REMARKS

ROLAND L. TAYLOR, *President*

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

We usually try to start very promptly, but we waited a little while today on account of the bad weather. It is certainly very encouraging to the officers to find such a large audience even in bad weather.

You will note that you have a new presiding officer today, and he feels very greatly honored at his choice by the Trustees, and, of course, the Trustees receive their authority solely from you members of the Association. It is a very great honor indeed to be President of this Association which has done a notable work for some fifty-eight years. In this country, where everything is new, that is quite a period of time for a philanthropic, purely voluntary organization to exist. I venture to say that there are not very many organizations with such a purpose, which have existed as long as fifty-eight years in any of the European Countries.

Great as is my appreciation of the honor that has been done to me in the selection as President of the Association, my regret at the resignation of the late president is greater. Mr. Emory McMichael filled the office with dignity and distinction. (Applause.) As a presiding officer he showed a very fine consideration for the feelings and opinions of all of his associates. I do not suppose there is anybody in the city that is more beloved, and it was a regret to all of us that he should feel it necessary, on account of his intention to travel extensively, to resign from the presidency. He stays with us, however, as a Trustee, and when he settles down again after sowing his "wild oats," I am sure we will enjoy him and get the benefit of his advice as much as ever.

We are also very sad to have suffered a severe loss in the death of Mr. Crawford, the Executive Secretary. He was astonishingly well-fitted for that office, and during the years in which he filled it I think the Association has grown and prospered to a marked degree. Before he was Executive Secretary, of course, he was for many years, among the most active and valuable Trustees, so that his service with this Association goes back for a very long period.

We are fortunate in having discovered another gentleman who we think is going to carry on that work with efficiency, Mr. Henri Marceau. His education in art, and his profession as connected with the Museum and art in general, of course, fit him eminently, provided he has the other qualities to carry on the executive work of this Association—work as Executive Secretary, I should say—and I am sure that he has the other qualifications particularly as to art which will add so much to his ability to see and take advantage of the purposes of our organization. Mr. Marceau will present the Annual Report of the Trustees. (Applause.)

FIFTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

January 30, 1930.

To the Members of the Fairmount Park Art Association:

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

Your Board presents its Fifty-eighth Annual Report.

It is with the most sincere and profound regret that we record the loss by death during the past year of three members, whose interest in the purpose and activities of your Association was always an inspiration to their associates and whose counsel in the deliberations and decisions of your Board was of a value it is difficult adequately to express.

At the April meeting of your Board the President announced the death of Mr. Samuel Rea and, at the first meeting of the Board after the summer recess, it was a sorrowful duty to note the passing of Mr. Edgar V. Seeler, an active and helpful Trustee for many years, and of Mr. Andrew Wright Crawford, Trustee and Executive Secretary of the Association for more than a quarter of a century.

The following Resolutions have been spread upon the Minutes of the Board and are now herewith incorporated in the Annual Report:

SAMUEL REA

"Whereas Samuel Rea had been a member of the Board of Trustees of the Fairmount Park Art Association since January 28, 1926;

"And whereas Mr. Rea's interest in the physical development and improvement of the City was evinced not only by his direct action as President of the Pennsylvania Railroad in connection with the rebuilding of the Broad Street spur, including the reclamation of the West bank of the Schuylkill River; but also in the broad vision of the possibilities of the development of Parks and Highways in the metropolitan area of Philadelphia;

"Be it Resolved, that the Board of Trustees of the Fairmount Park Art Association place on record their high appreciation of Mr. Rea as an engineer, as a railroader and as a citizen, and their sincere sense of their own personal loss in the encouragement, foresight and inspiration which his presence on the Board gave to its deliberations.

"Be it also Resolved, that copies of this Resolution be sent to his family and be printed in the report."

ANDREW WRIGHT CRAWFORD

"The late Andrew Wright Crawford became a member of the Fairmount Park Art Association in 1903 and was elected a member of the Board of Trustees later in the same year. As a Trustee he took an active part in the councils of the Board and represented the Association as a delegate at many conventions and meetings on art and its application in various fields. On June 27, 1922, he resigned as Trustee to become Executive Secretary of the Association, which office he held until the date of his death.

"He discharged the duties of his office with diligence and marked efficiency and was particularly successful in building up the membership of the Association.

"Be it therefore Resolved, that the Board of Trustees of the Fairmount Park Art Association record their sincere and deep regret at the loss of Andrew Wright Crawford as a valued associate and an efficient executive.

"And be it further Resolved, that the foregoing Minute be properly engrossed and presented to the family and printed in the report."

EDGAR V. SEELER

"Whereas in the passing of Edgar V. Seeler the Fairmount Park Art Association has lost one of its most useful and honored Trustees, a sensitive, able and well-trained architect, a conscientious and able worker, who gave freely of his time and talent to the affairs of the Association over a long term of years, be it

"Resolved, that the Board of Trustees of the Fairmount Park Art Association record its heartfelt appreciation of Mr. Seeler as a man, as well as of his invaluable services to the Association; and be it further

"Resolved, that the Board expresses its grief in the loss of such an able, cheerful and enthusiastic co-worker by sending a copy of these Resolutions to the family and having them printed in the Annual Report."

This is perhaps an appropriate time to give recognition of the special service rendered to the Association and to the community by Mr. Crawford during recent years in the preparation and subsequent elaboration for publication of our yearly reports, including the detailed record of the proceedings of our annual meetings.

For a number of years, reference has been made and information presented to you in respect to the various projects in which your Association has been interested. It is now a satisfaction to advise

you that we may regard as completed chapters in our history our activities in connection with several of these undertakings, among which are the Shakespeare Memorial and your gift to the City of The Amazon. This Statue and the Lion Fighter presented by our Association some years ago, now occupy the pedestals on either side of the great stairway leading to the Art Museum from the Parkway.

CHILDS-DREXEL MEMORIAL

This is another of our responsibilities which has been satisfactorily concluded. You will recall from previous reports that many years ago a fund originally consisting of about \$2,500 had been entrusted to us for the establishment of a suitable memorial to the friendship of two of our most distinguished citizens. This fund had increased to about \$5,000, and in our last report you were advised that it had been determined to apply this fund to the establishment of a Recreation Room for the men students at the Drexel Institute, to be forever maintained in name and memory of these two friends who had the interests of the Drexel Institute so much at heart. The fund was turned over to Dr. Matheson, President of the Institute, last summer; the room was designed and furnished on plans approved by your Board and a suitable tablet placed on its walls. This room is now in daily use and is a much appreciated and fitting employment of the fund entrusted to us.

Another of our interests which has been recently happily concluded is the

JOHN MARSHALL STATUE

presented to the City by the Honorable James M. Beck, a Vice-President of your Association. As has been already reported to you, this is a replica of the statue of Chief Justice John Marshall, by William Wetmore Story, the original being located to the West of the Capitol in Washington. Your Association contributed the cost of a very handsome and appropriate pedestal and the statue has been placed on the terrace of the Western front of the Art Museum, facing up the Schuylkill River. Dedicatory exercises under the auspices of the Commissioners of Fairmount Park, the Fairmount Park Art Association and the Law Association of Philadelphia were held on the afternoon of January 7, 1930. A scholarly and unusually interesting address was delivered by John Frederick Lewis, Esq. Other distinguished speakers were the Honorable Joseph Buffington, Judge of the United States Circuit Court of Appeals, former Senator George Wharton Pepper, and the Chief Justice of Pennsylvania, Robert von Moschzisker. The contribution of your Association was a very substantial one, and we believe you will agree with your Board that the last year has been one of accomplishment in many respects.

THE JOHN HARRISON MEMORIAL

Under the Will of the late Thomas Skelton Harrison, your Association was named as Joint Trustee with Mr. H. Norris Harrison, entrusted with the duty of erecting in a suitable place a life-size bronze statue of John Harrison, the first manufacturer of sulphuric acid, and perhaps the founder in 1793 of the chemical industry in the United States. The sculptor selected for the work, Mr. F. Linn Jenkins, unfortunately died before his model was completed, and this caused some unanticipated complications and delays. Your Board, however, is glad to now report that several months ago the distinguished sculptor, Lawrence Tenney Stevens was selected to make a new study of the project, and has just completed a satisfactory one-third size model of the proposed statue. It is hoped that the memorial may be finished during the coming year.

SCULPTURE PRIZE

You are reminded that the Fairmount Park Art Association has offered a prize of \$1,000 for a work in Sculpture, suitable for permanent erection out-of-doors, to be shown at the 1930 Exhibition of Sculpture-in-the-Open-Air to be held in Rittenhouse Square during the coming Spring. The award of the prize is in the hands of a Committee of five persons to be appointed in accordance with the terms of a resolution of your Board reported to you at the last Annual Meeting.

ELLEN PHILLIPS SAMUEL BEQUEST

You are, of course, familiar with the terms of the splendid bequest and with the opportunities for usefulness offered to your Association under its provisions. You will remember that the yearly income now amounting to more than \$30,000 is to be used for the erection along the East River Drive of Statuary emblematic of the early settlers of America. Mrs. Samuel's residuary estate was to pass to the Fairmount Park Art Association upon the death of her husband, under whose care the value of the bequest had been largely increased. Mr. Samuel died more than a year ago, but your Association has not yet come into possession of the bequest. Our legal interests are being cared for in the office of Mr. Franklin Spencer Edmonds, and it is expected that a satisfactory settlement will be concluded shortly.

There have been no developments of special interest in connection with other Funds entrusted to your Association.

RECENT IMPROVEMENTS TO THE PARKWAY

A noteworthy incident in the development of the Parkway in which our Association has always been so actively interested was the recent completion and opening to the public of the Rodin

Museum, the splendid proposed gift to the City of Philadelphia by the generous and useful citizen, the late Jules E. Mastbaum, whose purpose was enthusiastically fulfilled by Mrs. Mastbaum and his Estate, on plans prepared and perfected by Mr. Jacques Greber and Mr. Paul P. Cret.

No civic developments have seemed more important to your Association than the Art Museum at Fairmount, the Parkway, and the reclamation of the banks of the Schuylkill River. The generosity of many of our citizens has given to Philadelphia to be housed in its new Museum treasures of inestimable value and both the present and the future offer opportunities for further gifts of additions to the already remarkable collections.

Of the Parkway we shall only say—"what would we do without it?"—and briefly recall that Mr. Charles B. Hall told us at the Annual Meeting in 1926 that in the enhancement of taxable value of surrounding property, it has already more than paid for itself.

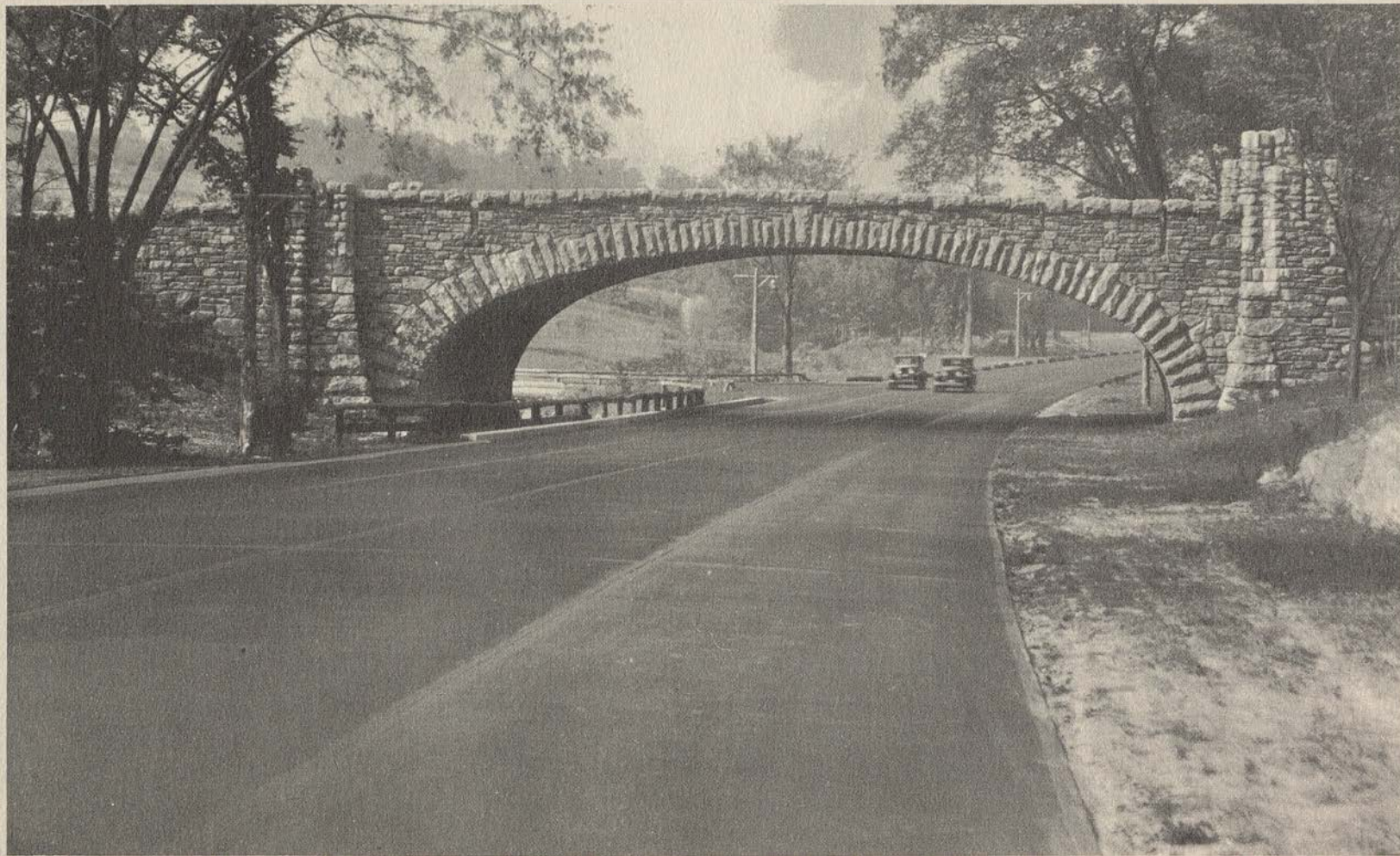
During the last year the Pennsylvania Railroad has made real progress in the carrying out of its plans as outlined to us by General Atterbury, President, and Mr. Temple, its Chief Engineer, at the Annual Meeting of your Association in January of 1927, and we are promised that within a few months the suburban trains will be using the new terminal facilities.

The City continues to acquire the property needed for the Parkways on both banks of the Schuylkill and it is hopefully expected that next year we shall be able to record a substantial accomplishment by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad of the improvements described to us by Mr. Widener at the Annual Meeting of 1928.

Your Board feels that we can review the years that are behind us with the satisfaction of knowing that our Association has always had an important influence in every project for the adornment of our Parks and Parkways and for the beautification of our City. Certainly we can also look forward with encouragement to a long life of continued usefulness, the extent of which will be measured by the personal interest of our members. Each one of you can be helpful by getting one or two friends to join the Association. Their names should be sent to the office of the Fairmount Park Art Association, 510 South Broad Street.

ELECTIONS

Your Board has accepted with regret the resignation of Mr. Emory McMichael as President of the Fairmount Park Art Association, because of his expected prolonged absence from the City. Mr. Roland L. Taylor has been elected to fill the vacancy thus created. The Board also announces the election of Henri Gabriel Marceau as Executive Secretary.

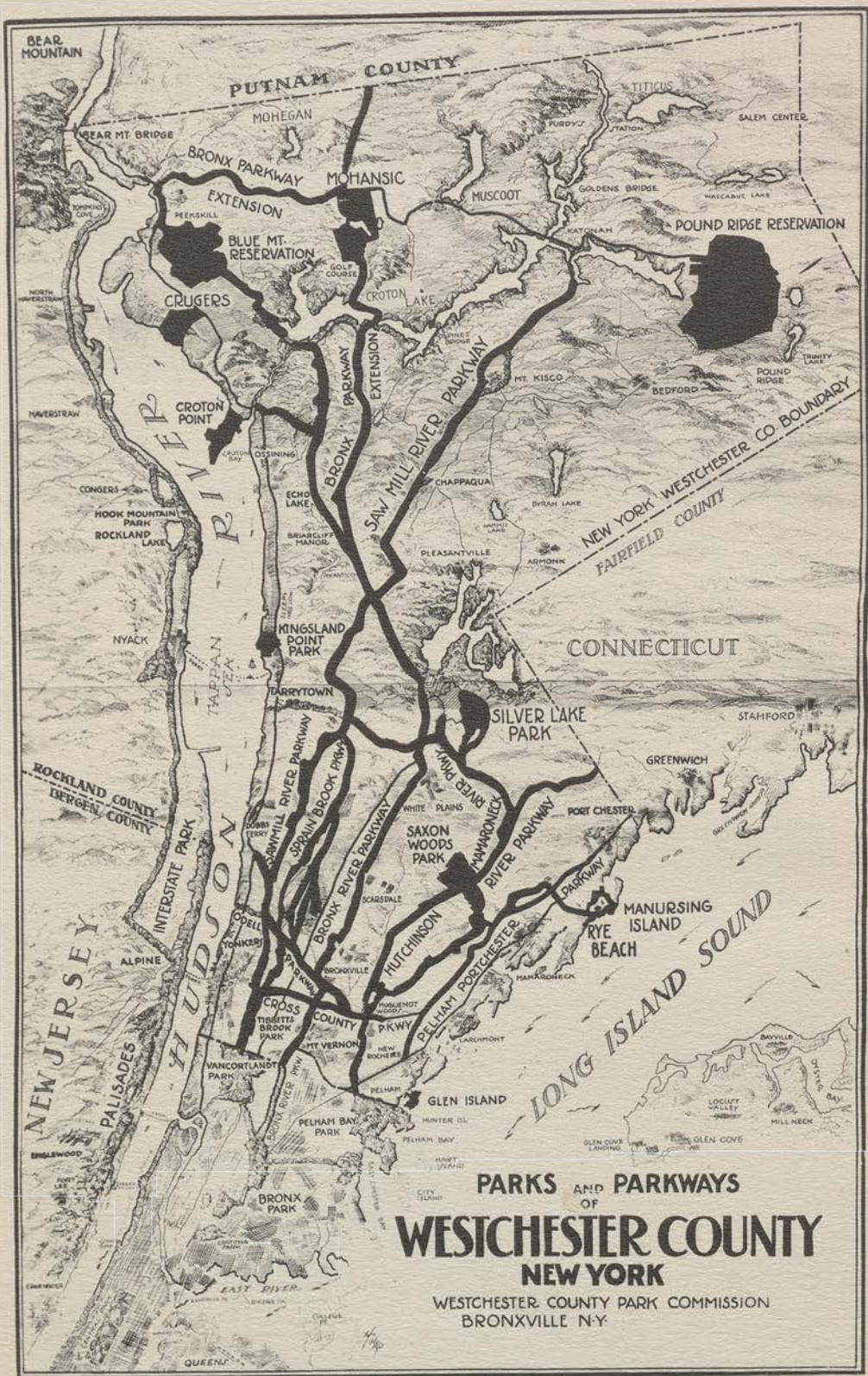

ADDRESS

WESTCHESTER COUNTY PARK SYSTEM

By JAY DOWNER, *Chief Engineer*

WESTCHESTER COUNTY PARK COMMISSION

It is an honor and a real pleasure to come here today to address the members of this distinguished Association. We in Westchester, who are now in the midst of our park program, feel a certain humility in coming to this group, who have already done such great things. We have long looked to Philadelphia with admiration and have tried to emulate your work. You have truly accomplished a great deal and have set an example for the rest of the country, of which you may well be proud.

The work of which I will speak is not the work of a great city, but of the environs of a great city and it has a peculiar interest at this time because in so many instances officials of our large cities feel that their position is almost hopeless in some respects; at least, their problems are so difficult and costly to remedy that they can only hope for a solution to develop itself, which at best is a slow process. But city planners and thinking citizens everywhere recognize that in the suburbs of these cities there is still time to profit by the costly experiences of the older sections.

And so, in Westchester County we are trying to do just the obvious, sensible, business-like thing. It is rather remarkable that the adoption of a policy, which must necessarily be established in any great private enterprise, should attract so much attention when applied to a County government. We have had behind us, as the Chairman has told you, a political system which made the application of sound business principles possible; that is, we have had honesty in our politics so long that our people trust their public officials to spend large sums of money. The result has been that with the backing and not the interference of our political friends, we have during the past seven years established a park system which embodies not only new conceptions of public recreational centers and motor traffic parkways, but an effective demonstration that the program, which now involves appropriations of more than \$60,000,000, rests on a secure economic foundation.

REGIONAL AND ECONOMIC BACKGROUND

Westchester County embraces a roughly funnel-shaped area including about 450 square miles of territory lying between the Hudson River and Long Island Sound, from the northern boundary of New York City to Putnam County on the north, and forming the only mainland approach to New York City. It was one of the

twelve original counties of the State of New York erected in 1683 by the Provincial Assembly of what was then the Province of New York. Entirely independent of New York City as a political entity, Westchester County includes forty-six subordinate municipalities consisting of the four cities of Yonkers, Mount Vernon, New Rochelle and White Plains, eighteen townships and twenty-four villages, having a combined population of about 500,000 people.

New York City's steady growth northward on Manhattan Island and beyond the Harlem River has been reflected in a corresponding growth and expansion of suburban development in Westchester County. This growth has proceeded at an accelerated rate in recent years particularly in the area south of an imaginary line from Tarrytown on the Hudson River, easterly to White Plains and Port Chester on the Long Island shore. In the cities of Yonkers, Mount Vernon and New Rochelle, strung across the northerly boundary of New York City from the Hudson River to the Sound, building growth is rapidly closing up the intervening spaces. The smaller communities as far north as Tarrytown and White Plains, although separated by wider spaces, are also growing toward each other at a rapid rate.

From this brief description we may roughly visualize this area with its hitherto practically unplanned suburban development of cities and villages strung along the Hudson River and Long Island Sound and along the railroad lines through the intervening territory. These various communities are connected by an extensive network of highways, many of them dating from the colonial period and until the reconstruction carried on in recent years, a typical rural road system.

The through traffic from and to New York City was carried on two principal routes—the Boston Post Road paralleling Long Island Sound on the east, and the Albany Post Road paralleling the Hudson River on the west. Each of these is an ancient highway which passes through the center of each City and Village it traverses. This through traffic superimposed on the local business traffic brought about intolerable conditions. At the same time the development of the County, particularly the more southerly portion previously described, was rapidly encroaching on all available recreational areas.

These conditions became so pressing that in 1921 business men and County leaders realized that something radical must be done or the orderly development of the County would be seriously impaired. The result was the passage of an Act by the State Legislature empowering the Westchester County Board of Supervisors to appoint a Commission to be known as the Westchester County Park Commission, to study the situation, acquire lands and develop parks and parkways throughout the County. Such a Commission

was appointed in 1922. It immediately organized and began the studies which have resulted in the creation of the Westchester County Park System. All the lands for the routes and park areas already acquired aggregate more than 17,000 acres. Development work has proceeded rapidly on several of the parkways and park areas, as will be more particularly described.

ELEMENTS OF THE PARK AND PARKWAY PLAN

If the map of Westchester be stripped of all other detail, the Park System and particularly the arterial traffic parkways, appear to any one familiar with the terrain as embracing the main elements of a general plan which will very largely mould the future development of the County. This system should be visualized as having been superimposed upon a stratum of existing suburban development which was rapidly closing up all vacant spaces in the southerly part of the County. Naturally the plan could not be wholly idealistic because compromises had to be effected with existing conditions.

The lines of this regional park system were dictated by certain well defined fundamentals combining not only planning but economic principles involving the following considerations:

Waterfront parks along the Hudson River and Long Island Sound shores and interior parks, reservations and forest preserves providing for a wide range of recreational uses.

An inter-connecting system of traffic parkways, which in general follow small stream valleys.

Selection was made of the cheapest undeveloped lands such as low-lying stream valleys, marshes, stream and pond margins, or rocky uplands undesirable and difficult to develop for residential or business uses. Such areas are ideal for park purposes and as such are allocated to their most valuable economic utilization in the general scheme of County development.

Interwoven with the foregoing was the necessity for effecting the most feasible compromises with existing municipal developments and with the unplanned suburban growth. One of the most important requirements was prompt action in acquiring lands in advance of rapidly rising values, leaving the shortest possible gap between planning and execution.

Following these basic principles, waterfront park areas were laid out at Kingsland Point, Croton Point and Crugers along the Hudson River, and at Glen Island and Rye Beach on the Long Island Sound shore. The main parkway elements of the system traversing the County north and south in the direction of its greatest length follow the valleys of the Saw Mill River, Bronx River and the Hutchinson River, which are separated by north and south ridges paralleling the Hudson River.

The interior reservations include Tibbetts Brook Park and Woodlands Park on the westerly side of the County forming localized expansions of the Saw Mill River Parkway; Willsons Woods, New Rochelle Lakes, Huguenot Woods and Saxon Woods Park along the route of the Hutchinson River Parkway in the easterly section of the County, and Silver Lake Park near White Plains and bordering a connecting parkway from the Mamaroneck River valley to the Bronx River Parkway at Kensico Dam.

In the open country of northern Westchester are the 1,500-acre Blue Mountain Reservation on the route of the Briarcliff-Peekskill Parkway, Mohansic Park of 1,100 acres through which an extension of the Bronx River Parkway will pass, and the Poundridge Reservation embracing 4,000 acres of forest preserve tied into the parkway system by a main state highway.

The north and south parkways traversing the stream valleys and in the direction of greatest traffic flow, serve the multiple purposes of open recreational areas, motor traffic routes of least resistance, the natural drainage routes of trunk sewers and possible future locations of water supply conduits and other public utilities.

The parkway reservations, which include controlling strips of land on both sides of the streams, also forestall the development of nuisance conditions such as were found along the Bronx River Parkway and led to its construction principally as a sanitary improvement project prior to the general County park program.

The parkway system is also co-ordinated with the older existing County highways. Continuity with New York City's parks stretched across its northern boundary is formed by the Saw Mill River Parkway, Bronx River Parkway and the Hutchinson River Parkway, which connect respectively with Van Cortlandt Park, Bronx Park and Pelham Bay Park.

PROGRESS

The Bronx River Parkway completed in 1925, was the first regional parkway project in Westchester County and was a joint undertaking between the County of Westchester and City of New York, twelve and one-half miles of the parkway being located within the County and three miles within the City.

The work of the Westchester County Park Commission begun in 1922, has established a regional park system which now includes the Bronx River Parkway and embraces within the limits of Westchester County, 17,000 acres of land. One hundred and sixty miles of parkway routes, and nine miles of beaches and shore lines along the Hudson River and Long Island Sound shores. This work has involved the acquisition of about 3,500 separate parcels of land, a large proportion of which was acquired by direct purchase from owners, thus avoiding the delays incidental to tedious condemnation proceedings.

Coincidentally, with the acquisition of land, a construction and development program has carried to completion seven new large scale recreational developments including bathing beaches, bath houses, concrete swimming pools, a wide range of athletic recreation and picnicking grounds, three public golf courses, forest preserve areas and a seaside amusement park embodying a unique and unusual feature under municipal operation. Under this development program, twenty-four miles of fully developed traffic parkways have been completed, giving a total of thirty-six miles including the Bronx River Parkway, with additional mileage under construction.

The Westchester County type of parkway is receiving increasing recognition as the most practicable solution of the arterial highway problem from an economic standpoint because these parkways have enhanced real estate values along their routes. In their economic effects, a marked contrast is presented by the parkway type of traffic way, creating attractive residential zones and higher property values, as against the destruction or depression of values now clearly in progress along modern highways flanked with miles of billboards and hot dog stands instead of marginal strips of grass and trees.

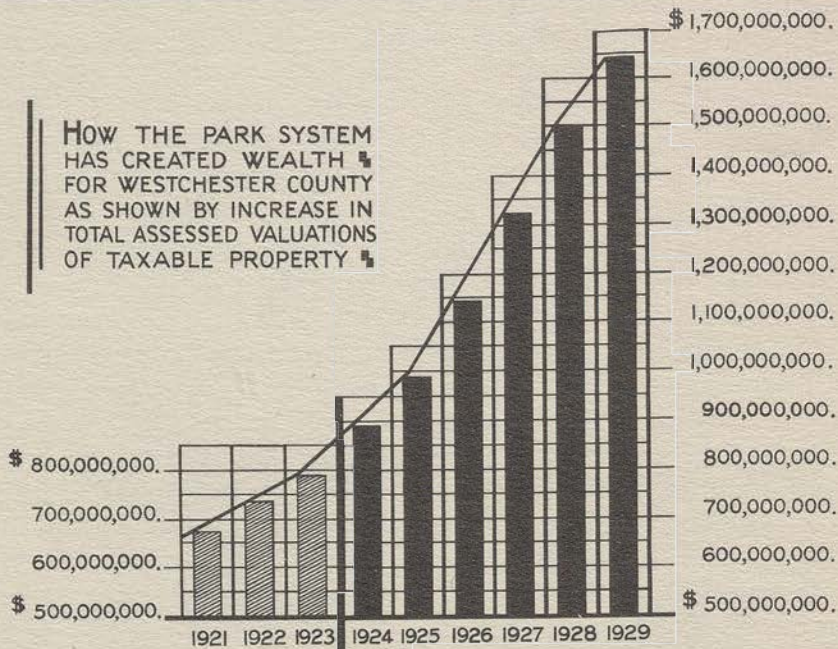
The basic practice in laying out these parkways has been to secure strips having a minimum width of 200 feet. In localities where land is cheapest or there is a pond, small stream, or the possibility of developing a water surface feature, localized enlargements of the reservation have been made.

As to the motor driveways, the standard practice is to lay pavements forty feet wide for four lanes of traffic. Grade separations have been effected at all main intersecting thoroughfares which are carried over or under the parkway drive by bridges. The rigid frame type of stone-faced reinforced concrete bridge has been applied to the grade separation problems with very satisfactory results both as to economy of construction and pleasing architectural adaptations. On the Bronx River Parkway the type of pavement was a concrete base with two and one-half inches of bituminous wearing surface, but the newer projects are standardized on reinforced concrete pavement, with asphaltic emulsion applied to eliminate glare. Grading and bridge openings are being carried through to a width of sixty feet, as the necessity for increasing the initial forty-foot pavement width to sixty feet in the not distant future, is foreseen.

ECONOMICS

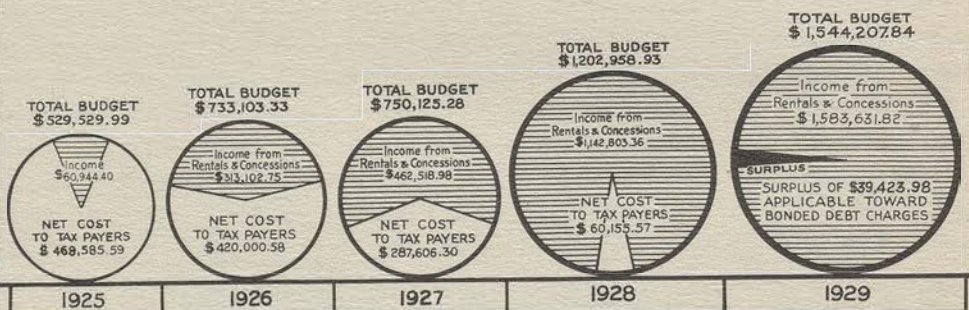
The park program is financed as to capital investment in lands and permanent improvements, through the standard type of county bonds running for forty-five to fifty years and usually underwritten at an interest rate of four per cent.

From 1923 to March, 1930, the total capital appropriations were as follows:

Although not susceptible of exact calculation, it may reasonably be held that the creation of enhanced property valuations has fully offset the capital appropriations regardless of the public welfare benefits of the park system. The sharp upward trend in assessed valuations immediately after the establishment of the park system has been definitely proven.

The influence of the park program is apparent in the increased valuations in 1924 and subsequent years. From 1924, when this influence became evident, up to and including 1929, the total increase in assessed valuations was \$856,085,228. At the previous rate of increase the total for the same six-year period would have been about \$350,000,000. An increase of about \$500,000,000 or about eight times the total amount of the appropriations is, therefore, reasonably attributable to the park program.

Similarly striking results also have been attained in the rapidity of progress toward the attainment of self-support as to operating and maintenance expenses through revenue derived from rentals, concessions and nominal charges to the public for the use of special features such as bath houses, swimming pools, golf courses and amusement park features.

The chart figures show the rapid building up of income from the park system, which for the year 1929 over-balanced the operation and maintenance budget with a surplus of \$39,423.98.

Although the importance of a regional park system as an item of major importance in planning for the future growth of Westchester was clearly foreseen, considerable courage was required to launch it as the largest scale improvement program ever undertaken by the County. But officials and leading citizens had full confidence that the ultimate results would amply justify the enterprise. The results which are shown by the economic chart have been attained in a much shorter period of time than originally was anticipated.

The demonstration afforded by Westchester County that the idealism of a well conceived planning program may also rest on a sound economic basis is providing stimulus to many other municipalities both in this country and abroad. (Applause.)

MR. TAYLOR: Just a moment, please. After the motion which I am about to put to you, we will ask you to go to the South Room and have luncheon with us. We have listened to the history of a very extraordinary achievement given in a very interesting, charming manner. I want to ask you to join me in a rising vote of thanks to Mr. Downer personally and to the Westchester Park Commission for the courtesy of allowing him to come here to be with us today.

Mr. Busch moved that the Fifty-eighth Annual Report of the Board of Trustees of the Fairmount Park Art Association be accepted and referred to the incoming Board and that the Secretary be instructed to have the usual number of copies printed and distributed. Seconded and carried.

The Treasurer's Report, duly audited, was presented by headings. Mr. Roberts moved that the Treasurer's Report be accepted and referred to the incoming Board for publication. Seconded and carried.

The terms of six Trustees having expired, Judge Linn nominated Messrs. John S. Jenks, Benjamin R. Hoffman, J. Franklin McFadden, J. Rodman Paul, W. Hinckle Smith and George S. Webster for the term of three years and until their successors are chosen. It was moved that nominations be closed and that the Executive Secretary be instructed to cast one ballot for those nominated. Seconded and carried. The Executive Secretary reported that he had cast the ballot accordingly. The President announced the election of the nominees. The President then asked whether any member present wished to bring up any business before the meeting. There being no response, Mr. Taylor proceeded to introduce the speaker, Mr. Jay Downer, who delivered an address on the Westchester County Park System.

On motion, the meeting adjourned.
