

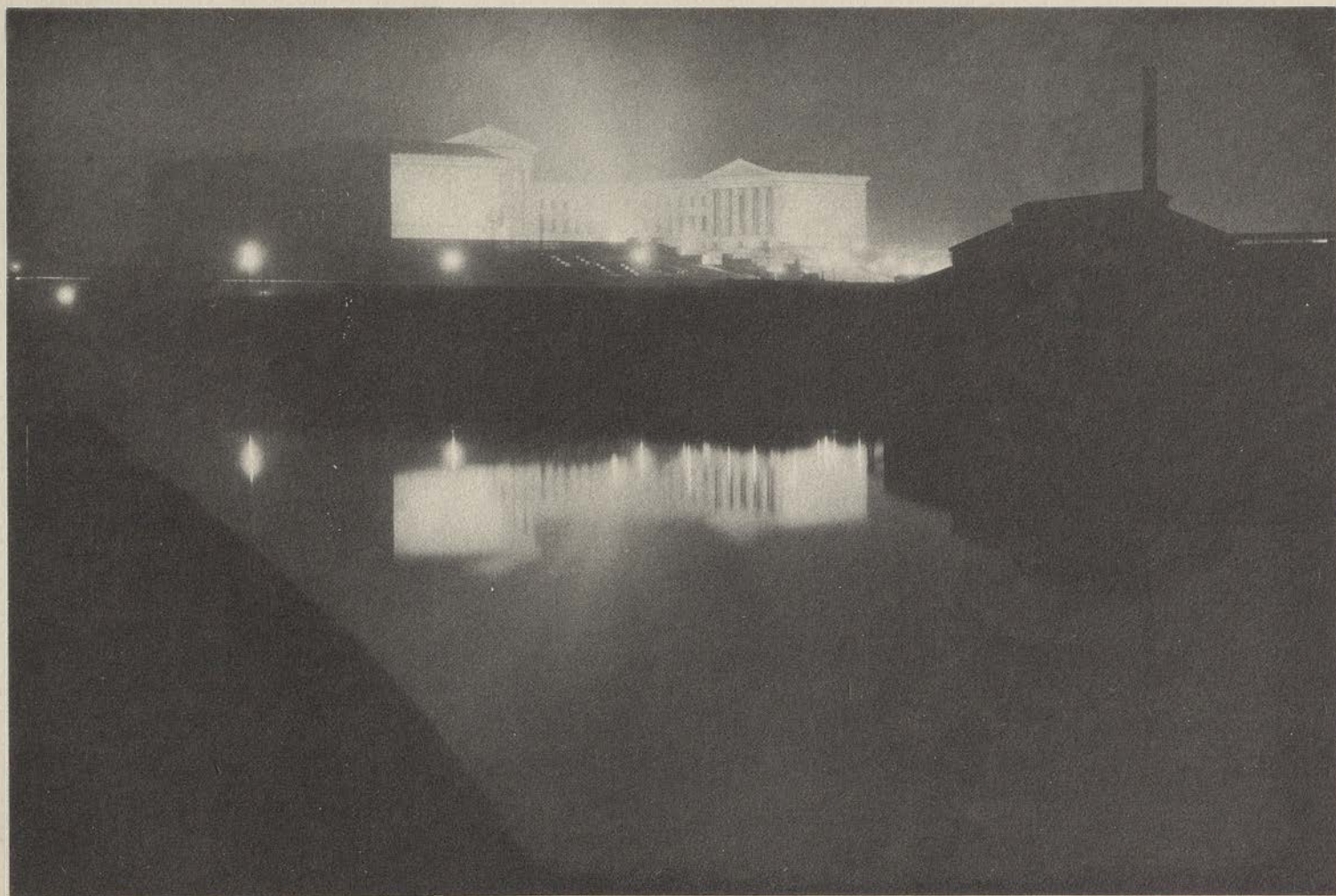

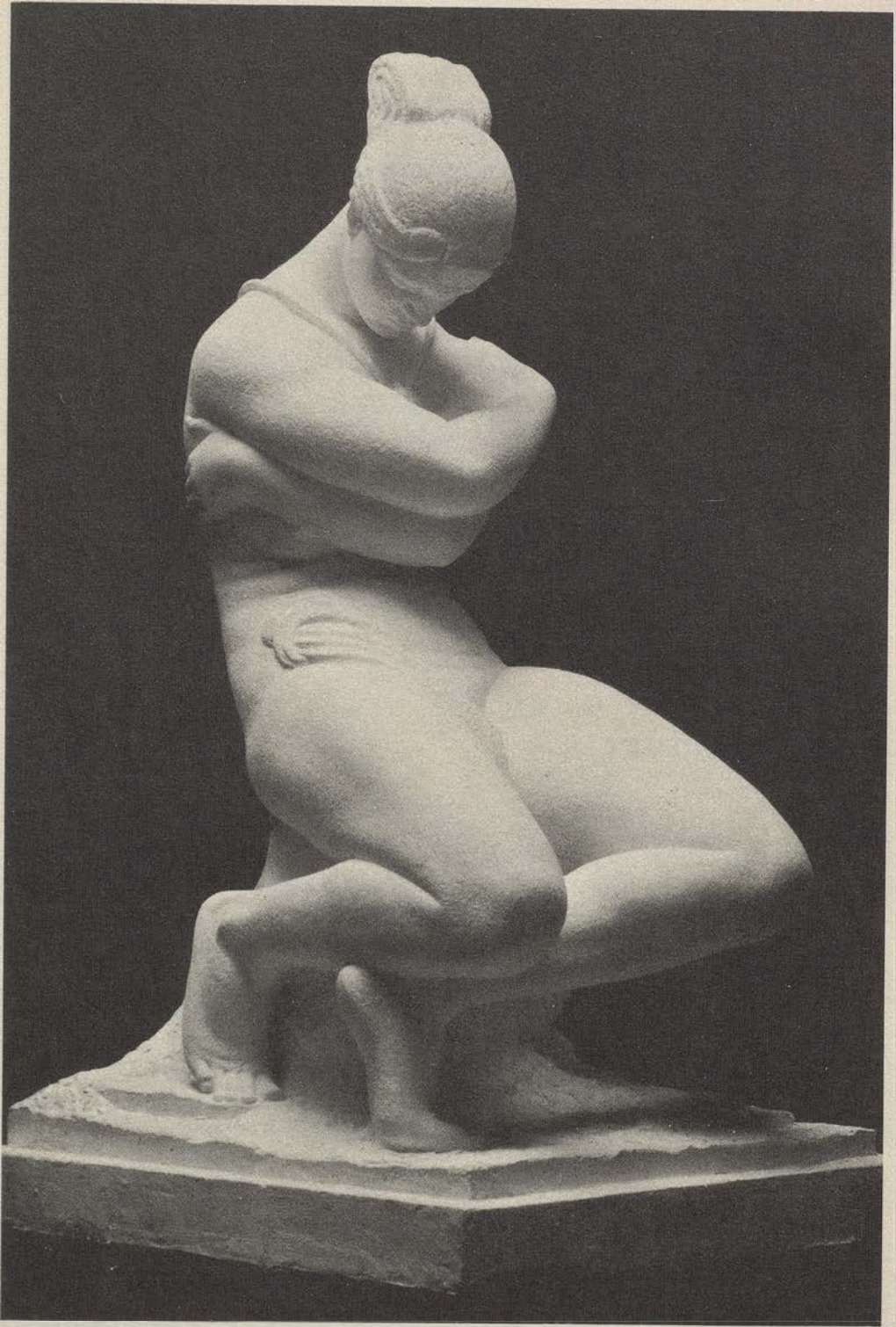

FIFTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

January 22, 1931.

To the Members of the Fairmount Park Art Association:

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

The year just past has not been one devoted to the public dedication of accomplished projects. Your Board has occupied itself, rather, with the necessary duty of making future dedications possible by considering plans for suitably carrying out the many important trusts, of which your Association is the guardian. It is with pleasure that your Board reports progress on

THE JOHN HARRISON MEMORIAL

which your Association and H. Norris Harrison, as joint Trustees under the Will of the late Thomas Skelton Harrison, are entrusted with erecting. The original plan, as reported at the last meeting, was to erect a life-size bronze statue to the memory of this distinguished pioneer of the chemical industry. Your Committee on the Harrison Memorial, in collaboration with your Board, decided to increase the figure from eight to ten feet, thereby achieving greater monumental character and avoiding the optical illusion which causes bronzes to appear smaller than the plaster models from which they were cast. Your Committee made several trips to the sculptor's studio in New York and offered suggestions which have been successfully incorporated into the final design. It seems to all who have seen it that the figure, as finally treated, will serve as a dignified memorial to one of our important citizens and will, at the same time, always remain as an admirable work of art, a dual quality which is most desirable. The figure at the present time is being cast and, it is hoped, will soon be delivered for your inspection.

THE ELLEN PHILLIPS SAMUEL BEQUEST

has been another frequent object of business at the monthly meetings of your Board. The last year has witnessed the satisfactory disposition of the various legal questions relating to this legacy and your

Association is now in a position to proceed with plans for carrying out the Trust, which envisions the beautification of a portion of the East River Drive through the medium of a sculptural ensemble emblematic of the History of America. It has seemed wise to your Committee in charge of this project to secure the services of Paul P. Cret in making a survey of the problem with a mind to suggesting a suitable plan for our guidance. This survey, with due respect to the importance of the problem to be studied, will require considerable time. You are assured that every effort will be made to do honor to the original thought in such manner as will reflect credit upon the City of Philadelphia, as well as maintain the splendid traditions of your Association. It has been a source of gratification to the members of your Board, as it must now be to you, to receive notice during the past year, of the

left to your Association by one of its former members. The specific portion of the Will, which applies to the Association, reads as follows:

"Fifth: One-half of all the rest, residue and remainder of my estate, to the Pennsylvania Museum and School of Industrial Art, to be invested and the income only to be used for such permanent additions or improvements, as may be approved by the directors thereof; and the other one-half to the Fairmount Park Art Association, to be invested and the income only to be used for such permanent additions, or improvements, as may be approved by the directors thereof."

It is, perhaps, not out of place to reflect for a moment upon the obvious conclusions which may be drawn from the mention, in the same paragraph, of the Art Museum and the Art Association. It is, we may believe, a fairly good index of the high regard in which both organizations are held, a regard which is necessarily based upon the achievement which has made of one the leading Museum in the country and of the other an Association of unique importance.

During the past year, it has been possible to co-operate again with the Philadelphia Art Alliance in promoting the Biennial Exhibitions

of sculpture which are held in Rittenhouse Square. Your Association has again underwritten a portion of the expense and has made possible the giving of the first prize of one thousand dollars, which was awarded to Oronzio Maldarelli for his figure "Resignation." The jury of award, acting under the chairmanship of a member of your Board, consisted of a representative of each of the following organizations:

The Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts
The National Sculpture Society
The Philadelphia Chapter of the American Institute
of Architects and
The Fairmount Park Commission.

THE ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE AMERICAN FEDERATION OF ARTS

was held in Washington during May, 1930. Your Association, being a member of this important organization, was represented at the sessions. It was pointed out that the Federation had vigorously supported the retention of works of art on the free list at the hearings preparatory to the revision of the Tariff. The Federation also supported the Cramton-Capper Bill, passed by both Houses and designed to preserve the natural beauty of scenery along the Potomac from Mt. Vernon to Great Falls. A resolution was passed at the final session of the Convention endorsing the Vestal Design Copyright Bill, which aims to prevent the pirating of designs used commercially. Another event at which your Association was represented was the

held in Philadelphia in November. Your Association co-operated with other organizations in playing host to a large representation of men and women who were most interested in the progress made toward the realization of the Tri-State Regional Plan, concerning which you will hear complete details this afternoon.

RECENT DEVELOPMENTS IN THE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN FOR THE BEAUTIFICATION OF THE CITY

It is always a source of interest to us to witness the progress which is made each year toward the realization of the plans made

years ago for the reclamation of certain sections of our city. The year just past has brought several of these closer to realization. In passing, may we recall the completion and inauguration of the new Suburban Station of the Pennsylvania Railroad, the completion of its splendid rail bridge over the Schuylkill and the important improvements in course of realization in the area which is to be the West Philadelphia Terminal. Many of us have noted the improvements already made to the banks of the Schuylkill in the vicinity of the Art Museum, a change which all of us most heartily commend. We have witnessed the preparation of the site on the Parkway of the New Franklin Institute building and the completion of the handsome building devoted to the uses of the Boy Scouts of America. We have heard that new schemes for bridge traffic control and the development of areas adjacent to Independence Square are being prepared by Jacques Gréber. We have all given, in the past, hearty support to such plans and as a body we should again affirm our interest and give our support to those who make these important civic improvements their life work.

THE TRI-STATE REGIONAL PLAN

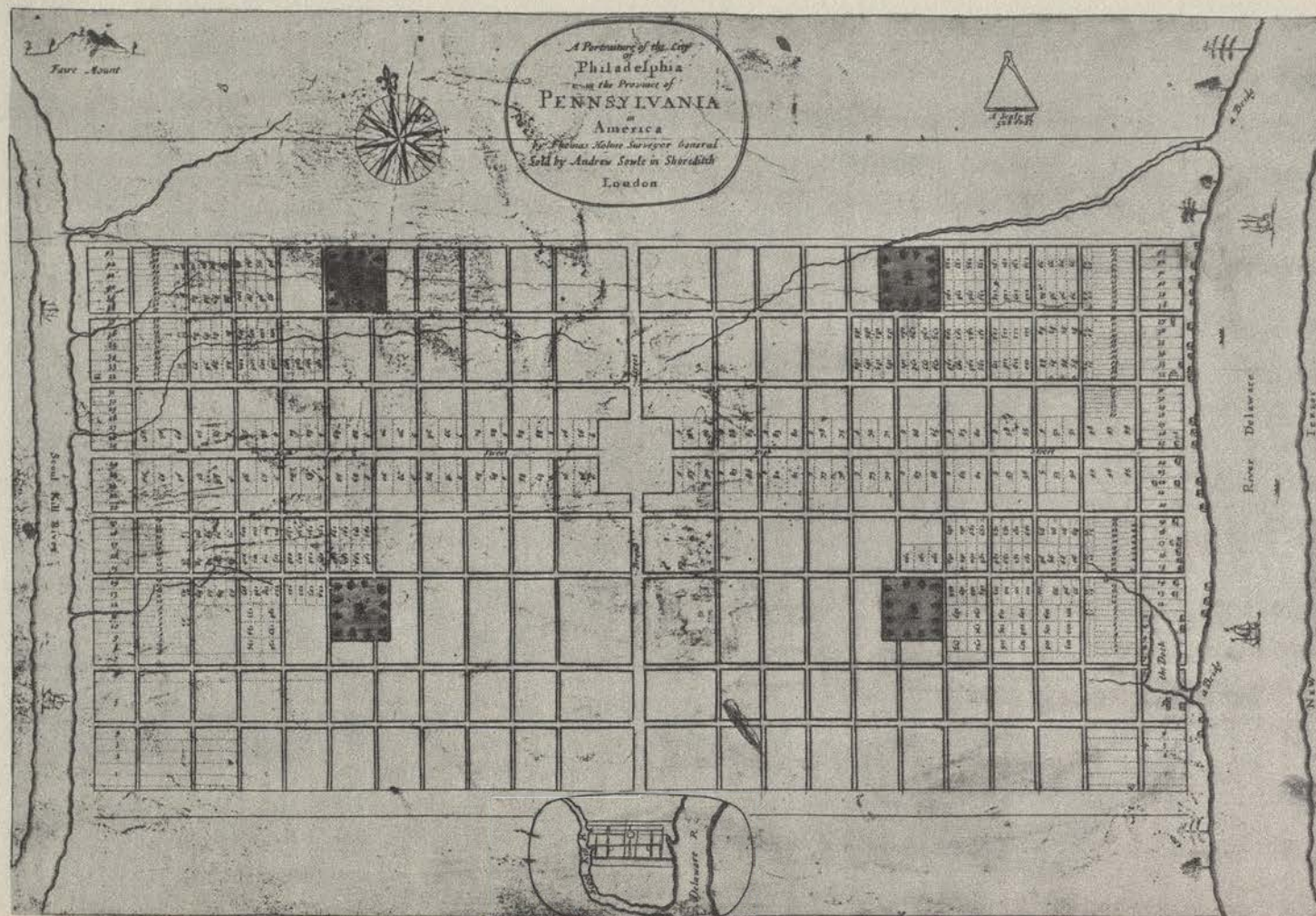

We always ask ourselves not what is in a plan, but who made it. It makes a tremendous difference. Consider, for example, the excellent work of the Fairmount Park Art Association. We do not see, spread over the community, maps and plans of the Association and yet the public knows there is a Board of Trustees who are thoroughly trusted with regard to the development of the art aspects of Fairmount Park. The City of Philadelphia in general and the public, have so much confidence in the Board of Trustees that those of us who are still fortunate enough to be here endorse such findings and recommendations as the Fairmount Park Art Association makes and co-operate toward their accomplishment, fully convinced that the plans are worthy of support. Those of us who are called away usually leave in our wills something which bears testimony to the capacity of that board.

We may offer to you some very admirable plans. It is not conceivable that all members of this audience could take the time to become convinced, of their own knowledge, that these plans are really good. It seems that we would take exception to many planning suggestions, until we were sure they came from people who had deliberated over pros and cons and were assured of their worthiness. As regards the City Planning Commission of Philadelphia, under the chairmanship of Joseph E. Widener, with capable technicians and Jacques Gréber, who planned cities in South America and in Europe, you are confident that the work is being done expertly. You are ready to praise and be thankful for the tenacity of purpose of workers such as Eli Kirk Price.

The Regional Planning Federation is a comparatively new organization. It is voluntary and advisory in character. It grew out of the realization that there is a great change taking place on the face of the earth. That change is very largely in the means of transportation. As the pedestrian gives way to the one-horse shay, the shay to the stage-coach and the stage-coach to the steam train, so each of the various means of transportation are superseded by more rapid ones, until we have predictions of speeds of four hundred miles an hour. The horse-and-buggy days are over. New problems must be met in a new way.

The Tri-State Regional Plan is the answer to these problems in the Philadelphia Tri-State District. This Plan is the product of this new organization—a group of people who have volunteered to bring forth a study which they have promised shall be expert, the best judgment of a Technical Advisory Committee of two hundred men comprising the architects, landscape architects, consulting engineers and chief engineering officials of the Philadelphia Tri-State District in collaboration with the technical staff of the Regional Planning Federation and professional planners engaged as consultants.

With the gradual expansion of metropolitan areas, every city must face the question of whether it will permit the roads, streets and other facilities to develop haphazardly beyond the city limits or whether they will be studied and planned with the same thoroughness that the Fairmount Park Art Association displays in handling its problems. London has its Regional Plan. New York and Chicago have theirs. Major l'Enfant's Plan, made in Washington's time, is being followed today in this nation's capital.

After a three-year period of intensive study and analysis of the needs of this region, the Tri-State Regional Plan will be submitted this fall for the consideration of the people. We may not present a plan everyone will agree with in advance, but we do assure you that we are being guided by every consideration of what is really for the good of the whole community.

With lantern slides, I will give you a picture of the region that is being planned and an indication of the nature of our problems. Here is a relief map showing an area of 4,000 square miles around Philadelphia, the rivers which once were the basic means of transportation, together with the rugged hills and lowlands. This blue ribbon is the Delaware River, running from the northeast to the southwest. You see the Schuylkill and you know William Penn landed on a large plateau between the two rivers, with the object of taking advantage of water transportation. He had in mind the fact that there would always be residences in the high hills back of the plateau which he visioned as the ultimate city, as has actually happened. He showed marvelous foresight.

We should think here of the importance of geographical and geologic conditions of the Chester Valley. This white strip shows the Chester Valley. The valley of the Schuylkill is a rather low white area, 200 feet above sea-level. The darkest area on the relief map is 900 to 1,100 feet elevation—the high point, 1,100 feet, at Boyertown. Developing the great countryside for millions is the same as developing a few acres for a private estate—the terrain makes a great difference in the uses to which it is put. A few hundred years ago, it is said the ocean lapped the shores of the Fairmount hills. These hills were at the ocean front and New Jersey was under the ocean. I am not a geologist and I am not sure whether that is true or not.

Little creek valleys have cut deep gashes in the sides of the hills in Delaware, Chester, Bucks and Berks counties. They suggest a wonderful opportunity for parks and parkways and should be preserved for all time.

Population trends and growth are basic in planning. I suppose if you yourself came up the Delaware on the "Welcome" and found a large number of Indians, the population would interest you. If there was one Indian, you might land, but if there were numbers of them you might change your course. The distribution of population is fundamental. You must understand the factors that cause the population to concentrate where it does and give promise of increasing, decreasing, or migrating from one portion to another.

Then we have a series of projects in which we attempt to condense the problems of six overlapping efforts. The first is to suggest a system of major and secondary highways, boulevards, and bridges. The second: parks, parkways, and public reservations. The third and fourth are combined in a single study; railway passenger and freight transportation facilities; and waterways and ports. Of course, the importance of Philadelphia, from the point of view of port facilities is basic. Fifth: the problems of water supply and sanitation of those who look up stream for water supply and down stream for waste disposal. Sixth: the suggested system of airways and air landing fields is a modern phase which must be studied with reference to the future of the area.

Within two years after William Penn landed, he had his plan made by Thomas Holme, his surveyor-general. Even though the whole region was covered with trees, Penn indicated five great squares which should be perpetually green. He called Philadelphia his "Greene Countrie Towne." He was proud of the squares—of having the houses set far enough apart so they would not burn up. I don't know how he would like an airplane view of the City as it is now, but he did give us Washington Square, Franklin Square, Logan Square, Rittenhouse Square. And he did intend that Penn Square should be a beautiful green spot.

Now one finds very few trees except in these squares. When it is realized that at the time Penn landed here nearly 250 years ago there were only a few houses along the Delaware River, his vision is appreciated. Philadelphia did not extend much beyond Second or Third Street even in his time. He thought far out into the region. It was a long way into the country to the Schuylkill River.

Showing you how rapidly things go, in 1877, an artist drew this picture of Wilmington—a few houses on top of a hill. Wilmington was sparsely settled at that time. Now, it is a great contrast. Here is a sketch of Trenton as it was in 1776. Those of you who thread your way through the crowded traffic centers of Trenton realize things have happened rapidly.

In 1870 the population distribution in the outlying portion of the region was less than 100 to the square mile, while in the heart of the City of Philadelphia there were 25,000 to 50,000 to the square mile. Camden, Trenton, Wilmington and Chester all had 1,000 to the square mile. Generally, the population was scattered and agriculture dominant.

In 1900, there was a density of 50,000 to the square mile in large areas in Philadelphia; in Wilmington, up to 10,000; and in Chester, up to 5,000. Population was flowing rapidly toward Conshohocken and Norristown, a fact which emphasized the necessity of planning the necessary belt line highways around Philadelphia before the suburbs became solidly built along the Schuylkill. It is no more practical to build a highway through a densely populated area than to drive a road over the peaks of mountains.

By 1940, the population of the region may exceed 4,000,000, averaging about 25,000 to the square mile in a strip along the river from below Wilmington to Trenton. There may be a great diagonal metropolis reaching virtually from Trenton to Baltimore, with here and there a little open space, but very little. There may be nearly 6,000,000 people in the region by 1970. A few years ago, the population in Delaware and Camden counties was of a rural character. Today it is definitely a semi-urban population. Those of us who live in Delaware, Montgomery and Camden counties are in danger of being inundated by a population pressure of 10,000 or 15,000 to one square mile.

Philadelphia is well provided with radial highways. In the old days roads were built from the heart of one city to the heart of another. A dozen or more of these roads converged upon Philadelphia. During the World War, trucks loaded with steel plates for ships came from Bethlehem down Doylestown Pike to Old York Road, through the heart of the City of Philadelphia, around City Hall to Broad and Chestnut, because there was no other way for them to circumvent the congested heart of the City. Unless one is quite expert, it is practically impossible to get through the City without going through the most congested districts. Most trucking comes of industry located along the Delaware River front. The Regional Planning Federation has proposed an industrial highway along the Delaware all the way from Trenton to Wilmington, in conjunction with the highway departments of the States of Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware.

For passenger-car traffic, the Federation has proposed an inner and an outer belt line highway around Philadelphia. A section of the inner belt line highway—a needed cross-connection between the Main Line and Chestnut Hill and Jenkintown—was agitated by the late Alexander J. Cassatt almost 50 years ago, and subsequently advocated by the late Samuel Rea, former chairman of our Board of Directors.

A scenic route has also been proposed connecting the wonderful Brandywine Valley up through Chadd's Ford, where there should be a park; the Chester Valley connected with Valley Forge, the Skip-pack Pike, Neshaminy Creek and joining the Washington's Crossing Parks with New Hope to Lambertville. Immediately above New Hope is one of the most beautiful playgrounds in the world. It is not second to Bear Mountain in New York. There is the opportunity to create a very glorious park where land is inexpensive and the citizens are most sympathetic.

We are not alone in thinking that parks and parkways have a relationship to the highway system. Only within the past 15 or 20 years, the metropolitan district of Boston has been acquiring outlying lands and creek valley areas and has developed a whole system of driveways and parkways of varying widths. They have developed a great area around Boston, a network of lakes and streams with parkways along their borders.

Metropolitan New York has made great strides in parks and parkways. There are 40,000 acres in the Bear Mountain reservation. The New York Regional Plan is contemplating increasing the 40,000-acre Bear Mountain reservation to 200,000 reaching down into the Orange Mountains. That kind of foresight means a great deal to posterity. In Westchester County, New York*, a wonderful parkway system has been built. It follows the stream valleys and winding driveways, giving an opportunity to enjoy the beauty of the country, no matter how dense the population may be. The Westchester park planners are not very much concerned in preserving any formal park, but in keeping it informal.

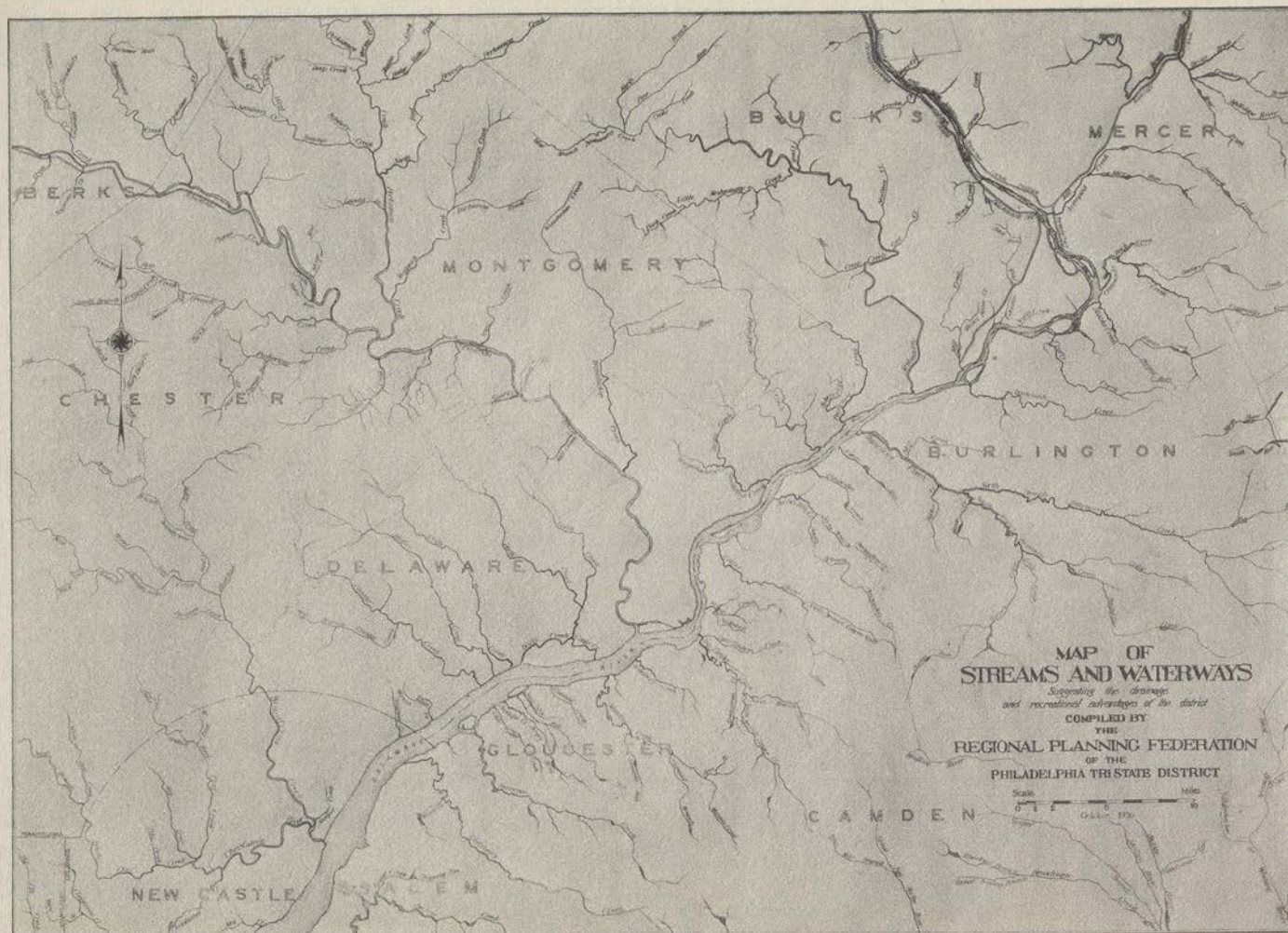
Here in the Philadelphia Tri-State District we must provide against the destruction of trees and other natural beauty. Our countryside is remarkable. In Chester, Crum, Ridley, Darby, Cobb's creeks and others, together with two majestic rivers, the Delaware and Schuylkill, we have a magnificent framework which Nature has given us to guide our plan for an unusual system of stream valley parks.

Here are 200,000 acres of potential forest preserves in New Jersey. This may be a dream, but we have to do a little dreaming—perhaps it will all come true. Some of it is coming true. (*Applause*)

Here is a great proposed forest park rising at the head waters of French Creek. This was proposed by P. M. Sharples of West Chester, Pennsylvania. It is his dream for a magnificent forest park, comparable to Bear Mountain and offering a diversity of recreation. Some day, too, Fairmount and Valley Forge Parks will be joined with a scenic parkway along the hillsides overlooking the Schuylkill River.

There is a plan for the development of the Cooper River which flows into Camden. A great deal of that is well under way. There is

a view of the Brandywine, in Brandywine Park. This is a part of the area I have suggested ought to be preserved in the State of Delaware.

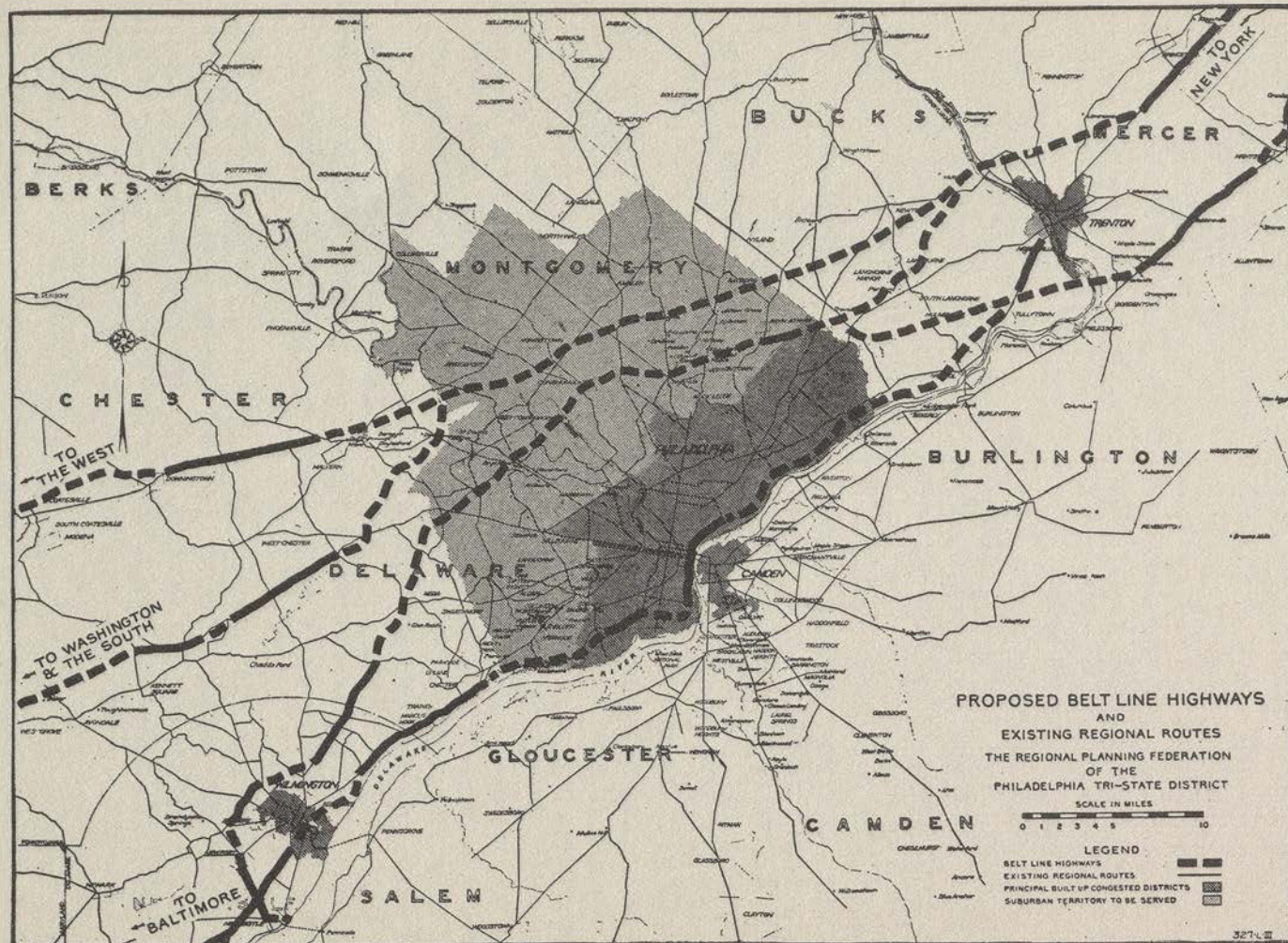
There is Crum Creek. It is hard to obtain such a wilderness view as this. Some of it is being spoiled rather rapidly. Here is Mill Creek. It should be preserved in its natural state. Here is a little by-way in Pennypack Park for canoes and small boats. These are the mountains up toward the Lehigh Valley, near New Hope and Lambertville. I think this is an area we should regard as having possibilities similar to the Bear Mountain area.

Here is a glimpse of the Thames, in London, showing how European cities make the most of streams in their architectural studies and plans. Even an industry established in the midst of architectural beauty is not allowed to mar it, but goes on nevertheless.

Here we have the great harbor of Philadelphia and Camden, with tremendous facilities. Richard Weglein, Director of Wharves, Docks and Ferries, is here today and has lent me this slide to show how highly effective are the water and rail transportation. Philadelphia is greatly to be envied because she can load directly from car to ship-side and at the same time be loading to trucks and wagons from piers. New York would give a great deal to be able to handle traffic in that way.

Just a word on sanitation and drainage. You can make a study of elevation, of land sites, of grades sloping toward rivers and find it is economically possible to develop a sewage and drainage system which definitely will permit a series of trunk lines serving one great municipality, instead of each municipality having to spend a large fortune in developing its own system. Cities like Norristown cannot afford to solve the problem for themselves. They would have to have help of other towns in the same drainage basin, and this would avoid the pollution of our rivers in a way not now practicable. They must, however, pollute rivers unless something practicable can be worked out. These studies are meant to show it is possible for this area to co-operate.

Do not forget that underlying all our hillside area, there is a so-called sub-surface moisture and sub-surface pollution will get into our wells—into our streams, with very little purification. It is a positive fact that in Chestnut Hill a few years ago, a person could have a little spring. Today, you couldn't put your goldfish in the water of your springhouse, because of the number of dwellings making harmful contributions to that water. We find surface waters used everywhere, so easily accessible and at the same time and the same place to carry away waste. When we look upstream, we think of the water as a drinking-water supply; when we look downstream, we look upon it as a means of getting rid of waste. But you cannot go far enough upstream to find a place where no one is looking down stream.

We have made comprehensive studies of Philadelphia as a natural aviation center. It has great advantages over New York as an Atlantic seaboard terminal. These routes show we are in the proper line for communication with the Far West in avoiding the danger of certain highlands which the air transport now has to encounter. Competitively with New York, we consider Philadelphia vastly better for transportation of the western passenger, mail, and freight loads.

In order to get these different things done, we have to work with many different communities. As shown by this map, there are 400 governmental units to work with. There are eleven counties: New Castle, in Delaware; Delaware, Chester, Montgomery and Bucks counties in Pennsylvania; Mercer, Burlington, Camden, Gloucester and Salem counties in New Jersey. The Regional Planning Federation is co-operating with all governmental officials and their engineering representatives in planning for and discounting the future. We are trying to lay on the table an architectural landscape study for the area for which they are responsible and to suggest to them certain proposals and certain standards which are desirable and if they will favor them they will profit thereby immeasurably.

May I call your attention to Polásek's statue of a man carving his own destiny? This is a question of community co-operation toward the realization of a definite goal. We all accept as our own thought beautifully expressed, this "MAN CARVING HIS OWN DESTINY."

MINUTES OF THE FIFTY-NINTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE FAIRMOUNT PARK ART ASSOCIATION

The Fifty-ninth Annual Meeting of the Fairmount Park Art Association was held in the Bellevue-Stratford on Thursday, January 22, 1931, at twelve o'clock noon.

There were about 525 members and guests present. President Taylor occupied the chair.

Mr. Busch moved that the Fifty-ninth Annual Report of the Board of Trustees of the Fairmount Park Art Association be accepted and referred to the incoming Board and that the Secretary be instructed to have the usual number of copies printed and distributed. Seconded and carried.

The Treasurer's Report, duly audited, was presented by headings. Mr. Stokes moved that the Treasurer's Report be accepted and referred to the incoming Board for publication. Seconded and carried.

The terms of six Trustees having expired, Dr. Lingelbach nominated Messrs. Charles L. Borie, Jr., Albert Kelsey, Emory McMichael, Roland L. Taylor, Samuel Price Wetherill, Jr., and Joseph E. Widener for the term of three years and until their successors are chosen. It was moved that nominations be closed and that the Executive Secretary be instructed to cast one ballot for those nominated. Seconded and carried. The Executive Secretary reported that he had cast the ballot accordingly. The President announced the election of the nominees. The President then asked whether any member present wished to bring up any business before the meeting. There being no response, Mr. Taylor proceeded to introduce the speaker, Samuel Price Wetherill, Jr., who delivered an address on the Regional Plan of the Philadelphia Tri-State District.
