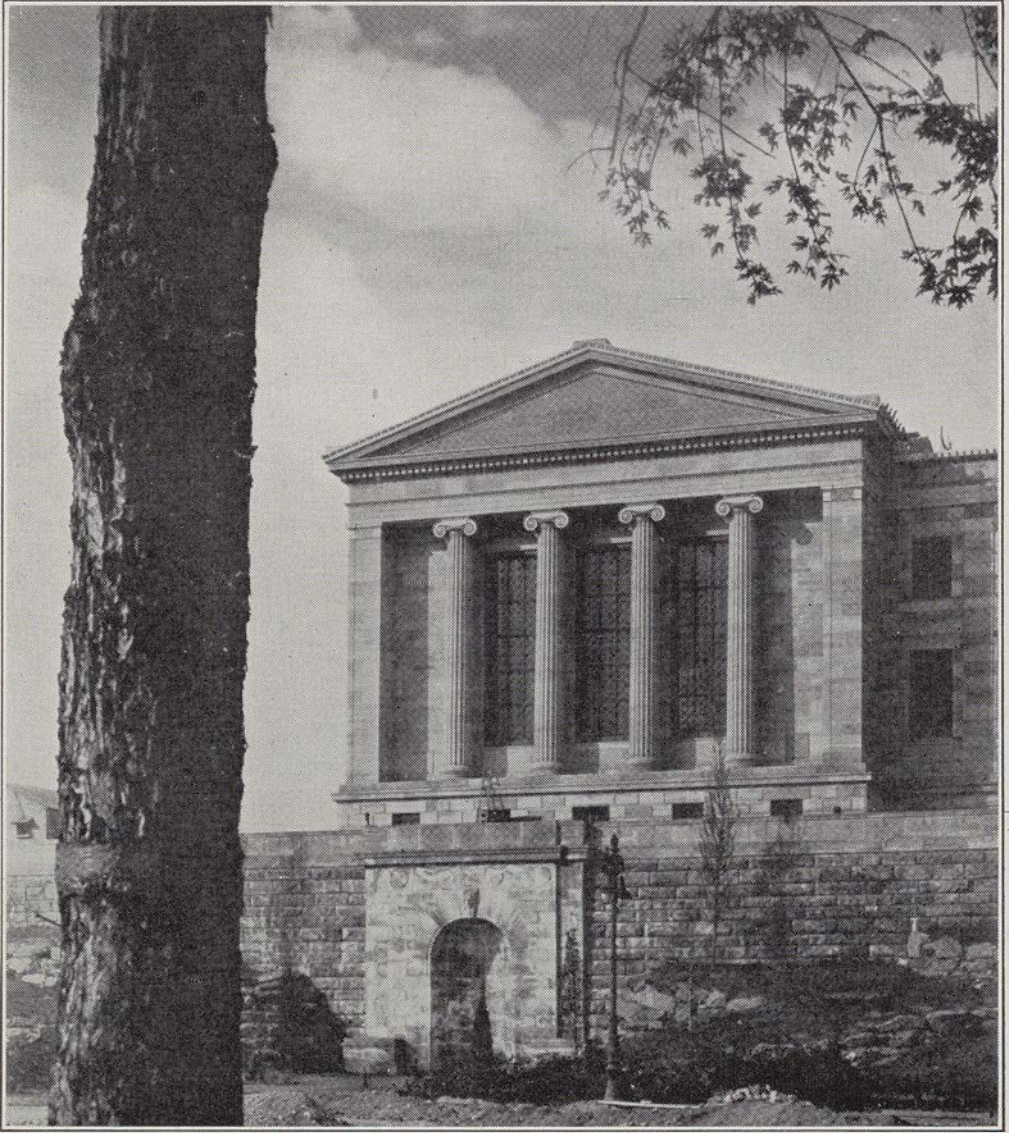
ORGANIZED in 1871 and enlarged in 1888 and again in 1906 to extend the field of its operations to the entire city, as well as to Fairmount Park, the Fairmount Park Art Association is believed to represent the oldest existing organization having for its aim the adornment and development along artistic lines of the parks and public places of American cities.

During the fifty-four years of its existence the Association has either presented outright or assisted in promoting the presentation to the city of most of the works in Fairmount Park and such works in the city itself as the fine "Lion and Serpent," by Barye, and the "Billy Goat," by Albert Laessle, in Rittenhouse Square; Elwell's group of "Dickens and Little Nell" in Clarence H. Clark Park, West Philadelphia; and the "Robert Morris," by Paul Bartlett, on the steps of the Customhouse.

Among the works which have been erected in Fairmount Park are the equestrian statues of General Grant, by French, and of General Meade, by Calder, Dallin's "Medicine Man," Fremiet's "Jeanne d'Arc," Boyle's spirited group of the "Stone Age in America" the Garfield monument, by St. Gaudens, Wolff's "Wounded Lioness," which is placed at the entrance to the Zoological Gardens, Cain's "Lioness Bringing a Wild Boar to Her Cubs," Kemeys' "Hudson Bay Wolves," Remington's "Cow-boy," the Grand Fountain near the Dauphin Street entrance, the statues of "Night," "Il Penseroso" and "Diana Borghese" in Horticultural Hall, besides many fountains and minor works, including such reproductions as the "Silenus and Infant Bacchus" and the "Wrestlers."

In addition to presenting particular works of art to the park and city, the energies of the Association are actively exercised in the study and promotion of all such civic improvements as have reference to City Planning, including the development of the Park System, and the preservation of places of natural beauty or historic interest. As instances of the kind of service along these lines that has already been rendered to the city, the Association can point to the part it has played in the construction of the Fairmount Parkway and the creation of the Art Jury and the State Art Commission. The Parkway, with the Art Museum as its crowning feature, will, when completed, represent the realization of a project formulated by this Association, under whose auspices and at whose expense the designs for this magnificent improvement, which were finally accepted by the city, were prepared, and the Art Jury, whose authoritative supervision has been of such efficient help in improving the character of the structures erected in public places in recent years, owes in no small degree its existence to the earnest advocacy of the idea which it represents by the Fairmount Park Art Association.

The reclamation of the banks of the lower Schuylkill, now begun, is a project to which the Association has devoted itself for years.

BY THOM
TRANSFERRED TO THE ASSOCIATION BY THE TRUSTEES OF FRANKLIN INSTITUTE. Accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, November 10, 1877. Placed on the River Drive under a rustic shelter, opposite the boat houses.
9. **DRINKING FOUNTAIN**Granite
PRESENTED TO THE ASSOCIATION BY MRS. R. D. WOOD. Accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, December 8, 1877. Placed on the Wissahickon Drive, near the site of the Old Log Cabin.
- 10-14. **FIVE FOUNTAINS**Bronzed Iron
Replicas of the Fountains, Rond Point, Champs Elysees, Paris.
Cast at Paris, France, at the Foundry of Val D'Osne. Purchased by the Association and erected with basins, hydraulic fitments, etc. at the expense of the Association in the Park near the Lincoln Monument and along the East River Drive. Accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, December 8, 1877.
15. **HORSE TROUGH**Italian Marble
PRESENTED BY CLARENCE S. KATES. Accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, December 15, 1878, and placed on the Wissahickon Drive, near the site of the Old Log Cabin
16. **GRAND FOUNTAIN**Bronzed Iron
Purchased by the Association and erected with basin-hydraulic fitments, etc., at the expense of the Association, in the East Park, near the Dauphin Street entrance. Accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, June 19, 1879.
17. **FOUNTAIN OF "ORESTES AND PYLADES,"**
Bronze Group
BY CARL STEINHAEUSER, OF CARLSRUHE, GERMANY
Cast by Bureau Brothers, Philadelphia. Mounted on a pedestal of Richmond granite, with streams of water pouring from four bronze masks. Placed near Columbia Avenue entrance to the East Park, south of the great Receiving Reservoir, in September, 1884.

18. **"SILENUS AND THE INFANT BACCHUS"Bronze**

Supposed to be the work of Praxiteles. Reproduced in bronze by Barbedienne, Paris, France, from the original in the Louvre. Purchased by the Association. Erected on a pedestal of granite, on the east side of the Main Drive, half-way between Fairmount Avenue entrance and Brown Street entrance to the old Park, in November, 1885.

19. **"THE WRESTLERS"Bronze**

Reproduced in bronze by Barbedienne, Paris, France, from the original Antique in the Royal Gallery of Florence, Italy. **PRESENTED TO THE ASSOCIATION BY MR. A. J. DREXEL.** Mounted on a pedestal of granite, on the west side of the Main Drive, at the foot of Lemon Hill, near Brown Street entrance to the old Park, in November, 1885.

20. **FACE AND HANDS OF ABRAHAM LINCOLNBronze**

These casts were taken from the first replicas of the original casts taken from life by Leonard W. Volk, Chicago, April, 1860. Deposited with the Pennsylvania Museum, Memorial Hall, Fairmount Park.

21-22. **"FLORENTINE LIONS"Bronze**

Cast by Harrison, Winans & Eastwick, at the Imperial Head Mechanical Works, at Alexandroffsky, Russia, in 1849, from the pair at the entrance to the Imperial Works, which, no doubt, were reproduced from those at the entrance to the Loggia di Lanzi, Florence. Of the two lions, one is ancient, from the Villa Medici, at Rome, the other an imitation by Flaminio Vacca. **PRESENTED TO THE ASSOCIATION BY MRS. A. M. EASTWICK,** widow of a late member of the above firm. Accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, April, 1887, and placed near the Welsh Memorial, West Park.

23. **EQUESTRIAN STATUE OF MAJOR-GENERAL
GEORGE GORDON MEADEBronze**

BY ALEXANDER MILNE CALDER

A Commission from the Association

The United States Government donated a number of captured cannon, and the Legislature of the State of Pennsylvania appropriated the sum of \$5000 toward the expense of the granite pedestal; special subscriptions, largely aided by the Women's Auxiliary Committee, completed the fund necessary for its erection.

Cast by the Henry-Bonnard Company. Mounted on a pedestal of Pennsylvania granite. Placed north of Memorial Hall. Accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, October 18, 1887, and unveiled with ceremonies participated in by representatives of the military and naval forces of the United States, the Grand Army of the Republic, the National Guard, and by distinguished citizens.

24. "STONE AGE IN AMERICA"Bronze

BY JOHN J. BOYLE

A Commission from the Association

Mr. Boyle's spirited group represents an Indian mother defending her children from an attack of wild beasts. A bear's cub, which she has killed with her stone hatchet, lies at her feet, and with her baby clasped to her breast she awaits the attack of the savage mother. The group is among the most masterly works which have been added to the works in the Park, and Mr. Boyle is undoubtedly the first sculptor who has adequately presented the Indians' case in American art. It was cast by Barbedienne, of Paris, and placed in West Park, near the Children's Play Ground, in 1888.

25. "LIONESS CARRYING TO HER YOUNG A WILD BOAR"Bronze

Placed near the Iron Spring and Lincoln Monument, foot of Lemon Hill, 1888.

26. EQUESTRIAN STATUE, "JEANNE D'ARC"Bronze

The Sculptor's more mature conception of the same subject that he erected in 1874 Place des Pyramids, Paris. Purchased by the Association

Mounted on granite pedestal. Placed near the eastern approach to Girard Avenue Bridge. Accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, November 15, 1890. A replica of this statue has now replaced the one originally erected in Paris and a second replica was erected in Lille, France, in 1912.

A Commission from the Association

Erected by special subscription, unveiled with imposing military and naval ceremonies, and accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, on the evening of Memorial Day, May 30, 1896; followed by a sylvan fete, under the auspices of the Women's Committee on Entertainment. Placed on the East River Drive below Girard Avenue Bridge and near the Rond Point Fountains.

30. **EQUESTRIAN STATUE OF GEN. U. S. GRANT** ...Bronze

BY DANIEL CHESTER FRENCH AND EDWARD C. POTTER

A commission from the Association, erected by means of special subscriptions, together with an appropriation by the City Councils of Philadelphia. Unveiled on "Grant Day," Thursday, April 27, 1899, and accepted by the Commissioners of Fairmount Park. Cast by Bureau Brothers, Philadelphia, mounted on a pedestal of Jonesboro granite, designed by Frank Miles Day & Bro., Philadelphia, and placed at the intersection of the East River Drive and Fountain Green Drive in Fairmount Park.

31. **BRONZE SPANISH CANNON, "MILTIADES"**..Date, 1743

33. **BRONZE SPANISH MORTAR**Date, 1731

The above three pieces, from fortifications in Cuba, are ornamented with carved decorations, including the royal arms of Spain as employed by Philip V and his queen, Elizabeth Farnese.

Presented to Fairmount Park by the Fairmount Park Art Association in 1899, and placed in front of the Columbus Monument on Belmont Avenue. Remounted on appropriate carriages designed by Charles E. Dana and placed on the terrace in front of Memorial Hall, April, 1912.

34. **EQUESTRIAN STATUE, "THE MEDICINE MAN,"**Bronze

BY CYRUS E. DALLIN

Purchased by the Association, and erected in the East Park at the head of Strawberry Hill near the Dauphin Street entrance, on a pedestal of red Westerly granite.

Unveiled December 10, 1903, and formally presented to the City of Philadelphia and the Commissioners of Fairmount Park at the Thirty-second Annual Meeting of this Association on the evening of the same day.

35. **MONUMENTAL MEMORIAL TO PENNSYLVANIA'S MILITARY AND NAVAL OFFICERS AND MEN DISTINGUISHED FOR GALLANTRY IN THE CIVIL WAR OF THE UNITED STATES, 1861-1865.**

Erected under bequest of Richard Smith, of Philadelphia, by his executors and trustees, John B. Gest and the Fidelity Trust Co., the art work under the auspices of the Fairmount Park Art Association. James H. Windrim and John T. Windrim, architects, 1897-1912.

36. **SUN-DIAL AND MARBLE PEDESTAL**

Presented to the City of Philadelphia through this Association by a member who desires the gift to remain anonymous and erected in the center of the Sunken Garden in front of Horticultural Hall, in the West Park, in May, 1905.

The dial is of bronze, accurately calculated for the exact spot in which it is placed, and shows the variations for each month of the year and the time at 12 o'clock in twelve principal cities of the world.

The pedestal is the work of Alexander Stirling Calder, and the design includes the twelve signs of the zodiac, and four supporting female figures, emblematic of the four seasons.

37. JAPANESE TEMPLE GATE

Presented to the City of Philadelphia, through this Association, by Messrs. John H. Converse and Samuel M. Vauclain, and erected in the ravine between Memorial and Horticultural Halls in the West Park, near the Lotus Pond, in December, 1905.

This extremely interesting specimen of the best Japanese work of three hundred years ago formed part of the official Japanese exhibit at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition in St. Louis in 1904, and was purchased, with its contents, by Messrs. Converse and Vauclain as a gift to the city. The contents of the building, as exhibited at St. Louis, include a superb pair of the usual Temple guardians, Brahma and Indra, and many specimens of Japanese art in wood, metal and fabrics. These objects have been deposited with the Pennsylvania Museum and School of Industrial Art to be exhibited at Memorial Hall.

38. EQUESTRIAN STATUE, "COW-BOY"Bronze

BY FREDERIC REMINGTON

A Commission from the Association

Located on the East River Drive in Fairmount Park, north of the tunnel near Girard Avenue Bridge. Unveiled and formally presented to the city on June 20, 1908, with appropriate ceremonies. A band of Cow-boys and Indians participated in the exercises.

39. FOUNTAIN FIGURE, "THE DUCK GIRL"Bronze

BY PAUL MANSHIP

This work was awarded the George D. Widener Gold Medal for most meritorious work in Sculpture at the Annual Exhibition of the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts in 1914. Purchased by the Association and transferred to the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, 1916.

40. MEMORIAL TABLET to HERMANN JOSEPH SCHWARZMANNBronze

Erected in Memorial Hall in 1915 to commemorate his services as Principal Assistant and Consulting Engineer of the Commissioners of Fairmount Park from 1868 to 1877 and the designer of many of the most important structures in the Park, including Memorial Hall.

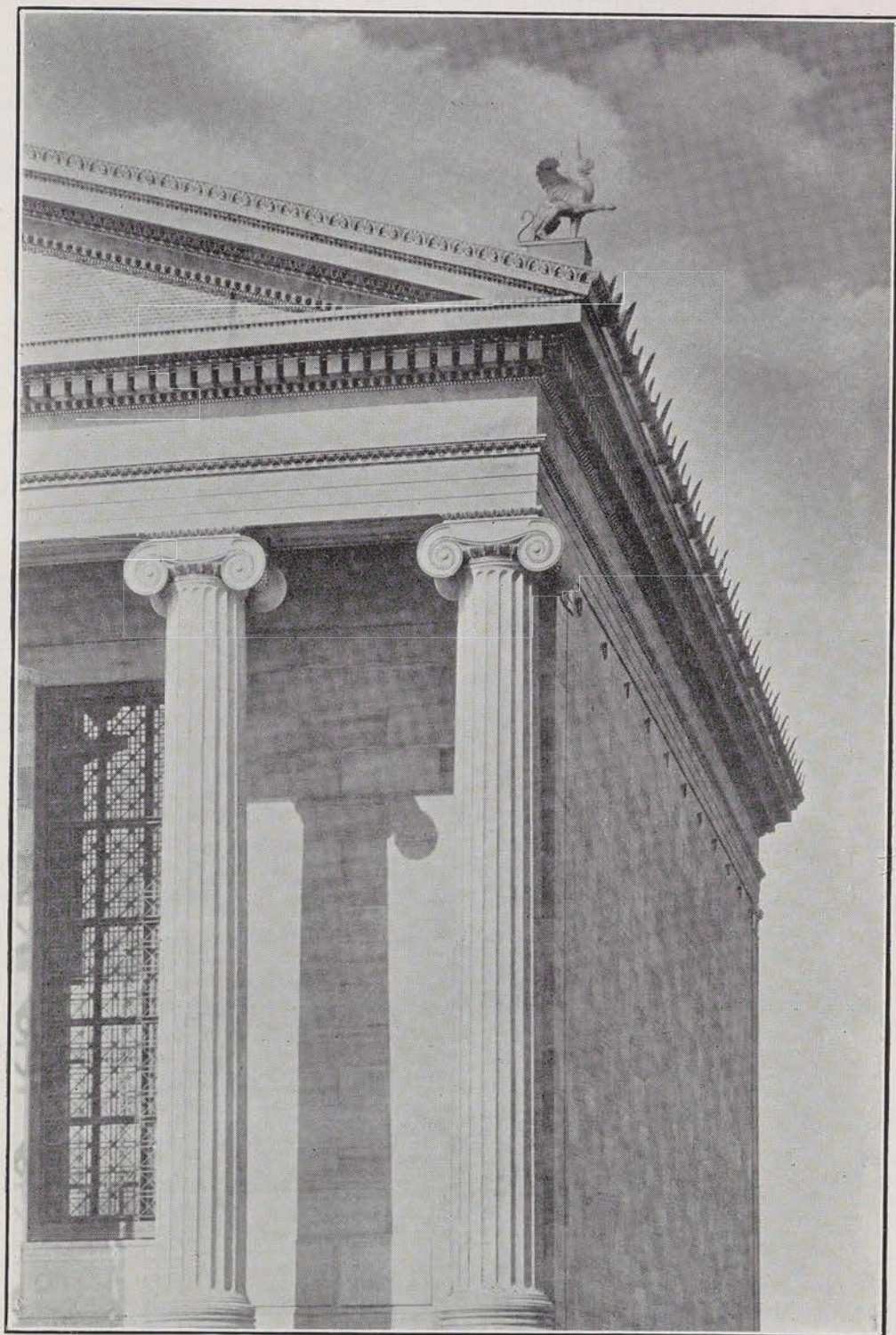
8. **PEDESTAL AND SETTING** for bronze goat, "Billy," by Albert Laessle. The bronze is a gift to the city by Eli Kirk Price, Esq. The Association contributed the pedestal and exedra. Erected in Rittenhouse Square, 1919.

9. **MARBLE CUPID.**

Bequest of Mr. John Moss, Jr., turned over to the Commissioners of Fairmount Park in February, 1920, and placed in Horticultural Hall.

FIFTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

January 28th, 1926

To the Members of the Fairmount Park Art Association:

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN: Your Board presents its Fifty-fourth Annual Report.

It is happy to commend the legislative progress that has been made toward carrying out the City of Philadelphia-Pennsylvania Railroad Agreement, associated with which are the improvement, development and beautification of the east and west banks of the Schuylkill River southward from Fairmount Dam. The reclamation of the banks of the Schuylkill has at long last been undertaken by the city.

There was submitted to the electors in November of 1924 a loan which included, as stated in our last report, one item of \$100,000 "for plans, specifications, borings, tests and other work incident to the improvement, development and beautification of the east and west banks of the Schuylkill." On December 22d, 1925, a month ago, the Mayor approved an ordinance, which authorized the Director of Public Works to make "test borings and other appurtenant work incident to the proper development and beautification of the *east* and *west* banks of the Schuylkill River from Fairmount Dam southward."

Before the last annual meeting of the Fairmount Park Art Association, the proposals of the City of Philadelphia and the Pennsylvania Railroad for a new development, north of Market Street between Fifteenth and Thirty-second Streets, had been announced. Authority to enter into the contract contemplated by these plans was given by an ordinance approved July 2d, 1925. The contract itself was signed on July 13th, 1925. That contract provides for the construction of the West River Drive from Spring Garden Street to South Street.

Another ordinance of Council, approved the 22d day of June, submitted to the electors a loan, one of the items of which was to provide \$2,000,000

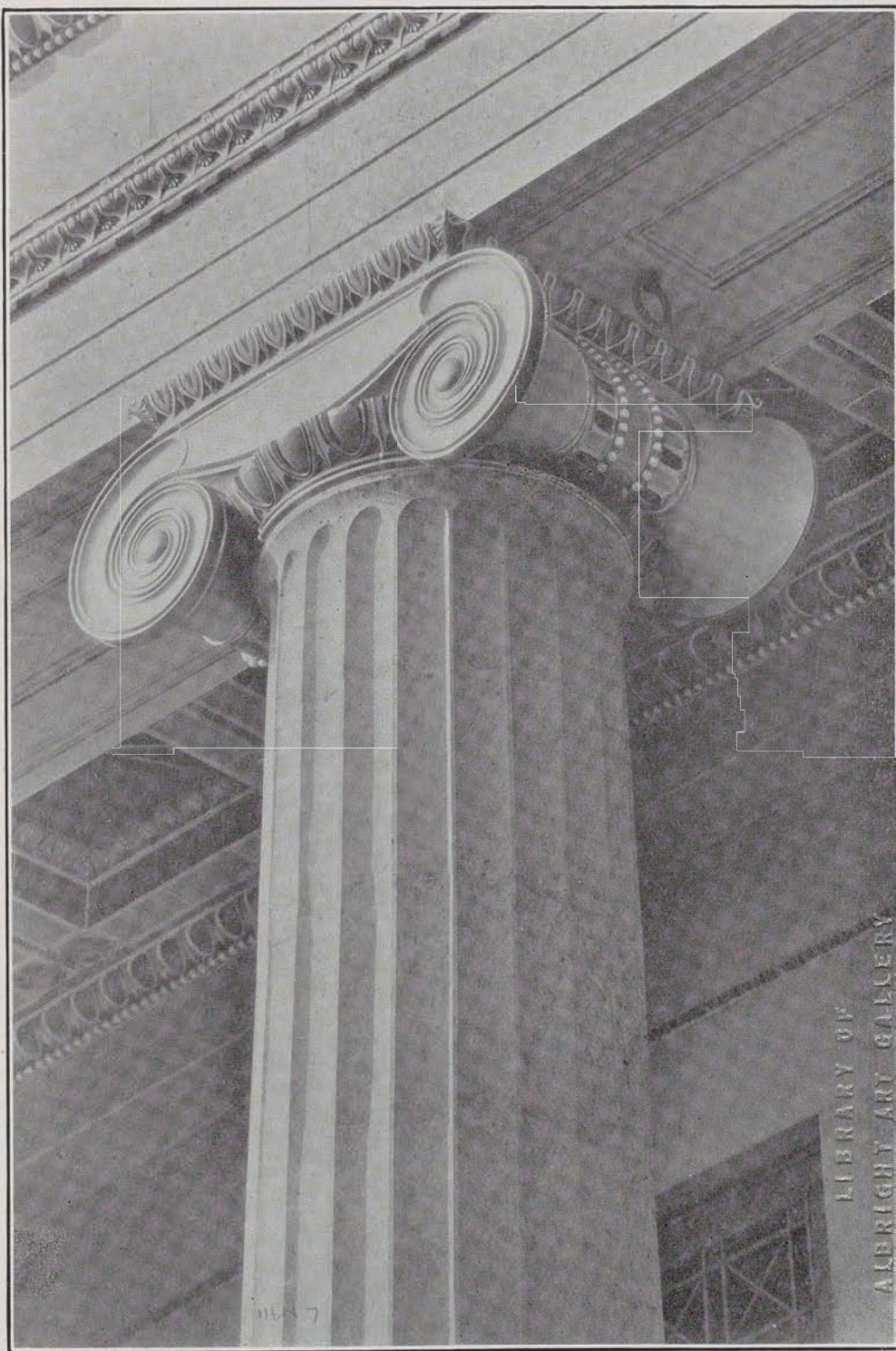
“Toward the acquisition of property, the work of construction involved in opening, widening and changing grades of streets and other municipal improvements in those sections of the City bounded by Market Street, the Parkway, Broad Street and the Schuylkill River, and the Schuylkill River, Girard Avenue, Fortieth Street extended, Woodland Avenue, Forty-second Street and Gray's Ferry Avenue.”

At the September election the voters approved the Loan, including the foregoing item, by a vote of four to one.

Thereafter, on October 2d, the Mayor signed an ordinance appropriating the \$2,000,000 so provided to the Department of Public Works; and on November 25th, an Ordinance directing the Department of Public Works “to proceed to carry into effect the agreement dated July 13th, 1925”; was approved.

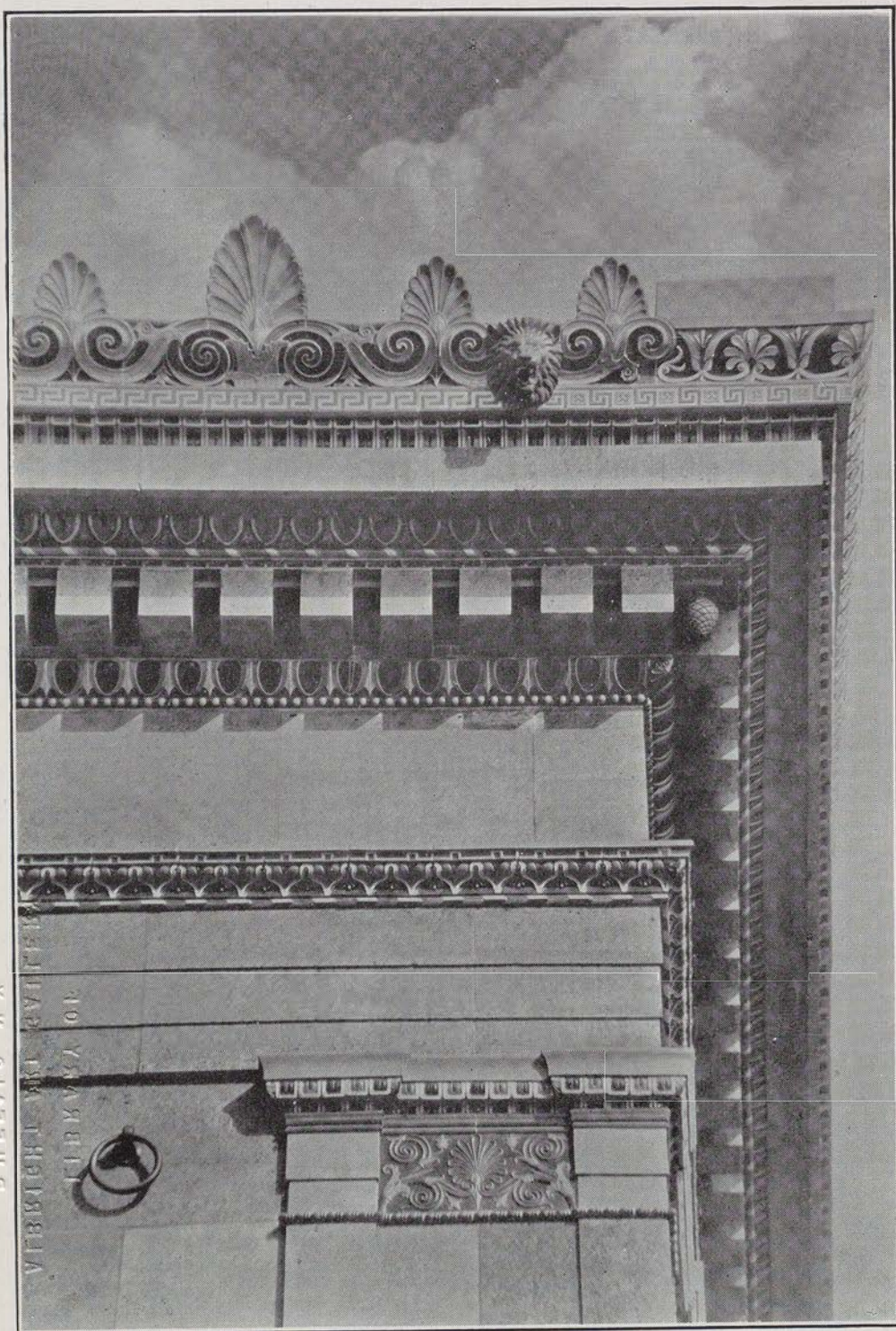
The Railroad Company owns all the property on the north side of Filbert Street, between Fifteenth Street and Twentieth Street. It has a number of offices located temporarily in these buildings. The buildings themselves will be required for the new Pennsylvania Boulevard, which is to be eighty feet in width, and which is to run from Fifteenth Street westwardly across the river to the new railroad station, to be located on the west bank. Before the demolition of these buildings on the north side of Filbert Street, it is necessary to secure other accommodations for the employees of the railroad now housed there, and the Railroad Company has begun the construction of a twelve-story building at the northeast corner of Thirty-second and Market Streets. The first spadeful of ground turned in the construction of the foundations of that building marked the actual initiation of the execution of the City of Philadelphia-Pennsylvania Railroad Agreement.

It will thus be seen that admirable advances have been made toward the reclamation of the banks of the Schuylkill and toward the realization of the great plans for the removal of the “Chinese Wall” and the general development and beautification of the area north of Market Street between the Parkway and Thirty-second Street.

ART MUSEUM DETAILS.

THE ART MUSEUM

In September, 1925, the electors approved a loan of \$1,200,000 "toward the erection, construction, improvement and equipment of the Art Museum and its approaches."

There is no question that the early completion of this building will result in a great enhancement of the reputation of Philadelphia. Capacious as it appears, it is clear that its space will be rapidly filled to overflowing, unless it is resolutely determined to refuse gifts of objects of art which are not of high museum standard. It is earnestly urged that all testators and donors permit either the Museum authorities or the Art Jury to choose among the testators' or donors' art objects those which are desired. There should be no provision requiring a collection to be hung by itself.

It is entirely proper to provide that each object in a collection shall be marked with an appropriate label stating by whom it was given.

Nothing more important to the quality of Philadelphia's Museum has occurred than the refusal by the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City of the collection bequeathed by the late Senator Clark, worth millions of dollars. The gift was subject to a provision that it must be kept together, as well as to other unwise conditions. The Board of Trustees performed a notable public service in refusing the gift altogether, thereby emphasizing that those responsible for the maintenance of a museum should be allowed to determine where and how and when specific objects should be displayed.

An ordinance was approved by the Mayor, on November 10th, 1925, to take as an addition to the Parkway the triangle of ground bounded by Pennsylvania Avenue, Fairmount Avenue and Twenty-fifth Street. This will improve the surroundings of the Art Museum.

An important ordinance was approved on December 24th, 1925, to revise the lines of the Parkway between Twentieth and Twenty-second Streets, which, when opened, will eliminate the irregularity caused by the intrusion into the Parkway of the southwest corner of a building at Twenty-first and Callowhill Streets.

THE ERICSSON MEMORIAL

The Ericsson Memorial Fund now approximates \$27,000. At a recent meeting of the Committee having the matter in charge, a resolution was adopted that "the Committee tentatively favor the association of the memorial with a bridge."

While the Committee has not limited itself in any way, it nevertheless expressed the view that the necessary construction at an early date of the proposed Winter Street bridge, crossing the Schuylkill where it is but forty feet wider than the Seine, will present an opportunity for something similar in design to the famous Alexander III Bridge in Paris. Such a structure will give ample opportunities for sculptural adornments, which could readily take the form of monuments.

It is obvious that this bridge will have a spectacular location. It will be on a line between the Art Museum and the new Station. No other structure will be between those two buildings. This is because the east and west extensions of the Park along the river will keep clear the vista from the Museum directly southward to the station and *vice versa*.

The opportunity to build a superb bridge and at the same time to erect memorials should not be missed.

THE SHAKESPEARE MEMORIAL

Your Board is happy to report that work on the full size model of the Shakespeare Memorial, designed by A. Stirling Calder and Messrs. Wilson Eyre and McIlvaine, is now well advanced. This work of art is to be placed in Logan Square in front of the Free Library.

THE LOGAN MEMORIAL

The fund for the Logan Memorial, which is to be placed in Logan Square, in front of a public building to be erected on the north side of Vine Street between Eighteenth and Nineteenth Streets, corresponding to the location of the Shakespeare Memorial, has now reached the sum of \$11,040.80.

The Association will be happy to receive further contributions

for this Memorial, in order that something worthy of William Penn's famous secretary may be erected in the park named after him.

ROBERT MORRIS MEMORIAL

Your Board is happy to report the completion and erection of the Robert Morris Memorial.

Plans are under way for its unveiling, the precise date of which must depend upon the convenience of highly placed Government officials. The Board feels that you will be satisfied with the superb result obtained in this, one of the last products of the genius of Paul Bartlett.

THE AERO MEMORIAL

In order to stimulate the creation of a memorial to the Airmen of Pennsylvania who offered their lives in the Great War, your Board of Trustees by a resolution adopted December 12th, 1924, offered to match any contribution made to the fund until this Association has contributed \$10,000, thus making the fund at least \$20,000.

We are happy to report that in the past year Mrs. Arthur Biddle contributed to this fund \$1000, Dr. and Mrs. George Woodward \$1000, and Mr. and Mrs. Thereon I. Crane \$1000.

These sums have been matched by this Association, and the total fund draws interest, with the result that during the year it has grown from \$1311.35 to \$7321.21.

Your Board is happy to record that the Aero Club of Pennsylvania has continued its support, financial and otherwise, of this movement.

THE FAIRMOUNT PARK ART ASSOCIATION'S PRIZE

The offer by the Fairmount Park Art Association of a prize of \$500 for a work in sculpture at the 1925 Exhibition of Oils and Sculpture at the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts was referred to in our last report.

The Committee to award the prize, it was announced, was to consist of five persons, one each appointed by the Presidents of the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts, the National Sculpture Society, the Philadelphia Chapter of the American Institute of Architects, the Fairmount Park Commission and the Fairmount Park Art Association.

Your Board notes with satisfaction that the same work was awarded a prize of \$1500 when shown later at the Chicago Art Institute.

A prize of \$500 has been offered by your Board for a work in sculpture to be shown at the Academy Exhibition of 1926, the conditions of the prize remaining very much the same, but specifically limited to works in sculpture "suitable for permanent erection out of doors."

THE HOLME-CRISPIN PARK

Your Board is happy to note that an ordinance was passed, and approved by the Mayor on April 28th, 1925, to place upon the City Plan the Holme-Crispin Park, which will include the ground

between Pennypack Creek and the Crispin Cemetery above the Valley of Wooden Bridge Run, in which cemetery Holme is buried. The park will contain about thirty-seven acres.

TACONY CREEK PARK AND LEAGUE ISLAND PARK

The loan approved in September, 1925, to which reference has been made, also included an item of \$1,000,000 toward the acquisition of property as an addition to Tacony Creek Park. After the approval by the electors of that item, the Council passed an ordinance, approved by the Mayor, on December 2d, 1925, to acquire the greater part of the west side of Tacony Creek Valley from Juniata Park to the City Line, including certain sections on the east side of the valley. The new area covers ninety-nine acres.

An addition of 174 acres was made to League Island Park, by ordinance approved October 30th, 1925. This addition lies to the west of the present park, between Pattison Avenue and Government Avenue. Its west boundary is a north and south line between Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth Streets.

An ordinance was approved on May 19th, 1925, to accept an offer by the Philadelphia Rapid Transit Company, by which the public will acquire the easterly half of the Burd Home as an extension of Cobb's Creek Park.

An ordinance was approved March 18th, 1925, to acquire for park purposes four areas of ground covering sixty-seven acres on the west side of Cobb's Creek. Other ordinances directed additions to be placed on the Plan of 21.514 acres to Cobb's Creek and 3.67 acres to Morris Park; and also the southwest corner of Sixty-third and Market Streets.

BILLBOARDS

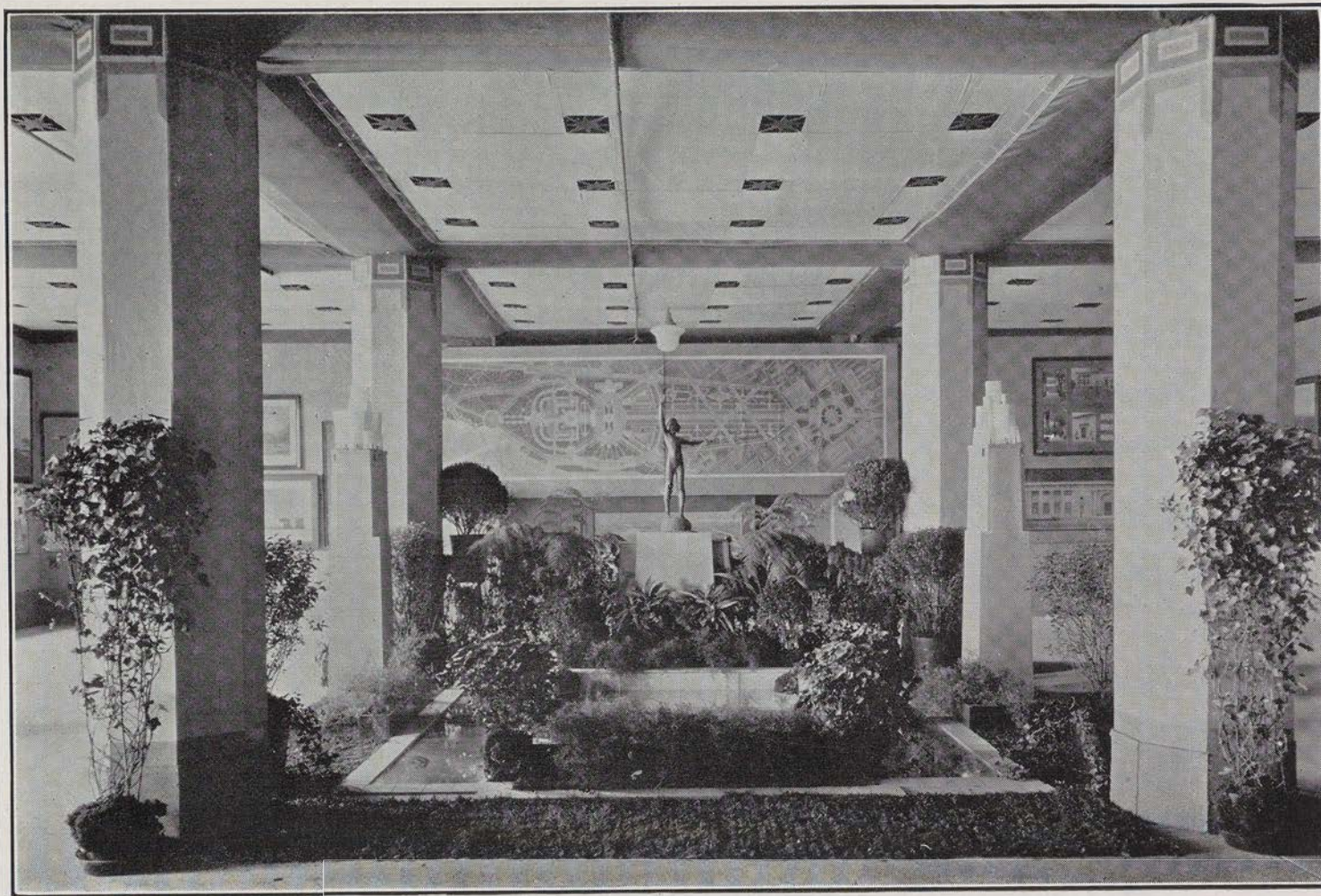

THE CITY PLAN

Your Association joined in the entertainment in Philadelphia of a distinguished group of City Planners, who had come to America from a number of foreign countries to be present at the International City, Regional and Country Planning Convention, held in New York in April, 1925, under the auspices of the American City Planning Institute, the American Institute of Architects, the Russell Sage Foundation and other organizations.

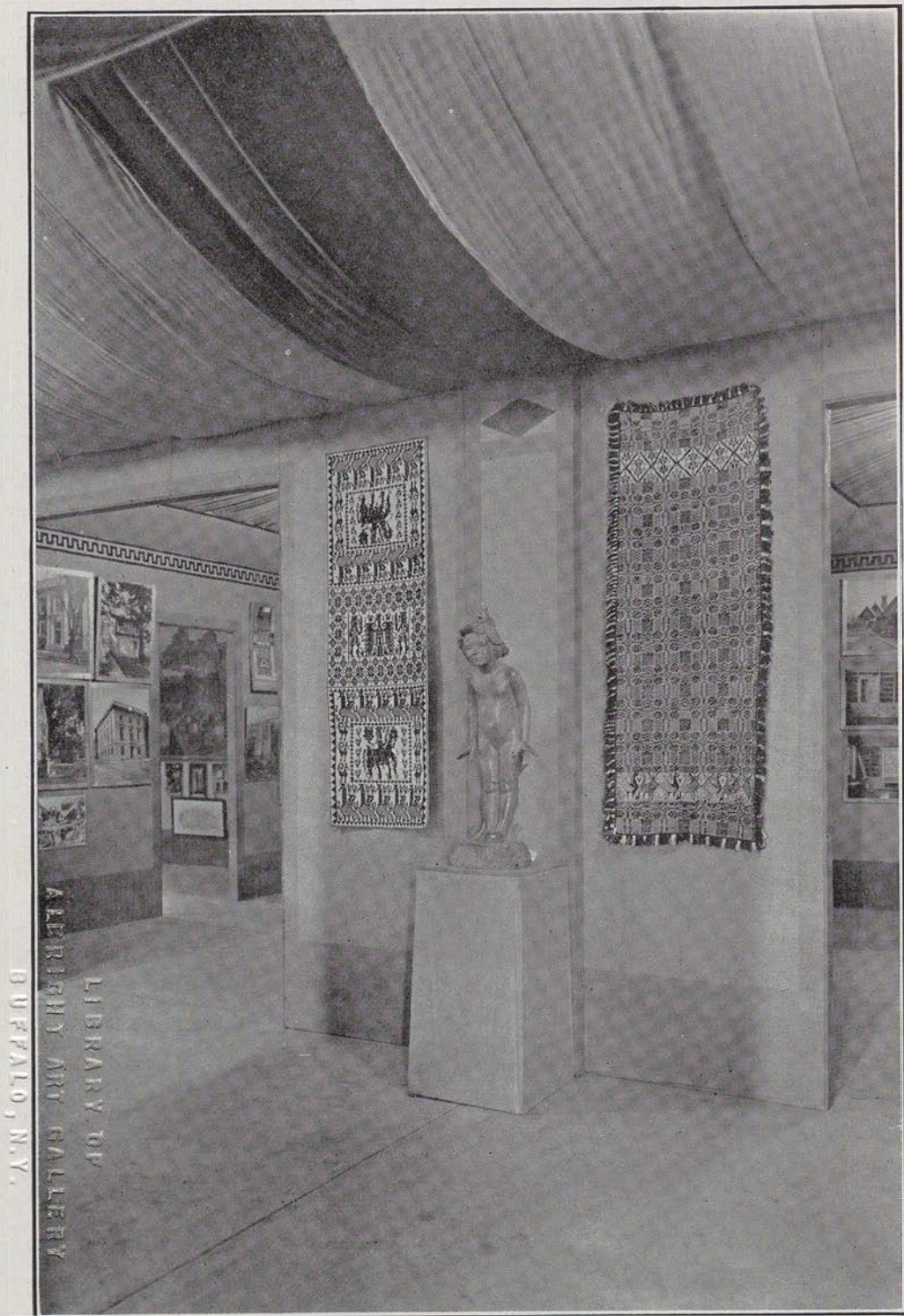
At this Convention there were 108 delegates present from twenty-six foreign countries and there were in addition 425 delegates present from thirty-three States of this country.

On their visit to Philadelphia, your Board of Trustees took the foreign delegates on a tour of the City and its environs and entertained them at lunch; and your President joined with the Presidents of a number of other Philadelphia organizations as hosts at a dinner in the evening.

In connection with the International City Planning Convention held in New York, a very important International Exhibition of City Planning and Housing was held. The greater part of the drawings shown in this Exhibition were afterwards brought to Philadelphia and exhibited in conjunction with the Annual Exhibition of architectural drawings and models, of the T-Square Club and of the Philadelphia Chapter of the American Institute of Architects.

The Architectural Exhibition in Philadelphia was held in the new Museum of Art and the City Planning Exhibition in the corridors of the City Hall. They were open for a month, from the middle of May to the middle of June, and were largely attended.

The growth of the recognition of City and Regional Planning,

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with their many ramifications, in less than twenty years has been amazing. No one can take up the current literature of the day without being struck by the recognition on all sides of the wisdom of preparing plans for future development well in advance, instead of merely opening a street here and locating a building there, hit or miss. The City has a future; it is sure to grow. The obvious deduction that plans for that growth must be made was not drawn until less than nineteen years ago, in so far as recognition by law through the formation of City Planning Commissions is concerned.

REGIONAL PLANNING

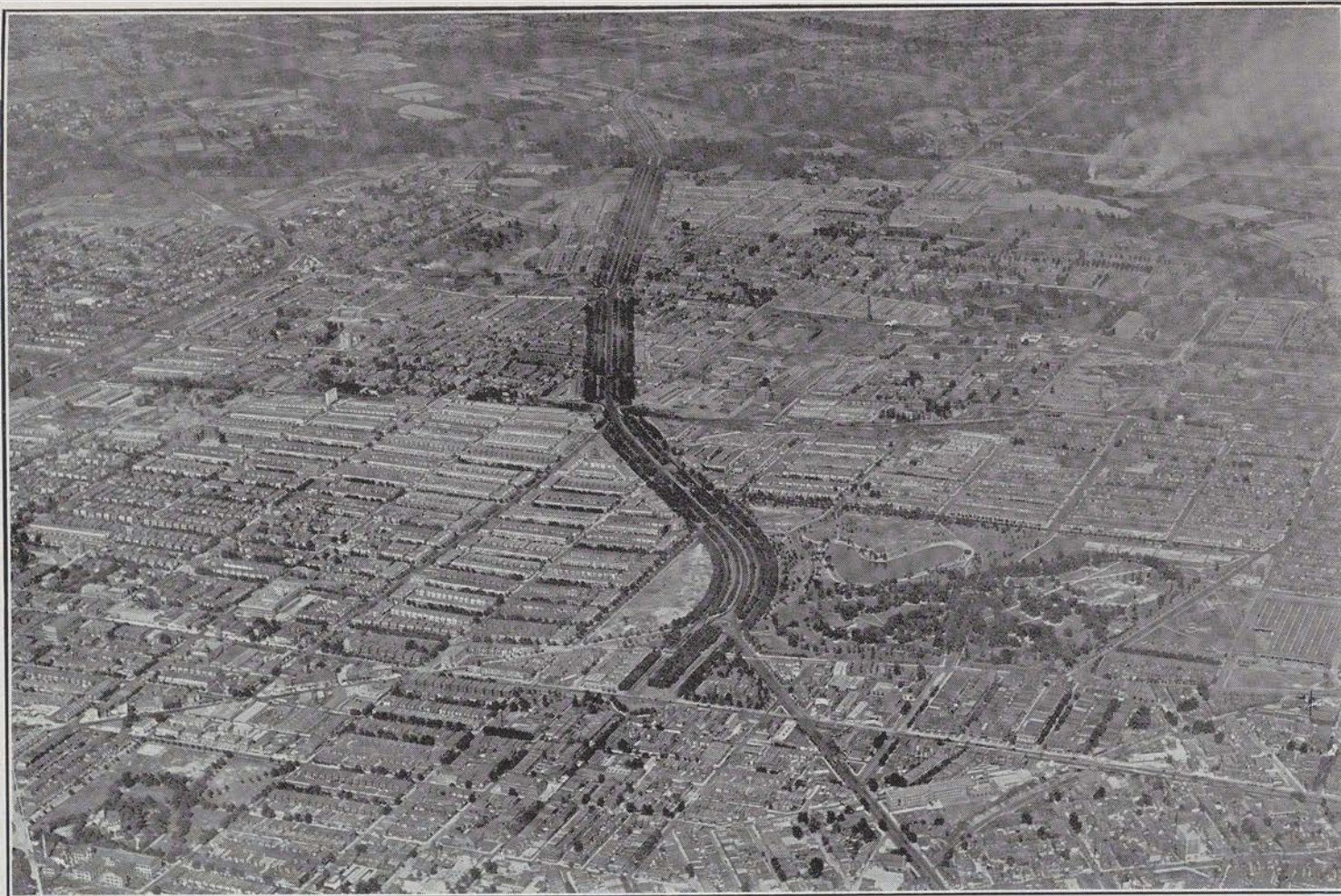
When City Planning was begun in America, the automobile had not developed its possibilities. City Plans were generally confined to the limits of cities, because those limits were more or less co-terminus with the distance from the centres of cities, which the then existing street transportation agencies could cover. The motor has extended that distance until now it is easy for the day-time population of cities to have their homes twenty miles away.

This has compelled the recognition of the fact that plans for a community's growth must cover not only the City proper, but the tributary regions. A number of cities have accordingly appointed or secured regional planning organizations. Your Board has been happy to join in the formation of the Regional Planning Federation for the Tri-State District of Philadelphia, lying between Wilmington and Trenton, Coatesville and the eastern limits of the territory influenced by Camden; and has made an appropriation toward the work.

ZONING

Your Board regrets that it must report that Philadelphia is still without a general Zoning Ordinance. Over 300 cities are already ahead of it in securing for their citizens the protection afforded by proper zoning regulations.

In the last Annual Report of Herbert Hoover, Secretary of Commerce, he emphasizes the scrapping of buildings and of public utilities, brought about through the absence of Zoning regulations,

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and the resulting destruction of buildings appropriate for their location to make way for others without regard to their appropriateness.

Mr. Hoover stated:

"An advisory committee on zoning was appointed by the Secretary of Commerce in 1921 to deal with another aspect of municipal building regulations. The standard State zoning enabling act, which this committee prepared, has been used wholly or in part by 17 States, a fact which bears eloquent testimony to the value and far-reaching scope of the committee's work in this field. The number of zoned municipalities in the United States has increased to about 360 from a total of less than 50 at the time the committee was formed. As a result several million additional home owners have better protection for their equity in their property. The zoning ordinances are helping to safeguard the houses of these families from wanton intrusion by uses of land which are best grouped apart from homes.

"Reports indicate that zoning ordinances have been helpful in cities throughout the country in avoiding the blighting of districts and the unnecessary scrapping of costly public utilities that are still serviceable. The razing of a single block of dwellings and the scrapping of utility connections unsuited for altered occupancy usually involves a destruction of \$100,000 or more worth of property, depending on the number and character of houses. Where the scale of such operations is reduced by a good zoning ordinance, the annual savings, even in a city of moderate size, are very considerable."

BEQUEST OF ELIZABETH R. MOULTON

Mrs. Byron R. Moulton, a life member of this Association, died February 23d, 1916.

By her will she gave the Fairmount Park Art Association the sum of \$5000. The Association will not receive this fund until the death of certain life annuitants. One of them has died during the past year and the executors of Mrs. Moulton's will have paid over to the Association the sum of \$489.73, on account of the bequest. This has been placed in the Permanent Fund, Park Branch, and the Trustees have elected Mrs. Moulton a Perpetual Member In Memoriam of the Park Branch.

DEATH OF HENRY K. FOX

Henry K. Fox, one of the two founders of this Association, died August 14th, 1925.

He was continuously on the Board of this Association for more than a half century. Your Board adopted the following Minute:

"At the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the Fairmount Park Art Association held June 7, 1921, the Honorable James M. Beck, the orator of the occasion, opened his address with the following words:

"'In the summer of 1871 there was a young man in Philadelphia by the name of Charles H. Howell. He was only twenty-three years of age and was only one among, let us say, 700,000 people. What could one man do to advance the city that he so dearly loved. He thought, as Fairmount Park was at that time expanding its beautiful domain as far as the Upper Wissahickon, that perhaps the greatest service he could render in his lifetime was to initiate a movement that would add the art of man to the gifts with which God had so prodigally endowed this magnificent pleasure domain. With this purpose he met in conference with another young man, who is still living in Philadelphia, and whose name ought also to be gratefully remembered, Henry K. Fox.'

"Henry K. Fox, who was then present, has now passed on, having died August 14, 1925, and it is becoming to review his career, especially as it relates to the development of this Association.

"Henry K. Fox was born September 21, 1847, the son of the late Daniel M. Fox, former Mayor of the City of Philadelphia. He entered the public schools, finally graduating from the Central High School in its forty-fourth class. At the time of the Civil War he enlisted in an artillery regiment; but, being under legal age, his father had him withdrawn from the service and required his entrance in the Law School, of the University of Pennsylvania, class of 1878. He was a close student of that branch relating to real estate, in which he became proficient in practice, and he was frequently sought for opinions.

"In due course Mr. Fox entered his father's office, becoming a partner of the firm of Daniel M. Fox & Sons; he was

interested chiefly in the acquisition of real estate for investment by clients, chief of whom was the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, which entrusted to the firm the purchase of the property upon which was erected the present Broad Street Station.

"For some years Mr. Fox was associated with the American Surety Company and wrote many articles on corporate suretyship, a new venture at that period; upon their publication they attracted wide attention. He was a member of the American Bar Association and Counsel for the Law and Order Society.

"Notwithstanding his professional duties, other interests claimed his attention also; he was active in athletics and was a member of the Crescent Boat Club, the Minerva Baseball Club and the Merion Cricket Club. He was one of the original members of the Bryn Mawr Horse Show Association and a charter member of the Plays and Players. He was a member of the Sons of the Revolution, of the Browning Society, a stockholder of the American Academy of the Fine Arts and President of the Church Club of Ridley Park, where he resided for some years; he took a very active interest in the Seamen's Mission. For years, he was in charge of the Infant Sunday School at the Church of the Epiphany, when it was situated at the northwest corner of Fifteenth and Chestnut Streets, while the Rev. George Herbert Kinsolving, later Bishop, was rector. Mr. Fox was also interested in music and was a member of a quartette choir in the church.

"In 1869 he married Eliza Herberger Landell, daughter of Washington I. Landell, of the firm of Eyre & Landell, dry goods merchants, whose establishment was at Fourth and Arch Streets. Later in life Mr. Landell was president of the Kensington National Bank, 1877-87.

"Mr. Fox's wife was an invalid for years and her husband's care and devotion were of an exceptional character; Mrs. Fox died March 20, 1917. After her death Mr. Fox lived with his daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. James E. Gibson, in Germantown.

"It may be said that his dominant life interest in public affairs was centered in the success of the Fairmount Park Art Association, which, as one of the two men responsible for its creation, he watched with solicitous care during its development from an organization, with the very modest income of a few hundred dollars, to a corporation with a permanent endowment of more than a hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

It should be noted that this result was obtained largely through the care he exercised as honorary treasurer for a long series of years, devoting days and nights to the preparation of its voluminous records for their presentation as occasion required. He especially advocated conservative investments, so that the treasury has passed through many trying periods without diminution of its assets, but with additions to its principal by the increase of values due to appreciation of legal-investment securities.

"Mr. Howell and Mr. Fox formed, in this Association, an agency which has secured individual products of great merit and which—yet more important—should produce hereafter, from year to year, from generation to generation, finer and finer results in greater and greater volume.

"Every member of the Fairmount Park Art Association and a host of citizens recognize their indebtedness to this man of foresight, energy, ability and vision, who devoted so much of his talents to the public good.

"The Board of Trustees of the Fairmount Park Art Association desires to put on record this minute and to extend to his children and to the other members of his family an expression of deep sympathy in their bereavement. While, when these cataclysms occur, there seems to be nothing to mitigate the grief of those left behind, nevertheless, in the long run, such records as that made by Henry K. Fox do become a source, not only of profound consolation, but of justified pride for those who remain."

DEATH OF JOHN D. McILHENNY

John Dexter McIlhenny, a member of the Board of Trustees of this Association, died November 23, 1925.

Your Board of Trustees adopted the following Minute:

"WHEREAS, John Dexter McIlhenny, a member of the Board of Trustees of the Fairmount Park Art Association since 1918, died on November 23, 1925, and

"WHEREAS, Mr. McIlhenny had for years been a powerful influence in the cause of art in Philadelphia, as President of the Pennsylvania Museum and School of Industrial Art, as a member of this Board and as an individual;

"Resolved, That the Board of Trustees place on record their respect and regard for Mr. McIlhenny as a man, as a

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citizen and as an art patron,—one whose place it will be impossible to fill; and

“*Resolved*, That copies of this resolution be sent to the members of his family.”

ELECTION

It is your duty to elect at this meeting six Trustees in place of those whose terms expire, one of whom was Mr. Huger Elliott, resigned, and also two Trustees, one to serve for one year in the place of the late John D. McIlhenny and the other to serve for two years in the place of the late Henry K. Fox.

MINUTES OF THE FIFTY-FOURTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE FAIRMOUNT PARK ART ASSOCIATION

The Fifty-fourth Annual Meeting of the Fairmount Park Art Association was held in the Ballroom of the Bellevue-Stratford, on Thursday, January 28th, 1926, at twelve o'clock.

There were about 560 members and guests present.

President Cohen occupied the Chair.

The Minutes of the last meeting, held January 28th, 1925, having been printed in the Annual Report, a copy of which was available at the meeting, the reading of the Minutes was, on motion, omitted and they were approved.

The Fifty-fourth Annual Report of the Board of Trustees was presented.

Mrs. Arthur H. Lea moved that the report be accepted and referred to the incoming Board; and that the Secretary be instructed to have the usual number of copies printed and distributed. Seconded and carried.

The Treasurer's report, duly audited, was presented by headings. It was moved that it be accepted and referred to the incoming Board for publication. Seconded and carried.

The terms of six Trustees having expired, one of whom was Huger Elliott (resigned), and there being two vacancies caused by the deaths of Henry K. Fox and John D. McIlhenny, Mr. Walter S. McInnes moved that Messrs. James M. Beck, Charles J. Cohen, Eli Kirk Price, Samuel Rea, Edgar V. Seeler and Joseph Allison Steinmetz be nominated for the full term of three years, the term expiring in 1928; that Mr. Benjamin R. Hoffman be nominated for the term of two years, and that Mr. Charles H. Ludington be nominated for the term of one year. Seconded.

Mr. Bartol H. Brazier moved that the nominations be closed and that the Executive Secretary be instructed to cast one ballot

for those nominated. Seconded and carried. The Executive Secretary reported that he had cast one ballot accordingly. The President announced the election of the nominees.

INTRODUCTORY REMARKS

JOSEPH ALLISON STEINMETZ

The measure of appreciation of great effort is in the vote of support by the attendance of the membership. You will be gratified to know this is the largest meeting ever held, there being over 600 acceptances. In the old days when the great vision of "Philadelphia of the Future" was only in the minds of the few, we had at times difficulty in gathering together a quorum to sustain some important plan (a quorum happened to be five men). You may now congratulate yourselves that you are members of the most forceful and far-seeing organization, in line with the future advancement of your City.

It is indeed an honor to have a part in such a great City movement, which reflects inspiration to the whole Nation.

In the cablegrams the other day came this message, and it befits our meeting that we freely give high credit and honor to Rome.

"Rome must be restored to the grandeur, vastness and power it represented during the reign of Augustus. This definite program was given by Premier Mussolini in the nature of a command to Senator Filippo Cremonesi yesterday in the course of an impressive ceremony in which the Premier invested him as the first Governor of the ancient city." Premier Mussolini declared: "Within five years Rome must appear as a marvel to all the people of the world—vast, ordered and powerful, as it was in the time of the first empire of Augustus. You will make open squares around the Augusteo Amphitheatre, around the ancient Marcello Theatre, around the Capitol, around the Pantheon. Everything that has been built around these monuments during the centuries of decadence must disappear. Within five years the Pantheon must be visible from the Piazza Colonna through a wide avenue.

"You will also liberate the masterful temples of Christian Rome from the profane parasitical constructions which now cling to them. Thousands of monuments of our history must stand out in their giant-like solitude. Then Rome will spread out above other hills along the banks of the sacred river, to

the shores of the Mediterranean. You will remove from our streets, graced by these monuments, all this contamination of tramways, but you will give the most modern means of communication to the new City which will rise in rings around the old one. You will give schools, bath houses, parks and athletic fields to the Fascist people who work.

"You, full of sagacity and experience, will help us govern the city in a spirit mindful of its past and its future."

This last paragraph well applies to our meeting today and it gives me pleasure to introduce our speaker, the Honorable Charles B. Hall, President of Philadelphia City Council.

ADDRESS

THE BEAUTIFICATION OF THE BANKS OF THE SCHUYLKILL AS MOST ESSENTIAL TO THE CITY BEAUTIFUL

BY HON. CHARLES B. HALL,
President of the City Council

*Mr. Chairman, Members of the Fairmount Park Art Association
and Assembled Guests:*

It is not really necessary for me to appear here today to advocate to your Association the beautification of the Schuylkill River banks, because you have been committed to this worthy project for many, many years, but I do wish to say that we, too, have been striving for a number of years, to obtain that which will soon be a reality.

The physical work has already begun as the result of an appropriation made from the Loan Bill of November, 1924, and I believe within the next two years—during the remainder of the term of office of Mayor Kendrick—considerable headway will be made.

It is for you citizens, however, to take it upon yourselves to see that Mayor Kendrick's successor in office will be a man like himself, in order that his plans for city-wide improvement and development will be carried on without interruption.

I have been criticised somewhat in the past by the pullbacks for advocating a "City Beautiful." The complaint has been that the City should first be made useful, but my contention is that a city cannot become useful until it is first made beautiful.

The money expended in beautifying your City is always returned manifold and, as an example, I will give you this one instance:

Our magnificent Parkway, which, when completed, will be one of the finest thoroughfares in the world, both from a practical and an artistic point of view, borders the Eighth, Ninth, Tenth and Fifteenth Wards. The assessments of real estate in 1911 for these four wards totaled about three hundred and fifty-four million dol-

lars; the City receiving as taxes therefrom approximately five million dollars.

In 1925 the assessed valuation, after a reduction of twenty million dollars caused by the use of property on the line of the Parkway, was six hundred and fifty-six million dollars, on which there was a return to the City in taxation of over seventeen million dollars. For 1926 the assessed valuation will be approximately seven hundred million dollars. Assessments are constantly rising throughout this neighborhood and there will be a wide margin of profit before the Parkway is entirely completed.

Now, take the Art Museum, the exterior of which will be completed very shortly, including approaches and abutments to beautify it, will mean a large return in taxes from the surrounding property.

To show the already enormous increase in valuations, even though the Art Museum is not yet completed, a piece of ground assessed at eighty thousand dollars was purchased and on it there is now being erected the Fidelity Mutual Insurance Building, which will cost in the neighborhood of two million dollars, and which would not have been built if the Art Museum and the Parkway had not been contemplated.

So, I say, every public improvement brings back benefits manifold to the City.

When you consider today the low assessments of property on the unsightly and dilapidated river banks of the Schuylkill River, you can imagine the millions in additional revenue that will come to the City when this great project is completed.

Last year the Mayor approved the agreement between the City of Philadelphia and the Pennsylvania Railroad Company for a magnificent new terminal to be built on the west bank of the river, and you are assured that within the next two or three years, at the most, the west banks of the river will be beautified between Spring Garden Street on the north and Vintage Avenue on the south.

The entire amount has been appropriated for the new University Bridge and work will be started this spring, which will mean an expenditure of one million three hundred thousand dollars. The University Bridge and approaches will provide a route from

Thirty-fourth and McKean Parkway to Thirty-ninth and Woodland Avenue, providing a new line of communication between West and South Philadelphia.

The present bridges crossing the Schuylkill River are not very beautiful to behold and the City is planning to widen Chestnut Street bridge; reconstruct the Market Street bridge and construct a viaduct at Powelton Avenue; reconstruct Spring Garden Street bridge and viaduct, costing approximately three million five hundred thousand dollars.

The Powelton Avenue bridge should be something out of the ordinary. No doubt many of you present have used the bridges crossing the Seine in Paris, but there is one in particular that stands for monumental and artistic beauty and that is the Alexander Bridge. We should have one of this character here which might well be named in honor of the man who laid out Philadelphia—Benjamin Franklin—which would be an everlasting monument to the memory of this great man.

Director Biles of the Department of Public Works is very anxious to have, and I believe will secure, at an early date, the services of a distinguished architect like Dr. Paul Cret, who, before they are submitted to the Art Jury, will pass upon the plans for public works of an artistic nature. In my opinion, public improvements such as ground and building developments should be artistic in design as well as the last word in engineering.

The new Pennsylvania Boulevard, ninety feet wide, from Fifteenth Street to the Schuylkill River, which is part of the Pennsylvania Railroad plan and which will remove what is known as the "Chinese Wall" on Market Street, will also be a lasting improvement. Only the other day Mayor Kendrick made an agreement with the United Gas Improvement Company for the removal of the unsightly gas holders at Twenty-third and Market Streets, which will greatly add to the beauty of that locality.

There will be in the new Loan bill, to be submitted next May, several million dollars for the continuation of the sewage disposal system, and I am advised by the Department of Public Works that from one million and a half to two million dollars of this amount will be used towards an intercepting sewer to the West

Philadelphia sewage disposal plant to prevent the pollution of the Schuylkill River.

A survey has been made of the bed of the Schuylkill River and it will be necessary to have several feet of dredging to take out the sludge which has accumulated there from sewage, particularly that from the stockyards.

I am told by competent engineers that when the new interceptors are built the water flowing will be as pure and as clear south of the dam as it now is above the same.

Mayor Kendrick is much interested in this great improvement and has informed me that he will request Council to insert not less than two million dollars in the Loan bill next Spring as a beginning of the improvement of the east river bank. In the Pennsylvania Railroad agreement there will be several million dollars more borrowed which will be used in part on the west river bank.

The Department of Public Works is now making arrangements to prevent the loading and dumping on the wharves by the Bureau of Street Cleaning the refuse and garbage collected throughout the City, which today makes an unhealthy and unsightly condition.

A tentative approval has been received from the State Department of Health for a plan of construction which will permit the cessation of sewage discharge into a part of the river before the southeastern works are completed.

The City engineers have advised me that the necessary work for the intercepting of this sewage can be built in less than three years' time and that the total cost of the intercepting sewers and pumping stations on the east and west banks of the river, from Spring Garden Street to Mill Creek, will be in the neighborhood of seven and one-half million dollars. The City's finances are in such condition that this work can be accomplished within three years.

Three million dollars will complete the bulkhead of both the east and west banks from Spring Garden Street to University Bridge, which is also in the plan of development.

These improvements necessarily mean the relocation of the Market Street Elevated, from the river to Thirty-second Street, at

a cost of seven hundred thousand dollars, and a new bridge which will cost five hundred thousand dollars.

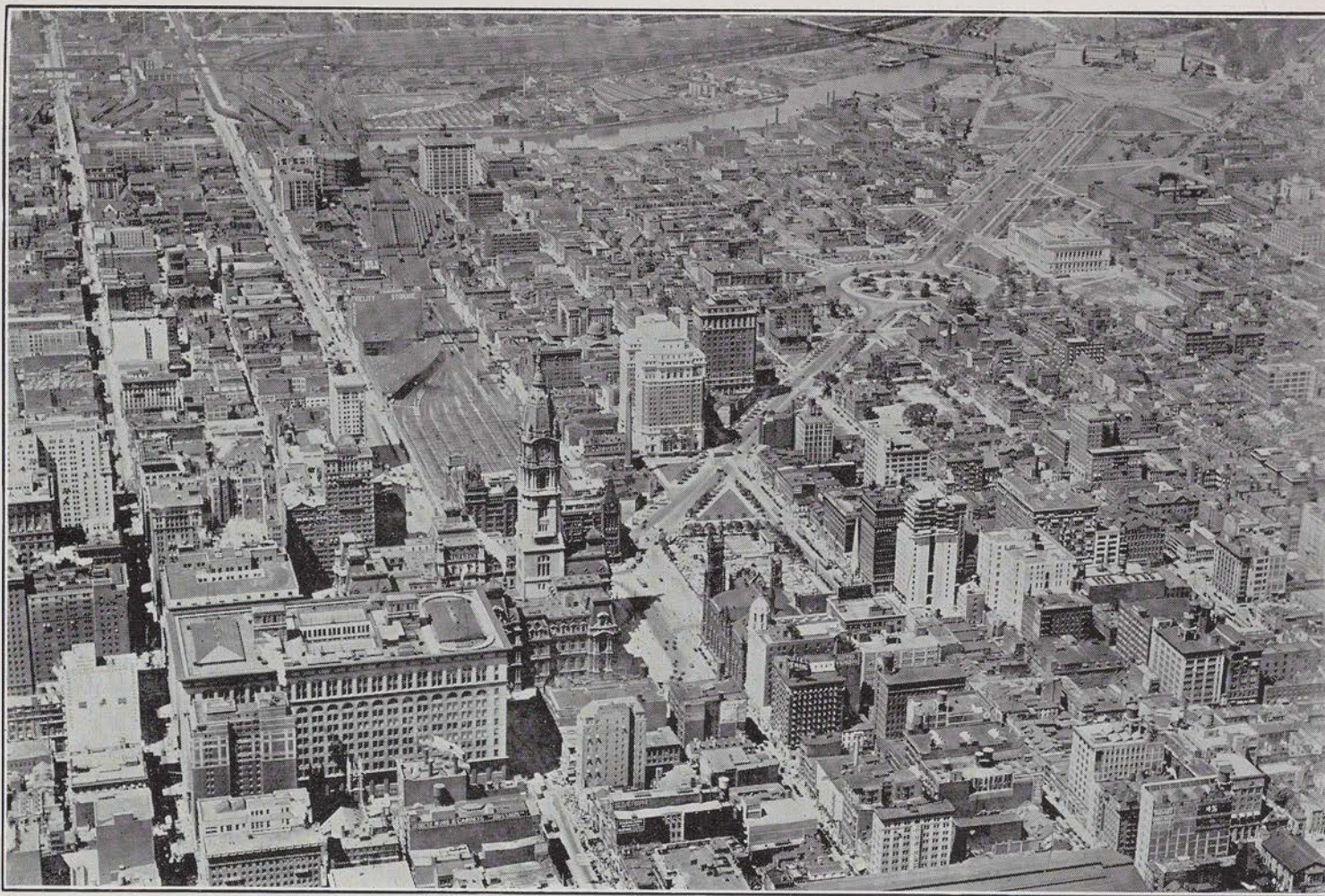
The share in the Pennsylvania Terminal agreement and applicable to the Schuylkill River improvement is eleven million dollars, making a total cost, exclusive of real estate on the east bank of the river, of thirty-six million dollars.

In the next few days the exact location in lower west Philadelphia for the stockyards will be decided upon; in fact, they must be removed at once so that the new Pennsylvania Terminal building can be started.

We must not stop improving our river banks and our Parkway, but we must also make our city attractive in other directions. I could mention many matters which would be of interest to you, but there is one in particular that I believe will appeal to you at this time and that is the question of arcading Chestnut Street, which has a twenty-six-foot cartway and real estate at fifty thousand dollars a front foot in some sections. We must have some relief from the great congestion in this important artery of traffic. I have suggested that Chestnut Street could and should be arcaded with the present seventeen-foot sidewalks, making a sixty-foot cartway; with no unsightly trolley rails or poles and with tracks removed as they will be when the Chestnut Street subway is completed from Broad to Sixth Street. I am sure when that much-needed improvement is made there will be a public demand that it shall proceed further westward.

On the east, its southern vista at Sixth Street will be that sacred shrine of Liberty, Independence Hall, while on the north the buildings now there should be torn down from Fifth to Sixth and from Market to Chestnut Street. This square should be dedicated to the various States of the Union and upon it could be constructed niches and monuments in commemoration of the outstanding events in the history of our Forty-eight States. I remember that such a plan was suggested by Dr. Greber and approved not long ago by Mrs. E. T. Stotesbury.

Visitors coming to our City, looking westward from Eighteenth Street, would see the northwestern vista of the Parkway with the beautiful Art Museum plainly visible; whereas the eastern vista will be City Hall and the municipal annex.

The suggested improvements which I have mentioned today are well within the City's financial ability to carry out, as they all come out of capital account by Loan, and will not cause any increase of the tax rate.

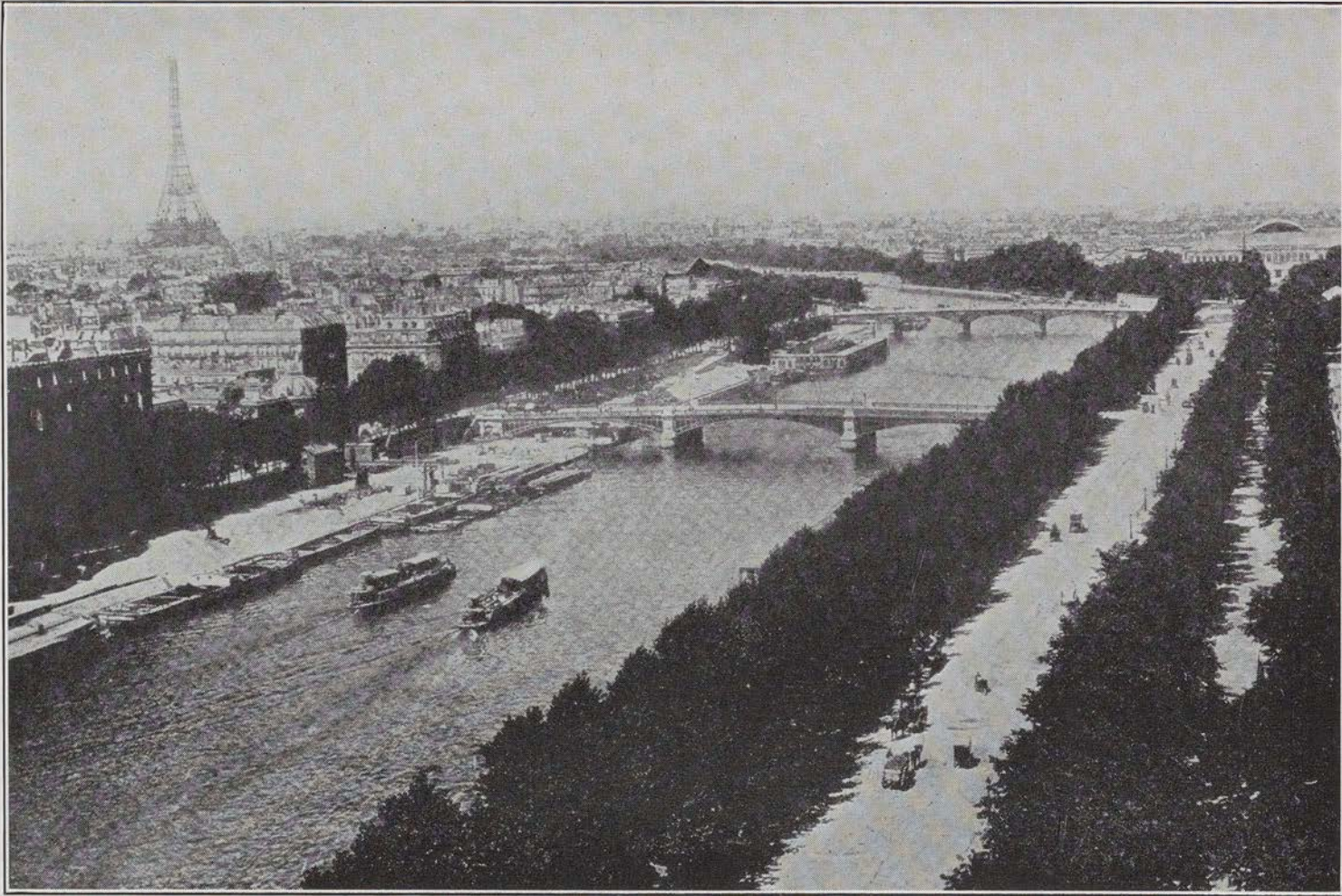
One of the most important subjects now before the City government is that of zoning. At the present time the Department of Public Works is working out a zoning plan and this will shortly be presented to Council. I have no doubt that within a comparatively short time zoning legislation will be enacted which will be a great step forward in our plans for a "City Beautiful."

As a result of this legislation the artistic features will not be lost sight of in public and private construction, and before the lapse of a few years I am sure this City will be what everyone wants it to be—one of the most beautiful, as well as one of the greatest commercial and industrial municipalities in the world.

We have as Mayor of Philadelphia today Honorable W. Freeland Kendrick, a man of broad vision and who has at heart the best interests of the city, who will complete many of the great works he started during his administration. I am quite certain that you citizens will see that his successor in office is one who shall pledge the completion of his unfinished work, among which will be the beautification of the river banks, which should go on and on.

It is more than a pleasure to be here today, and I wish that every citizen would feel it his duty to call upon public officials to help outline the work they are doing or attempting to do. Of course, to accept all invitations is physically impossible, but every citizen of Philadelphia should take it upon himself not to isolate himself from the Mayor and Council, but when they have some views which would be useful and helpful to give them the benefit of advice, and if they are doing the right thing commend them.

We very seldom hear from a citizen of Philadelphia unless he has fault to find. If we are doing the right thing they pay no attention to it, but if they have the slightest idea we are doing the wrong thing they denounce us without investigation, so I say give some cheer to your officials when you believe that they are doing the right thing. I thank you.

Penalty for Injuries to Property

State of New York, Laws, 1927, Ch. 542

A person who wilfully or maliciously cuts, tears, defaces, disfigures, soils, obliterates, breaks or destroys, a book, map, chart, picture, engraving, statue, coin, model, apparatus, specimen, or other work of literature or object of art, or curiosity, deposited in a public library, gallery, museum, collection, fair or exhibitions, or in a library, gallery, college or university, or to any incorporated institution devoted to educational, scientific literary, artistic, historical or charitable purposes, is punishable by imprisonment of not more than one year, or by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Citizens desiring to contribute to the adornment of the Park or City are invited to do so through the agency of this Association, in order that such undertakings may not only benefit by its experience and oversight, but also that proper and permanent record of them may be made in its published reports.
